**H**IS Majesty in Council was this Day pleased to order, That the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Thursday the 5th Day of September next, should be further prorogued to Tuesday the 15th Day of October following.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

*Requiring Passes, formerly granted to Ships and Vessels trading in the Way of the Cruizers belonging to the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, to be returned into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and other Passes of different Forms to be issued.*

G E O R G E R,

**W**HEREAS, by Our Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Twenty-second Day of February, in the Fifth Year of Our Reign, We did charge and command all Our loving Subjects, who then were, or should be, possessed of any Passes for Ships and Vessels belonging to Our Subjects trading to Portugal, the Canaries, Guinea, the Indies, into the Mediterranean, or elsewhere, in the Way of the Cruizers of the Government of Algiers (except such Passes as had been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they could not be timely furnished with new Passes) that they should, before the First Day of February, One thousand seven hundred and sixty six, return the same, and furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of the Commissioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their several Ships and Vessels, in such Manner as by the said recited Proclamation was directed: And whereas it hath been humbly represented unto Us, that there is the greatest Reason to believe, that many of Our Passes may, either by Accident or undue Means, have fallen into the Hands of Foreigners, who, by Colour of such Passes may carry on their Trade; We, taking the Premises into Our Royal Consideration, and judging it necessary to put a speedy Stop to all such indirect Practices, which do not only tend to the Prejudice of Our trading Subjects, but may occasion a Misunderstanding between Us and the Governments on the Coast of Barbary, for preventing thereof have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby declare, That all such Passes of the present Form, now in being, shall not continue in Force longer than till the Thirty-first Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-seven, (except such Passes as have been granted to Ships gone or going to the East Indies, or other remote Voyages, where they cannot be timely furnished with new Passes; and that in such Case, the Passes of the present Form do continue in Force for Two Years, from and after the said Thirty-first Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-seven). And We do hereby strictly charge and command all Our loving Subjects, who are or shall be possessed of any such Passes, that they do, before the Thirty-first Day of August, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-seven, return the same (except such as are

before excepted) into the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, or to the respective Collectors of Our Customs at the Out-ports of Great Britain and Ireland, or to the Governors of some of Our Foreign Plantations or Dominions, in order to their being cancelled; and that they do furnish themselves with Passes of a new Form, under the Hands and Seals of Our Commissioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, in lieu thereof, for their several Ships and Vessels, according to the Treaty subsisting between Us and the said Governments on the Coasts of Barbary, and the Regulations made by Our Royal Predecessor King George the First, by Order in His Privy Council, on the Fourteenth Day of June, in the Year One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, so far as the same remain unaltered by the Regulations this Day made by Us in Our Council, and according to the further Regulations then there made, and Our Instructions given to Our said Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland touching the same. And whereas many Ships and Vessels belonging to Our loving Subjects continue several Years trading from Port to Port in the Mediterranean without returning Home, whereby they cannot so conveniently procure their Passes to be exchanged; We do hereby, for the Ease of Our trading Subjects, publish and declare Our Pleasure, That upon the Application of any Owner of any Ship or Vessel, or other substantial Merchant, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain, and Oath made by him of the Property of such Ship or Vessel, and that Three-fourths of the Company are Our Subjects, according to an Act, made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of Our Royal Predecessor King Charles the Second, (intituled, An Act for encouraging and increasing of Shipping and Navigation) and upon entering into a Bond for the Return of such Pass at the End of Three Years, or of the Voyage, if that shall sooner determine, it shall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, for the Time being, and they are respectively empowered to make out a new Pass for such Ship or Vessel, and send the same to such of Our Consuls in the Mediterranean, as the said Owner or Merchant shall desire, with Direction to such Consul, that, upon Application to him from the Master of the Ship, for which the Pass is made out, and surrendering up his old Pass, and entering into a like Bond for the Return of such new Pass, he shall deliver out the said new Pass to such Master, and transmit the old one, with the Bond, to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain. And in order more effectually to hinder, for the future, any Abuses that may be attempted by Foreigners, relating to the new Passes to be issued as aforesaid, We do hereby further declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That all such new Passes, to be hereafter issued for any Ships or Vessels whatsoever belonging to any of Our Subjects of the Island of Minorca or Gibraltar, shall be made out in a peculiar Form, different from the Form of the new Passes to be issued for Ships and Vessels belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions; and that such new Passes shall be lodged with the respective Governors, Lieutenant Governors, or Commanders in Chief for the Time being, of the said Island of Minorca and Gibraltar, and issued out only by them, according to the Regulations made by Our said Royal Predecessor

