YESTERDAY in the Afternoon the magnificent Tournament, for which Preparations have been making for some Time past, began in a large open Place in the Southern Suburb of this City. Previous to the Solemnity an Ordinance was published by the Grand Governor for maintaining good Order during the Festival.

We have received Advice from Christineham, a Town celebrated for its Iron Fair, that on the 25th of this Month a Fire broke out there about Three o'Clock in the Morning, which had almost entirely consumed the Town, and was still burning when the Post came away at Nine in the Evening.
