Ratisbonne, March 3. Yesterday arrived here Signior *Beuilacqua*, the Popes Nuncio, and in a day or two will continue his journey to *Nimeguen*. The Imperialists are preparing to take the Field, which they will do so soon as the season is proper. From *Hungary* they write, that many of the Hungarians come in, and submit themselves daily.

Strasburg, March 7. The Suisse Cantons are still assembled at *Baden*, not having as yet resolved on the answer to be returned to the instances made by the French Ambassador, concerning their not permitting any Troops to pass through their Territories, though in the mean time the said Cantons have it's said resolved to arm, and put themselves in a posture capable to secure them against the resentment of either side, which they may happen to displeas by the resolution they shall think fit to take. The French continue to work for the demolishing the Citadell of *Saverne*, where the Sieur de *Monclar*, lately declared the Kings Lieutenant General in *Alsace*, at present is, to hasten the said work. From *Nancy* they write, that they likewise continued to work with great diligence to perfect the Fortifications of that City, that the Marechal *Crequi* was gone from thence to *Metz*, being appointed to command the Kings Forces on the side of the *Moselle* this Campaigne. From *Vienna* they write, that many of the Hungarians are come in, and submit themselves daily, upon the publication of the Emperors Pardon; and that those that continue in arms are very inconsiderable; That Count *Montecuculi* purposed to begin his journey from *Vienna* to the Army about the latter

end of this month, and that there was great appearance that the marriages which hath been so often spoken of between the Queen Dowager of *Poland* the Emperors Sister, and the Duke of *Lorraine*, would be suddenly concluded.

Cologne, March 12. The Troops of the Bishop of *Osnabrug*, which are quartered in this Diocess, have received orders to hold themselves ready to march; in order to which they have summoned the Countrey to pay the arrears of the Contributions demanded by them. The Elector of *Brandenburg* is still at *Hann*, though he is so well recovered as to be able to part from thence to *Wesel* about the end of this week. From *Francfort* they write, that the Imperial Troops begin to march from several parts, in order to the giving the French a diversion, who we are told have at present most of their Forces in *Flanders*. From *Metz* our Letters advise, that the Marechal *Crequi* having notice thereof, was likewise preparing on his part to oppose them, and accordingly was drawing all the Troops he could together.

Hague, March 13. The tenth instant the States of *Holland* were again assembled, in order to the raising the Moneys necessary for the supporting the charges of this Campaigne. Yesterday the Regiment of Guards of Foot, consisting in 24 Companies, marched from hence, being led by their Colonel the Count de *Solmes*, in order to their embarking on the Vessels that are to transport them to the place of Rendezvous, whither all our Cavalry marches by Land. The States General have finally resolved upon the report made to them by the Deputies of the Admiralties, that 15 Men of War, 3 Fireships, and 3 Gallions, shall be forthwith fitted out, to act in the *Baltick*, in conjunction with the Danish Fleet. On the 18 instant will be performed at *Amsterdam* the Funerals of the late Lieutenant Admiral de *Ruyter*, with great Pomp and Solemnity.

Ditto, March 16. His Highness having been the 14 instant in the Assembly of the States of *Holland*, and yesterday in that of the States General, to take his leave of them, parted from hence this afternoon towards *Cleves*, where he will have a Conference with the Elector of *Brandenburg* and the Bishop of *Osnabrug*, and that done, his Highness will part to his Army in *Flanders*, which in the mean time is marching thither, under the command of Count *Waldeck*. The Sieur *Meyercreon* the Danish Envoy here, has given in a Memorial to the States, in which he desires they will permit him to raise in these Countreies a certain number of Seamen for the service of the King his Master; to which the States have not as yet given any answer; but in the mean time have ordered that the Equipage for the *Balticke* be proceeded in with all diligence. From *Germany* they write, that the Duke of *Lorraine* had received positive orders from the Emperor forthwith to march with such Regiments as he could conveniently draw together, without losing too much time, and to pass the *Rhine*; some add, that his Highness will come down with the said Forces towards *Flanders*;

ders; but this is certain, that very considerable Magazines are providing at *Trèves* and *Luxemburg*, for the use of the said Imperial Troops. We are told that a considerable Sum of Money hath been remitted hither from *Spain*, for the paying the arrears due to the Admiralties, on account of the last Equipage for the *Mediterranean*.