for King George the First, and Ourself, in Council, as aforesaid: And the said respective Governors, Lieutenant Governors, and Commanders in Chief, are hereby charged and required not to issue or deliver out any such Passes to any Persons whatsoever, other than such as are really Our Subjects inhabiting in the said Island of Minorca or Gibraltar respectively, and strictly to conform themselves to the Regulations and Instructions made and given as aforesaid. But in regard it sometimes happens, that Ships, belonging to Our Subjects of other Parts of our Dominions, call in at Gibraltar and Minorca without Passes, and have Occasion to be furnished therewith; We do, for the further Convenience of Trade, hereby publish and declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That it shall and may be lawful for Our Commissioners for executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, for the Time being, and they are respectively hereby empowered, to lodge Mediterranean Passes, of the same Form with the new Passes for Ships and Vessels belonging to any other Part of Our Dominions, in the Hands of Our Governors, Lieutenant Governors, or Commanders in Chief of Minorca and Gibraltar, with Directions to them to issue and deliver out such Passes to any of Our Subjects, not being Inhabitants of the said Island of Minorca, or of Gibraltar, provided the Person or Persons applying for the same do comply with and conform to the several Rules and Regulations now in Use, and required to be observed by such Our other Subjects. And We do hereby order, That the Commissioners of Our Customs in Great Britain, and the Commissioners of Our Revenue in Ireland, do cause to be carried into Execution such Parts of the said Order of Council of the Fourteenth Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and twenty-two, concerning Passes, as relate to themselves, and the proper Officers under them, so far as the same remains now in Force, and of Our Order aforesaid, made this Day in Council; and that they do direct their Officers in the several Ports of Our Kingdoms of Great Britain and Ireland, to demand of the Masters of all Merchant Ships, so soon as they shall return into Port from a Foreign Voyage, all Passes granted as aforesaid, which shall be in their Possession, to be produced to the said respective Officers of Our Customs; and that if the same shall appear to be of an older Date than Twelve Months for Ships and Vessels trading on this Side the Straights Mouth, or for Ships and Vessels trading to a greater Distance, in Case the Voyages of such last-mentioned Ships and Vessels shall be determined, then such Passes shall be delivered up to the said respective Officers of Our Customs, and be by them returned to the Office of the Admiralty of Great Britain: And in Case the Master of any such Ship or Vessel shall refuse to produce or deliver up such Passes, according to the true Intent of Our said Order, then the said Officers shall certify the Name of every such Master, and of the Ship or Vessel, to Our Commissioners for Executing the Office of High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland, or to Our High Admiral of Great Britain and Ireland for the Time being, to the End that Directions may be given for putting the Bond, entered into on the granting any such Pass, in Suit: And all Our Governors, Lieutenant Governors, and Commanders in Chief of any of Our Islands, Colonies, or Plantations, Consuls residing in Foreign Parts, and all other Our Officers and Ministers whatsoever, and all other Our loving Subjects whom it may concern, are hereby expressly required and commanded to yield due Obedience unto, and strictly to observe, all the Orders, Instructions, Regulations, and Directions before mentioned, on Pain of Our High Displeasure.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-second Day of March last, to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Three Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas the Time thereby limited was by Orders in Council prolonged and extended from the said Thirtieth Day of April to the Thirty-first Day of this Instant August; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Bounties should be continued to be paid for some longer Time; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, That the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this Instant August to the Thirty-first Day of October next inclusive. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 17th of May last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23d of this instant August; and whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, and of the 5th and 19th of February last, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, That no Person or Persons whomsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the said 23d Day of this instant August, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise—except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, and of the 5th and 19th of February last, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures

Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt-petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

*Constantinople, July 17.* The Porte has deposed Spanachgee Zadee, Pascha of Bagdat, (with whose Conduct the Inhabitants were extremely dissatisfied) and has substituted in his Room Abdullah the Cheaia of the late Omar Pascha.

