A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

For continuing the Encouragements to Seamen who shall enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War, and the Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; and also for giving Encouragement to such Able-bodied Landmen who shall enter into His Majesty's Service at Sea.

WHEREAS, by Our Royal Proclamation, dated the 23th Day of October last, intituled, A Proclamation for encouraging Seamen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War, We were graciously pleased to promise, That every Able Seaman, and every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, fit for Our Service, who should voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, on or before the 31st Day of December last, in such Manner as in Our said Proclamation is required, should respectively receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the respective Sums expressed in Our said Proclamation; (that is to say) Every Able Seaman the Sum of Five Pounds, and every Ordinary Seaman the Sum of Two Pounds Ten Shillings, in lieu of all other Bounties mentioned in Our Proclamation dated the 22^d Day of March then last, and Our Orders in Council of the 1st of May, the 21st of June, and the 21st of August following; and whereas, by Our subsequent Proclamation, dated the 8th Day of November last, intituled, A Proclamation for recalling and prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States; and for granting Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; We did further promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for Our said Service, by any of Our Sea Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the said 31st Day of December last; the said Rewards to be paid in such Manner as in Our said last-mentioned Proclamation is directed: And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards hath been prolonged and extended to the 31st Day of this instant August; and it being judged expedient for Our Service, that the said Bounties and Rewards should continue to be paid for some Time longer, and that Encouragement should be given to Able-bodied Landmen to enter into Our Service at Sea; We do therefore, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council,

hereby promise and declare, That the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties to such Seamen as shall voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, and Rewards for discovering such Seamen who shall conceal themselves, shall be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this instant August to the 31st Day of October next: And We do hereby further promise and declare, That every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall voluntarily enter themselves to serve on Board any of Our Ships, on or before the said 31st Day of October next, shall receive, as of Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man; all which respective Sums are hereby required to be paid in the Manner directed by Our aforesaid Proclamations.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 21st Day of May last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23^d of this instant August: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22^d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23^d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April last, and the 13th of this instant August, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions: and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and comma d, that no Person or Persons whomsoever (except the Master-

Master-General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the said 23d Day of this instant August, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April last, and the 13th of this instant August, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition" — And the Lords Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Peterburg, July 29. On Sunday last her Imperial Majesty gave a publick Audience on the Throne, to the Six Tartar Envoys, the Chief of whom made a Speech to the Empress in the Tartar Language; a Translation of which being read, the Vice-Chancellor returned a gracious Answer in her Imperial Majesty's Name. The same Evening the Empress returned to Peterhoff, from whence her Imperial Majesty had come to Town on Saturday Evening.

Vienna, August 7. His Imperial Majesty set out last Night for the Camp in Stiria, accompanied by the Archduke Maximilian. From thence the Emperor intends going to the Camp at Pest, and is not expected back till about the 25th Instant.

Brussells, August 22. The Apprehensions, which had been raised in these Provinces on Account of the Harvest, are now happily removed, as it is almost entirely got in, and is supposed to exceed in Quantity those of the two preceding Years by nearly a Fifth Part.
