**Y**ESTERDAY in the Afternoon the magnificent Tournament, for which Preparations have been making for some Time past, began in a large open Place in the Southern Suburb of this City. Previous to the Solemnity an Ordinance was published by the Grand Governor for maintaining good Order during the Festival.

We have received Advice from Christineham, a Town celebrated for its Iron Fair, that on the 25th of this Month a Fire broke out there about Three o'Clock in the Morning, which had almost entirely consumed the Town, and was still burning when the Post came away at Nine in the Evening.

You are defaired to desist from Such an Atemp of trublin and oprecing the Contry for if you persist on that you shall be mead to suffer to the outmost Deegre for your hous shall be burnt to ashes and your oun body mead a vefabel spectikel of petty so you are defaired before freadie first put a stope to this oprecon or to do it pon that Day bay publishing it theropoun or as soure there is Souch thing as you have death to meat with this shall be your feat for the Country has born long but thy Can bear no longer for on oprecon after another it is aunplicable to bear so it is hoped you will remember your feat for you may depende on the out most extremity of suffring for there is no remedy for if you go on in ethere to get out orders to imprisone to opres bay What you Call poundin so it is hoped that you will teak warnig and louk to your Selse for the out most rouine is determed for you

**T**HE Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having appointed Money for paying Half Pay to Sea Officers, from the 1st Day of July, to the 31st of December, 1776, according to His Majesty's Establishment in that behalf; These are to give Notice, that the said Payment will begin to be made at the Pay-Office of the Treasurer of the Navy in Broad-Street, on Tuesday the 17th and Wednesday the 18th Instant, at Ten o'Clock in the Morning, viz. To Captains and their Attorneys, and other Officers appearing themselves, on Tuesday; and to Attorneys of Lieutenants, Masters and Surgeons, on Wednesday, (after which the List will be recalled once a Month) that all Persons may then and there attend to receive what may become payable unto them, and not only bring with them the Affidavit required touching their not having enjoyed the Benefit of any Publick Employment, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they are to be paid their Half-Pay; but also produce Certificates that they have subscribed to the Test, and taken the Oath required by Act of Parliament to His present Majesty; and in Case any of the said Sea Officers shall not be able to attend themselves to receive their Money, but employ Attorneys for that Purpose, these the said Attorneys may produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Persons they are employed by.