Brussels, March 16. This morning his Excellency the Duke de *Villa Hermosa*, received advice from the Duke d' *Archat*, Governor of *Mons*, that the Enemy make no great progress in the Siege of *Valenciennes*, being much incommoded by the weather, which though it be fair, yet is so exreme cold, that the Soldiers suffer extremely; and besides, that their Cavalry begins to have some want of *Forage*. That they have four Batteries, which play incessantly upon the Town, and have done some execution, having set several houses twice on fire in the Town, which was soon quenched by the industry of the Burghers, who have taken all imaginable care to provide against such accidents, by unpaving the Streets, and making Channels in them, which they keep full of Water, &c. That the Besiegers direct their principal attack upon the Hornwork, on *Mount Auxine*, and have endeavoured to gain the Counterscarp of the same, but have been repulsed with considerable loss; and among others we are told, that the *Sieur du May*, Lieutenant General of the French Artillery, and the *Marquis de Chamilly*, with other persons of quality have been killed; and we are in great hopes here, that the Enemy will find this Siege a work of difficulty, especially if the Burghers continue the same courage and resolution they have hitherto shown to defend the place to the last. Yesterday arrived here an Express from *Germany*, bringing Letters from the Duke of *Lorraine*, dated the tenth instant, at his quarters at *Esslingen*, in which he assures his Excellency, that he would march the next day with several Imperial Regiments of Horse, making in all about 10000 men, towards the *Rhine*, which he intended for the greater conveniency to pass at several places, and having joined several Troops of the Electors of *Mentz* and *Trèves*, would endeavor to fall into *France*, and to give the French a diversion. This news is extremely pleased this Court, which hopes that the Most Christian King will be by this means obliged to send part of the Forces, now employed in the Siege of *Valenciennes* towards *Germany*. From *Bergen-op Zoom* we have likewise advice, that all the Dutch Infantry was embarked there, in order to their passing to the place of Rendezvous, the Cavalry marching by Land, under the command of Count *Waldeck*. The Letters we receive from the parts about *St Omer*, tell us, that the Enemy had indeed possessed themselves of two small Redoubts, which are about a quarter of a League from the Town, in the taking whereof the *Marquis de Genlis* was among others killed on the part of the French, but that the Prince of *Roebucke*, Governor of the place doubted not but to be able to retake the same in few days; the Letters add, that the French had quitted *Cassel*, and other Posts formerly taken by them for the blocking up of *St Omer*.

Dino, March 16. Yesterday arrived the Spanish Ordinary, and brought Bills of Exchange for a very considerable Sum of Money, which, it is said, is to be disposed towards the satisfying our Allies, as to the arrears of Subsidies which remain due to them; by this Ordinary we have advice, that the Troops which were marching towards *Catalonia*, had been recalled; That the *Marquis de Villa Sierra*, who is still kept prisoner at *Castellón*, had confessed several matters of very great consequence to the Confessor of *Don Juan*; that the Admiral of *Castile* was deprived of that Charge and Title; and that the Queen had desired liberty to continue forty days longer

at *Madrid*, which the King had consented to. Here is arrived the Baron de *Levy vike*, who is going for *England*, with the quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the King of *Spain*. This night Count *Waldeck* will be with the Prince of *Orange's* Army between *Antwerp* and *Bergen-op Zoom*, and we expect his Highness in few days in these parts, he intending to leave the *Hague* as this day.

Ghent, March 17. According to the relations we have here of the Siege of *Valenciennes*, it does not advance so fast as the French seemed to have promised themselves it would before they undertook it, as well through the brave defence made by the Besieged, as well the Soldiers as the Burghers, as through the incommodity of the weather, which makes the Soldiers suffer extremely in the Camp. The Besiegers fire upon the Town from four Batteries, and they within are not wanting to answer them in the same kind. It is said that the French have made two attacks upon the Counterscarp of the Hornwork, on *Mount Auxine*, and that they have been repulsed with great loss, though this morning it is said they have gained a point of the said Counterscarp, and that they push on their attacks with great vigor; however, we doubt not, if the Burghers continue their resolution to defend the place to the last, but the Enemy will have work enough, and that if at last they take the place, it will cost them dear. In few days we shall be able to make a better judgment concerning the success of this Siege.

Paris, March 17. The Letters we receive from the Camp before *Valenciennes*, give an account, that the Siege was pushed on with great vigor, that with their Cannon and Bomb they did great execution upon the Town, that they had gained the Counterscarp, and that they hoped to be suddenly Masters of the place. In *Germany* the Imperial Troops begin to move, and the *Marschal de Crequi*, who is at *Metz*, is preparing on his part to oppose their designs. The *Marquis de Genlis* is killed in a skirmish between a party of our Troops and a like party of the Garrison of *St Omer*. From *Madrid* they tell us, that the Queen seemed desirous to retire to *Germany*, and that she had written to the Emperor about it.
