yesterday at West is and we are told that the Duke of Neuburg will likewife go thither, to be prefent at the Conferences that will be held there with the Prince of Orange. Among other thiags, it is faid, they will concert the keeping a Body of an Army, to bridle the Garifon of Macsfiricht, which will otherwise be extreme troublefom to the Neighbouring Countries. From Francfort the Letters we receive by the last Ordinary inform us, that the French have actually quitted Deuxponts, and that the Garifon was marched to Lorrain. The French fortifie. Merg and Nancy, and give the Boors that come in to work 12 Solz per day.

Hague, Febr. 16. Don Emanuel de Lyra, the Spanift Envoy, is returned hither from Bruffets, where he. hath been some time in expectation of receiving the monies due to this State, for the Equipage of the Squadron that ferved in Sicily. The Marquis de Grana is likewife expected to arrive here very fuddenly, and then a meeting will be held of the Ministers of the feveral Allies, for the concerting the measures to be observed during the approaching Campagne. The 22 inftant, the Elector of Brandenburg was expected at Wefel, and it's believed his Highness the Prince of Orange would be there in few dayes after. In the mean time the Cavalry of his Highness Army has Orders to begin to march the 2 d of the next month, and a great number of Boats is preparing to transport the Infantry by Water to the place appointed for their Rendezvous. From Flanders we have an account, that a Body of 2 or 3000 French had come to the Canal of Bruffels, with defign to have cut certain Sluyces, and by that means drowned the Countrey, but that they were prevented by the Troops which the Duke de Villa Hermofa had posted for the guard and fecurity of the faid Sluyces. The States have refolved to-fit out a Squadron of Men of War to ferve in the Baltick this Summer, according to the report of the Deputies of the Admiralty. We are told that the Emperor has lately written a Letter to the States, in which he affures them, that he will have a very powerful Army in the Field, and that as early as the feafon will permit, and that the fame shall act for the good of the common Alliance, purfuant to what shall be concerred by the Allies.

Bruffels, Febr. 24. The French are within thefe two dayes come very near this City, yefferday morning a party came to Gaesberg, and plundered the Cafile there; this morning they came in a very confiderable Body to Grimberg (Which is about a League and half from hence) and their Parties came almoft under our Walls; upon which, the Countrey people repair hither, and to other ftrong places, in great numbers. And feeing the Enemy is come fo near our Canal, and ftems to have a defign to hinder our Commerce, his Excellency the Duke de Villa Hermo fa fent the laft night a detachment of Spanifh and Dutch Toops to Vilord, to be in readinefs there to oppose the Enemies attempts; and at the fame time Expresses were fent to Majines and Lowain, with command so the Troops that are there, to hold themfelves ready to march upon the first orders they final receive. His Excellency has now wholly put off his journey to Flanders, apprehending that the Enemy might hinder his return hither. There is now very little difcouste of the Siege of Si. Qmers, but on the contrary people begin now to feas that the Enemy have an intention to attack this City, Malines or Louvain. A fhort time will fully inform us.

Antwerp, Febr. 25. We are from all hands alarmed with the motions of the French; who will, in all appearance, attack fome of the places in these Provinces, before we fhall be able to come into the Field to oppose them. Erom Bruffels they write, that the Bargundian Regiment, confifting in 400 Men, was got fafely into Mons, which place it was believed the Frenchentended to beliege; but at prefent we are of another opinion, and have reason to think that the Enemy will fall into the Province of Brabant. Our last Letters from Park give

us an account that the King intended to part from thenee the 2S of this month, on his journey towards thefe Provinces. We are affured that the Printe of Orange has appointed a Rendezvous of the Forces which are to compole his Army on the Io of the next month; and that his Highnefs intends to lofe no time, but to march immediately for the defence of thefe Countries, and in the mean time his Excellency the Duke de Villa Hermofa, will draw a Body of an Army together, to watch the defigns of the Enemy.

Paria, Febr. 27. On Wedneiday last the Marquis de Lonvoy pred from hence by Post for Flanders Vesterday marched parted from hence by Poft for Flanders patted from hence by Polt for Flanders Xctiteriday marched the Kings Musketeers, and this morning the Regiment of Guards, and to morrow morning his Majefly begins his jour-ney towards Flanders; he will lodge the first night at Choif, a League beyond Compugne, which is about 23 Leagues from hence. On Thurfday last his Majefly nominated 13 Lieu-tenant Generals, 24 Marefchals de Camp, and 29 Erigadiers, to command his Forces this next Campane. From Markible of command his forces this next Campane. From Marfeiles of the 16 influnt, they write, That there was arrived a Veffel from Meffina, the Mafter whereof reports, that the Admirat and Viceadmiral of the Squadron of Spanifi Men of War, which failed from Final, were caft away, and that all the Sea-men and Soldiers, which were on board, to the number of 1500, were all drowned; that the reft of that Squadron had put into Portolongone; and that the Duke de Vivonne had fent 8 Men of War to Cruife near Portolongone. to attack the faid Spanish Men of War, which they put to Sea again. From Alface we have an account, that the 10 inftant, the French Garifon marched out of Hagnenaw, after having destroyed greatest part of the Town, and the next day arrived at Saverne, which place, as The likewife Molfbim and Obernehenbeim, will be demolifhed. Sicur de Fay is arrived at Brifac, and has taken upon h m the Government of that place, and the Sieur du Roy is gone to com-Government of that places and the Steur du Roy is gone to com-mand at Merz. From Madvid we have Letters of the 3d in-ftant, which fay, that Don From of Asfiria does with great pains and affiduity apply himfelf to fettle the affairs of the Monarchy, which he had found in great diforder 3 that feveral perfons of quality, who had adhered to Don Valeranda Mar-quis de Villa Sjerra, were banifhed the Court 3 that the King had revoked the Grant by which he conferred the quality of Marquis and fittle of Grandee of Spain upon Don Valeranda again M whom Procefs would be made, as guilty of mary and again the whom Proces would be made, as guilty of mary and high mildemeanors; that the Admiral of Cafile had Been obliged to reftore a confiderable Sum of Money, and feveral Jew-els of a great value, which were in his hands, belonging to Don Valenquila, whole Lady was confined to a Monastery at Tokdo 3 that the Troops which came with Don Juan, were on their march towards Catalonid, under the command of the Count de Montercy ; that the Count de Monte farchio had not yet been at Madrid, but flayed at a place ten Leagues from Madrid, in expectation of the Kings pardon for his milcarriage in Silly.
