Cologne, Feb. 16. The Inhabitants of the Dutchy of Juliers, have finally agreed with the Intendant of Mag-Brichs about their Contributions, after the same rate as formerly. On Saturday last the Sieur Straetmin parted hence on his way to Nimeguen, where he is to affilt as the Emperors third Ambassador. The last night there was a great allarm at Bonne, and the whole Garrison was in Arms, the occasion of which was, the halty retreat of the Imperial Troops, which lay quartered in the neighbouring Villages, under the Walls of Bonne, upon the news they had of the approach of a French party of 2000 Horse. There is some discourse of a design that hath been discovered to surprize Treves; but without any certainty. The Bishop of Munster is said to be dangerously ill. There are Letters from the Elector of Bavaria's Court which fay, that his Electoral Highness had given our Commissions for the raising four new Regiments for the reinforcing the Army he has already on foor.

Hague, Feb. 16. Here are arrived this week Deputies from the Magiltrates of Middleburg, and the Collegium qualificarum, and have had Audience of his Highness, to whom they were sent to pray that Dr. Momma might be restored to his Ministry. The Deputies for foreign affirs have for fome days past been very busie, having had long and close Conferences concerning the affairs of the War. From Germany we have an account, that the French have burnt above two hundred Villages in Alsatia, and the Lower Palatinate; and that several Imperial Troops had paffed the Rhine to hinder them from going on with their delign. We have Letters from Mosco of the 31 of December, which give a large account of a conspiracy that had been formed against the life of the present Czar, whom it was intended to have poyloned, to make way for the young Prince, which the late Czar had by the Empress who is now liying, and was his fecond, to fucceed in the Empire, and that feveral persons of the greatest quality, were suspected to be con cerned in this Treason, of which we must expect a confirmation.

Ditto, Feb. 19. We are told that the States-General will fit out a squadron of 15 Men of War, to serve in the Baltick this fummer, in conjunction, with the Fleet of Denmark. The City of Hamburg is sending a Deputation hither, to pray the States to continue their endeavours for the oppoling the establishing a Toll at Gluckstads. His Highness intends to part hence in few days for Gronningen, together with the Commisfioners appointed by the States, to endeavour to compose certain differences which have for some time been on foot between the City of Groningen and the Omme-Tanden. From Nimeguen we have advice, that the main Point, concerning the Form or Project of the Powers, to be used by all the Parties, was finally adjusted, to the fatisfaction of the Mediators; and that the onely difficulty which remained, was between the French and the Danes, concerning the language they were to use in their publick Instruments, which matter will in all appearance, be likewise accommodated in few days, and then the next thing will be, That the Parries pro pose, and hand to the Mediators, the Terms and Conditions on which they are willing to make the peace. His Highness after having dispatched matters at Groningen, will go to Cleve or Wefel, to meet the Elector of Brandenburgh there.

Brustels, Fib. 16' A greet many Families come daily hisber as well as to other places, who are forced to leave their Habitations in the French Conquests, where their Estates are conficated. We have nothing new since what we writ in our last concerning the motions of the Enemy, who we then told you were encamped near Embien, to the number of 20000 men; however we cannot think the weather will permit them yet for some time to set down before any place, to make a formal Siege; and against the season is proper for it, we hope to be in a good posture of defence. Our Letters from Assault complain very much of the great desolations made by the French in those parts. Don Emanuel de Lyra the Spanish Minial ster at the Hague continues still here.
