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Warsaw, Febr. 13.

THe Dyet is still assembled, and having adjusted several Preliminary Points, will now enter upon business; in order to which, the Senators have according to custom declared their opinions in the great matters recommended by the King to the consideration of the Dyet, which for the greatest part of them have been; That by all means the Peace concluded with the Ottomans should be confirmed, and that according to what was stipulated, a solemn Embassy should be sent to the Port, to demand the Ratification of the same; That the Army which was raised on occasion of the War be disbanded, and the Moneys be raised for discharging the arrears due to the Soldiers; That peace be preserved with all our Neighbors, and former Treaties and Alliances confirmed; and that no new engagement be entered into, which may lead this Crown into a War; and that nothing be attempted against Moscovites till the Truce between them and us be expired. On Wednesday last died the eldest Princess, aged between four and five years; at which their Majesties and the whole Court are greatly afflicted. We are told, that after the Dyet is ended, their Majesties will take a journey to *Dantzicke*.

Madrid, Febr. 10. The King continues as yet at *Buen Retiro*, but purposes to return to the Palace so soon as the Queen is gone from thence, which will be in few days, orders having been sent to prepare the Palace at *Toledo* for her Majesties reception, she intending to retire thither. The King has appointed five Judges, who are to hear and determine the Process to be made against *Don Fernando de Valenzuela*, who is now deprived of the Title of Grandee, and that of Marquis de *Villa Sierra*, which was not long since conferred upon him. A Declaration has been likewise published, by which all persons are on very severe penalties commanded to discover whatever Goods, Jewels, &c. they know of belonging to *Don Valenzuela*. The King has declared the Cardinal of *Aragon*, President of the Council of *Aragon*, and Vicar-general of that Kingdom: Several great Officers have been removed from their charges, and those disposed of to others, who were before banished the Court. The Regiment of Guards is certainly designed for *Sicily*; and accordingly it is marching to the most convenient Port for its embarkation. We are told that several Men of War are fitting out with great diligence at *Cadix*, which together with those that are already in *Sicily*, will make a Fleet of above 40 Men of War, besides Gallies.

Vienna, Febr. 13. This week here arrived several Expresses from *Flanders*, and other parts, which hath given occasion to the frequent holding of Councils; where we hear it hath been resolved, that the Emperors Forces shall make all possible haste to take the Field. What we told you in our last concerning the Malecontents of *Hungary* having refused to submit themselves, notwithstanding his Imperial Majesty had granted them a general Pardon, proves true in some degree, that is, some parties of the said Malecontents continue to stand out, and to refuse all manner of submission, though we

have reason to hope that when they have thought better of it, they will think it their best way to follow the example of those of their Companions, who are already come in, and have accepted the Emperors Grace. The Estates of the *Lower Austria* are at present assembled here, the Emperor having demanded of them the Subsidies necessary for the defraying the expences of the War, of his Embassy to *Nimeguen*, &c. On Monday last the Envoy of the Duke of *Savoy* had Audience of their Imperial Majesties, being charged with a complement on the subject of their Marriage.

Genova, Febr. 17. The news we had of the loss of the Admiral and Vice-Admiral of the Spanish Squadron which lately sailed from *Final*, designed for *Sicily* is confirmed; of the Soldiers and Seamen that were on board the Admiral, 600 were drowned, and 200 of the ships Company of the other, and 20, who saved themselves in one of the Boats, had the misfortune to fall into the hands of the Turks. The remaining ships of the said Squadron are put into *Portlongone*, where, it's said they are blocked up by eight French Men of War.

Copenhagen, Febr. 16. This morning the Fleet *Tromp* took his leave of his Majesty, and to morrow will begin his journey towards *Holland* as well to look after some particular affairs of his own, as to hasten the Equipage of the Men of War which the States General of the United Provinces will join to our Fleet this Summer. What was said of Major General *Meerheims* having retaken several pieces of Cannon from the Enemy proves a mistake, as does likewise the report of the death of *Griffensfelt*. We are told that a design hath been formed on this side for the surprizing the Castle of *Helsingburg*, and that the execution thereof was committed to Lieutenant Colonel *Wortman*, but it succeeded not.

Hamburg, Febr. 26. From *Berlin* they write, that they continue to make great preparation in all the Electors of *Brandenburgs* Territories, in order to the taking the Field so soon as his Electoral Highness returns from *Wesel*. The Duke of *Lunenbug Zell* has given out several Commissions for the making of new Levies. The Duke of *Holstein Ploen* is gone to *Stade*, to confer with his Highness concerning the Succors he will send to the King of *Denmark*.

Cologne, Febr. 28. From *Alsace* they write, that the French are preparing to lay a Bridge over the *Rhine*, above *Brisac*, in order to the making incursions into *Brisgow*. At *Saverne* they continue to work for the preparing their Mines, which they are to make use of for the demolishing those Fortifications. By the last Ordinary from *Vienna*, we received Letters, which said, that the Rebels in *Hungary* having received a considerable Sum of Money from abroad, and promised of a further supply, had refused to submit themselves to the Emperor, which they had before declared themselves very willing too; and therefore had obtained his Imperial Majesties Pardon for all past Offences. We do not hear that the States of the Empire are likely to make choice of a Successor to the Marquis of *Baden Dowlach* in the command of the Forces of the Circles, for

for that those Troops will for the future act under the command of the Imperial Generals, not being numerous enough to form an Army alone; and it is even feared, that these Troops will not be so considerable this approaching Campaign as they were the last; several of the Circles complaining that their Countrey is extremely ruined by furnishing Winter-quarters, that they are not able to maintain the Forces which they would otherwise do.