*Petersburg, August 2.* Her Imperial Majesty has been pleased to bestow on Monf. Moussin Pouschkin, (the Empress's Minister to the Court of Great Britain, who is now here) for his Life and that of his Lady, an Estate in Livonia of between three and four Thousand Roubles a Year.

*Petersburg, August 2.* The following is an Account of Rewards distributed to the Fleet, and Promotions in the Navy, made by her Imperial Majesty at the late Review at Cronstadt.

For the Engagement at Napoli di Romania in the Month of May 1770, where the Turkish Fleet, consisting of 25 Sail, great and small, was dispersed;

To Rear Admiral Elphinston's Squadron, One Third of a Year's Wages, in all, 13738 Roubles.

For the important Victory gained over the Turkish Fleet at Chesme the 24th of June, 1770;

To Admiral Spiritoff's Squadron a Year's Wages, 106,632 Roubles.

To Rear-Admiral Elphinston's Squadron, Three Months Wages, 10303 Roubles, 54½ Copecks.

To the Officers and Crew of the Ship St. Eustachius, for Burning a Turkish Ship, 6100 Roubles; and for the Flag of the Turkish Commander in Chief, 3333 Ro. 33 Cop.

For the entire Destruction of the Turkish Fleet in the Bay of Chesme the 26th of June, 1770, for the Ships and Vessels burnt there, 118,493 Ro. 33½ Cop.

For three Flags burnt, 9000 Roubles.

For the Taking a Ship and Galley in the said Haven, 19010 Roubles.

To the Commander in Chief, 15593 Ro. 66 Cop.

To the other Admirals or Commanders, 22276 Ro. 66 Cop.

For the Victory gained the 28th of October, 1774, at Patrasco, over 24 Dulcignote Frigates and Chebecks, of which 17 were burnt under the Cannon of the Fort;

For the Burning of the Frigates and Chebecks 35633 Ro. 33½ Cop. of which Sum to the Commander in Chief, 3563 Ro. 33½ Cop.

In general, for the Advantages gained over the Enemy's Fleet in the Mediterranean, for their Destruction at Chesme, for the Taking of Ships and Gallies, and for Rewards to the Commander in Chief, and Admirals, 360,113 Ro. 54½ Cop.

#### *In the Black Sea.*

For 6 of the Enemy's Ships burnt in the Month of May 1773, the first Action of the Russian Flag in that Sea;

To the Squadron of Captain Suchotin, One Third Part, according to the Naval Regulations, 540 Roubles; of which Sum One Tenth. to the Commander in Chief, 54 Roubles.

To the Squadron of Captain Kinsbergen, for the Action between Kefa and Kalatrava in June, 1773, One Third of a Year's Wages, 2356 Ro. 46½ Cop.

For the Action near Ludshuk-kale in August, 1773, Two Thirds of a Year's Wages, 12054 Ro. 63 Cop.

To Vice-Admiral and Intendant General Nasimoff Leave is granted to quit the Service on Account of his bad State of Health; but he is to continue to enjoy his Appointments, with Permission to re-enter into the Service when his Health is re-established.

To Vice-Admiral Greig, for his good and faithful Services, the Order of St. Alexander Newsky.

To Major-General Hanibal, Master of the Naval Ordnance, the Post of Grand Master; and to the Superintendent Rabinin, the Post of Intendant-General.

Four Brigadiers were advanced to the Rank of Major-General; and according to the Naval Regulations to cast Lots for the vacant Post of Rear-Admiral.

Monf. Kinsbergen is among the Captains of the Second Rank who were promoted to that of First Captain.

There was besides a great Promotion of Officers of inferior Rank; and Pensions were granted to several retiring from the Service.

*Petersburg, August 6.* On Sunday last the Empress received, by a Courier from the Great Duke, the News of his Imperial Highness being betrothed to the Princess of Wirtemberg; on which joyful Occasion there was a Ball at Court: And Yesterday Morning early Count Goertz arrived with Compliments of Congratulation from the King of Prussia to her Imperial Majesty on the same happy Event.

