

yesterday at *Wesel*; and we are told that the Duke of *Neuburg* will likewise go thither, to be present at the Conferences that will be held there with the Prince of *Orange*. Among other things, it is said, they will concert the keeping a Body of an Army, to bridle the Garrison of *Maastricht*, which will otherwise be extreme troublesome to the Neighbouring Countries. From *Francfort* the Letters we receive by the last Ordinary inform us, that the French have actually quitted *Deuxponts*, and that the Garrison was marched to *Lorraine*. The French fortifie *Metz* and *Nancy*, and give the Boors that come in to work 12 Solz per day.

Hague, Febr. 16. Don *Emanuel de Lyra*, the Spanish Envoy, is returned hither from *Brussels*, where he hath been some time in expectation of receiving the monies due to this State, for the Equipage of the Squadron that served in *Sicily*. The Marquis de *Grana* is likewise expected to arrive here very suddenly, and then a meeting will be held of the Ministers of the several Allies, for the concerting the measures to be observed during the approaching Campaign. The 22 instant, the Elector of *Brandenburg* was expected at *Wesel*, and it's believed his Highness the Prince of *Orange* would be there in few days after. In the mean time the Cavalry of his Highness's Army has Orders to begin to march the 2d of the next month, and a great number of Boats is preparing to transport the Infantry by Water to the place appointed for their Rendezvous. From *Flanders* we have an account, that a Body of 2 or 3000 French had come to the Canal of *Brussels*, with design to have cut certain Sluyces, and by that means drowned the Country, but that they were prevented by the Troops which the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* had posted for the guard and security of the said Sluyces. The States have resolved to fit out a Squadron of Men of War to serve in the *Baltick* this Summer, according to the report of the Deputies of the Admiralty. We are told that the Emperor has lately written a Letter to the States, in which he assures them, that he will have a very powerful Army in the Field, and that as early as the season will permit, and that the same shall act for the good of the common Alliance, pursuant to what shall be concerted by the Allies.

Brussels, Febr. 24. The French are within these two days come very near this City, yesterday morning a party came to *Guesberg*, and plundered the Castle there; this morning they came in a very considerable Body to *Grimberg* (which is about a League and half from hence) and their Parties came almost under our Walls; upon which, the Country people repair hither, and to other strong places, in great numbers. And seeing the Enemy is come so near our Canal, and seems to have a design to hinder our Commerce, his Excellency the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* sent the last night a detachment of Spanish and Dutch Troops to *Vilward*, to be in readiness there to oppose the Enemies attempts; and at the same time Expresses were sent to *Mafines* and *Louvain*, with command to the Troops that are there, to hold themselves ready to march upon the first orders they shall receive. His Excellency has now wholly put off his journey to *Flanders*, apprehending that the Enemy might hinder his return hither. There is now very little discourse of the Siege of *St. Omers*, but on the contrary people begin now to fear that the Enemy have an intention to attack this City, *Mafines* or *Louvain*. A short time will fully inform us.

Antwerp, Febr. 25. We are from all hands alarmed with the motions of the French, who will, in all appearance, attack some of the places in these Provinces, before we shall be able to come into the Field to oppose them. From *Brussels* they write, that the *Burgundian* Regiment, consisting in 400 Men, was got safely into *Mons*, which place it was believed the French intended to besiege; but at present we are of another opinion, and have reason to think that the Enemy will fall into the Province of *Brabant*. Our last Letters from *Paris* give

us an account that the King intended to part from thence the 28 of this month, on his journey towards these Provinces. We are assured that the Prince of *Orange* has appointed a Rendezvous of the Forces which are to compose his Army on the 10 of the next month; and that his Highness intends to lose no time, but to march immediately for the defence of these Countries, and in the mean time his Excellency the Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, will draw a Body of an Army together, to watch the designs of the Enemy.

Paris, Febr. 27. On Wednesday last the Marquis de *Louvois* parted from hence by Post for *Flanders*. Yesterday marched the Kings Musketeers, and this morning the Regiment of Guards, and to morrow morning his Majesty begins his journey towards *Flanders*; he will lodge the first night at *Cherisy*, a League beyond *Compiègne*, which is about 23 Leagues from hence. On Thursday last his Majesty nominated 13 Lieutenant Generals, 24 Marschals de Camp, and 29 Erigadiers, to command his Forces this next Campaign. From *Marseilles* of the 16 instant, they write, That there was arrived a Vessel from *Messina*, the Master whereof reports, that the Admiral and Viceadmiral of the Squadron of Spanish Men of War, which sailed from *Finale*, were cast away, and that all the Seamen and Soldiers, which were on board, to the number of 1500, were all drowned; that the rest of that Squadron had put into *Portolongone*, and that the Duke de *Vivonne* had sent 8 Men of War to Cruise near *Portolongone*, to attack the said Spanish Men of War, when they put to Sea again. From *Alsace* we have an account, that the 10 instant, the French Garrison marched out of *Hagenaw*, after having destroyed greatest part of the Town, and the next day arrived at *Saverne*, which place, as likewise *Molsheim* and *Obernheim*, will be demolished. The Sieur de *Fay* is arrived at *Brisach*, and has taken upon him the Government of that place, and the Sieur du *Roy* is gone to command at *Metz*. From *Madrid* we have Letters of the 3d instant, which say, that Don *Juan* of *Austria* does with great pains and assiduity apply himself to settle the affairs of the Monarchy, which he had found in great disorder; that several persons of quality, who had adhered to Don *Valenzuela* Marquis de *Villa Sierra*, were banished the Court; that the King had revoked the Grant by which he conferred the quality of Marquis and title of Grandee of Spain upon Don *Valenzuela*, against whom Procees would be made, as guilty of many and high misdemeanors; that the Admiral of *Castile* had been obliged to restore a considerable Sum of Money, and several Jewels of a great value, which were in his hands, belonging to Don *Valenzuela*, whose Lady was confined to a Monastery at *Tolledo*; that the Troops which came with Don *Juan*, were on their march towards *Catalonia*, under the command of the Count de *Monterey*; that the Count de *Montesarchio* had not yet been at *Madrid*, but stayed at a place ten Leagues from *Madrid*, in expectation of the Kings pardon for his miscarriage in *Sicily*.