Brussels, Febr. 26. His Excellency the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* having on Tuesday last received advice, that a Body of 4000 French Horse and Foot were to march under the command of the Count de *Nancro*, from *Enghezen* towards the Canal, ordered three pieces of Cannon to be discharged; which was the Signal to the Governours of *Malines* and of *Louvaine* to cause their Forces to march immediately towards the Canal; which they did, and came early thither on Wednesday morning; That morning his Excellency, accompanied with most of the Nobility, that was in Town, and attended by his Guards, went to a place called the *Three Hales*; which is in the mid-way between this City and *Vilvorde* on this side the Canal. His Excellency posted there part of *Belvederes*, the *Amirantes*, and the Dutch Marine Regiments, with orders to throw up earth for their defence. The *Mailtre de Camp* General went on to *Vilvorde*, to give the necessary orders there; the two Lieutenant Generals of the Cavalry was sent towards *Willbrooke*, with 600 Horse, and Viscount *Berlin* was posted at *Eahan* Bridge: his Excellency having thus disposed matters returned hither. And about four that afternoon the Enemies Vanguard appeared upon the Hill above *Lahun*, a party of which hastned to the Canal, to intercept a large Boat that was coming thither, laden with Corn; which the Master of the Vessel perceiving, run her on ground on the other side of the Canal, and the Dutch Soldiers, who were posted hard by, came presently to his assistance, and under the shelter of the Boat shot hard upon the French; in the interim the rest of the French Troops came up, and both sides continued to fire very smartly from seven a clock in the evening till eleven, when the Enemy finding they could not effect their design (which was by the help of their Positions to have passed the Canal, to have cut the Bank on this side, and to have broke the Sluice, and thereby wholly have interrupted our Commerce with *Anwerp*, &c.) they retired yesterday morning and marched back the same way they came to *Ach* and *Enghezen*, leaving behind them two Wagons with Spades, Pickaxes, &c. In this action the Major of *Belvederes* Regiment, two Spanish Captains, a Dutch Captain, and an English were wounded, with about 80 common Soldiers, and 11 or 12 killed. What loss the French have sustained we know not; but we are told they carried off their wounded in two Wagons. We have taken 20 Prisoners, and about 40 French Deserters are come hither, who say the French Forces are very much wearied with their frequent marches. We are assured from *Nivelles* that Count de *Mons* will dislodge from thence on Monday next, and that he will take his march with all his Troops towards *Mons*, where the Burgundian Regiment is safely arrived.

Hague, March 2. From *Groningen* we have an account, that on Friday last his Highness and the Commissioners of this State arrived there; and that there was a good appearance that the differences between this City and the *Ommelanden* would be composed in few days, when his Highness would immediately part from thence on his journey to *Wesel*, where the Elector of *Brandenburg* is supposed to be arrived by this time.

The Minister of the Dukes of *Brunswicke* and *Lunen-burg* has made new instances to the States to desire them to employ their Offices for the obtaining the title and quality of Ambassadors for the Ministers those Princes would send to the Treaty at *Nimeguen*. From *Flanders* we have an account, that the Spanish and Dutch Troops which were posted by the Duke de *Villa Hermosa* between *Brussels* and *Vilvorde*, for the security of the Canal, had repulsed the French, who came thither under the command of the Count de *Nancro*, Governor of *Aeth*, with design to have cut certain Sluices, that are there; and that the generality of people were greatly encouraged at this success in the beginning of the Campaign. This place is at present almost filled with Officers, who are finishing their Equipages, and providing Wagons and other Carriages, in which they make the more diligence, for that they must be at the Rendezvous at *Rosendaet* the 10 or 12 of this month. His Highness is expected back here in few days; he will not make any stay in this place but hasten to the Army; and the more for that according to the advice we receive from France, the King intended to part from thence the 28th of

Paris, March 3. On Sunday last, according as we told you in our former, the King began his journey towards the Spanish Netherlands, his Majesty lodging that night in a Village on the other side of *Comigne*; since yesterday it has been all the discourse of the Town, that the King is gone to besiege *Valenciennes*, and some have gone so far, as to pretend to have advice, that the place is already invested. The Duke of *Orleans* intended to have parted to-morrow; but at present we understand, that his journey is put off till Sunday next. It is said he will besiege *Sz Omer* at the same time that the King is making the Siege of *Valenciennes*. The Queen will be here to-morrow, and will continue in this City the greatest part of Lent. The Letters we receive from *Genova*, confirm what we told you in our last, of the Admiral and Vice-Admiral of the Spanish Squadron that was going from *Final* to *Sicily*, being cast away, and near 1000 men drowned. We have not any news from the Count d'Esrees since his passing by the *Canary Islands*. It is not doubted but he is gone for the *West Indies*, and it is not improbable he may meet with the Dutch Squadron of Men of War which is in those parts, under the command of the Sieur *Bimbi*. From *Madrid* they write, that *Don Fernand de Valenzuela* is accused of capital Offences, and that Process is forming against him thereupon; that several persons of quality are daily banished from Court; that the Queen still remains in the Palace at *Madrid*, but it was believed her Majesty would suddenly retire to *Toledo*.