The Empress intends removing this Afternoon from Peterhoff to Zarfco-Zelo.

Count Moncenigo, an Italian Gentleman, who had suffered much in his Possessions, particularly in the Venetian Islands, on Account of the Assistance he afforded the Russians during the late War, is appointed Commissary General of the Russian Navy and Trade in Italy, and is to reside at Pisa.

*Stockholm, August 9.* Count Frolich, Governor of the Province of Halland, has obtained Leave to resign in Favour of Lieutenant Colonel Tott.

The Regiment, from which Colonel Gyllenswahn was removed, has been conferred upon Baron Stenbock, Lieutenant Colonel of the Guards.

His Swedish Majesty, with the younger and more active Part of the Court, dwell at present in Tents in the Neighbourhood of Eckolfund, to be ready to attend during the Cool of the Morning to the Exercise of Tilting. Towards the End of the Month there will be a magnificent Tournament.

*Florence, August 10.* A Courier arrived here two Days ago from Petersburg with the Ensigns of the Order of St. Ann of Holstein for General Hanibal, who has resided at Pisa since the Conclusion of the War, with a Commission to settle the Affairs relating to the Prizes, which the Russians, during the Course of it, made of Neutral Ships in the Archipelago.

His Royal Highness the Duke of Ostrogothia arrived here early this Morning; and, after a few Hours Repose, proceeded to the Baths near Pisa.

*Vienna, August 10.* On Monday last the Empress Queen, together with the Archduchesses her Daughters, and the whole Court, were present at the Military Manœuvres of the Troops encamped at Laxemburg. A slight Indisposition prevented the Empress from being present at the second Manœuvre on Wednesday last, but Yesterday her Imperial Majesty appeared in perfect Health at Schonbrunn.

*Vienna, August 14.* The Emperor set out from this Capital for the Camp at Pest last Night at Ten o'Clock. His Imperial Majesty will return on the 27th Instant, and on the 9th of September the Grand Duke and Dutchess of Tuscany will take Leave of this Court, and begin their Journey towards their own Dominions.

Dresden, August 18. The Princess Cunigunda, about to his Serene Highness the Elector of Saxony, who about two Years ago was elected Coadjutor of Thorn and Effen, is now named Abbess thereof.

Berlin, August 20. His Prussian Majesty, attended by General Pritzwitz, left Potsdam on Wednesday last the 14th Instant, in order to review his Troops in Silesia: His Royal Highness the Prince of Prussia set out the preceding Evening; and the same Day the Princess of Prussia arrived here.

Hague, August 25. This Day being the Anniversary of the Birth of his Serene Highness William Frederick Hereditary Prince of Orange, who entered into the Fifth Year of his Age, the same was observed here in the usual Manner.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King, That in the Night of Monday the Tenth Day of June last past the House of John Edison, Esq; at Lee in the County of Kent, was broken open and plundered, and that the said House has been divers Times since attempted by a Gang of Robbers who have from that Time infested the said Neighbourhood, particularly on Tuesday last the 27th Day of this Instant August, about Two o'Clock in the Morning, when the said Mr. Edison's Servant, William Gearing, fired a Gun, and wounded one of the Villains, as appeared from a Quantity of Blood found; at which Time the Robbers took away (among other Things) two white Cloth Livery Coats with blue Cuffs, Capes, and Linings, two blue Waistcoats, a blue Livery Great Coat with blue and white Worsted Lace, and two new Livery Hats with Silver Buttons and Loops; and that on the next Day (the 28th Instant) a threatening Letter was found in the Yard of Mr. Edison's House, of which the following is a Copy, viz.

Sr

Dam you and Mr. Rufel to for all as as we Care but Dam me if we dont match gearing for he as shot and he shall be shot if he is not Dam me to let him pearper for the vige for I will shortly come (supercribed) to dam you all

To Mr Adifone and  
at Lee Eternal Dam ye

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in either of the said Robberies, and writing or leaving the said threatening Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said threatening Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplise or Accomplises therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, I the said John Edison do hereby promise a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as before excepted) to be paid by me upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.
