hath been graciously pleased, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal, dated the Sixth Day of May, in the Sixteenth Year of His Majesty's Reign, to nominate and appoint me Richard Viscount Howe, of the Kingdom of Ireland, and William Howe, Esq.; General of His Forces in North America, and each of us, jointly and severally, to be His Majesty's Commissioner and Commissioners for granting His Free and General Pardons to all those, who in the Tumult and Disorder of the Times, may have deviated from their just Allegiance, and who are willing, by a speedy Return to their Duty, to reap the Benefits of the Royal Favour; and also for declaring in His Majesty's Name, any Colony, Province, County, Town, Port, District or Place, to be at the Peace of His Majesty; I do therefore hereby declare, That due Consideration shall be had to the eneritorious Services of all Persons who shall aid and affift in restoring the public Tranquillity in the faid Colonies, or in any Part or Parts thereof: That Pardons shall be granted, dutiful Representations received, and every suitable Encouragement given for promoting fuch Measures as shall be conducive to the Establishment of legal Government and Peace, in Pursuance of His Majesty's most gracious Purpoles aforefaid.

Given on Board His Majesty's Ship the Eagle, off the Coasts of the Province of Massachusett's Bay, the 20th Day of June, 1776.

Lord Dunmore, Mr. Martin, and Sir James Wright, late Governors, sent to Amboy by a Flag, and for-warded to Congress by General Washington, be published in the several Gazettes, that the good Peoole of these United States may be informed of what Nature are the Commissioners, and what the Terms, with the Expectation of which the infidious Court of Great Britain has endeavoured to amuse and disarm them; and that the few who still remain sufpended by a Hope founded either in the Justice or Moderation of their late King may now at length be convinced that the Valour alone of their Country is to fave its Liberties.

Copy of a Letter from General Howe to Lord Georg: Germain, dated Head Quarters, Staten Island, Angust 15, 1776.

On the 12th the Two Fleets, under Convoy of Commodore Hotham, and the Repulse, met off this Harbour and came in together; the Guards and Hessians on Board are reported to be very healthy. The Camp Equipage is also come, and no Time will be lost in proceeding upon the Operations of

the Campaign.

Lord Dunmore and Lord William Campbell arrived Yesterday from the Southward, with Six Peter Parker: Being anxious to fend off this Packet, I defer being more particular until the next Departure.

Dublin, September 24, 1776. Sunday last, being the Anniversary of Their Majesties Coronation, in the Morning the Flag was hoisted on Bedford Tower. At Noon the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Ma-jesty's Park the Phoenix were fired three Rounds, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks; and Yesterday Evening a Play was given by his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant for the Entertainment of the Ladies; and the Night concluded with Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy.
