We are told that a confiderable Sum of Mony hith been remitted hither from Spain, for the paying the arrears due to the Admiralies, on account of the last Equipage for the Mediterranean.

Bruffels, March 16. This morning his Excellency the Duke de Villa Hermofa, received advice from the Duke d'Arschot, Governor of Mons, that the Enemy make no great progress in the Siege of Valenciennes, being much incommoded by the weather, which though it be fair, yet is so ex reme cold, that the Soldiers suffer extremely; and belides, that their Cavalry begins to have some want of Fanage. That they have four Batteries, which play incessanly upon the Town, and have done some execution, having fet several houses twice on fire in the Town, which was foon quenched by the industry of the Burghers, who have maken all imaginable care to provide against such accidents, by unpaving the Streets, and making Channels in them, which they keep full of Water, &r. That the Beliegers direct their principalattack upon the Hornwork, on Mount Auzine, and have endeavoured to gain the Counterscarp of the same, but have been repulsed with confiderable loss : and among others we are told, that the Sieur du Max Lieutenant General of the French Artillery, and the Marquis de Chamilly, with other persons of quality have been killed; and we are in great hopes here, that the Enemy will find this Siege a work of difficulty, efpecially it the Burghers continue the same courage and resolution they have hitherto shown to defend the place to the laft. Yesterday arrived here an Express from Germany, bringing Letters from the Duke of Lorrain, dated the tenth instant, at his quarters at Estingen, in which he affures his Excellency, that he would march the next day with feveral Imperial Regiments of Horse, making in all about 10000 men, towards the Rhine, which he intended for the greater conventiency to pass at several places, and having joined feveral Troops of the Electors of Mentz and Treves, would endeavor to fall into France, and to give the French a diversion. This news tas extremely pleased this Court, which hopes that the Med Christian King will be by this means obliged to fend part of the Forces, now employed in the Stege of Valenciennes towards Germany. From Bergen-op Zoom we have likewise advice, than all the Dutch Infantry was embarked there, in order to their passing to the place of Rendezvous, the Cavalry marching by Land, under the command of Count Waldeck. The Letters we receive from the parts about St Omer, tell us, that the Enemy had indeed possessed themselves of two small Redoubts, which are about a quarter of a League from the Town, in the taking whereof the Marquis de Genlis was among others killed on the part of the French, but that the Prince of Roebucke, Governor of the place doubted not but to be able to retake the same in few days; the Letters add, that the French had quitted Caffel, and other Posts formerly taken by them for the blocking up of St Omer.

Dina, March 16. The Besiegers fire upon the Town from four Batteries, and they within are not wanting to answer them in the same kind. It is said that the French have made two attacks upon the Counterscarp of the Hornwork, on Mount Augine, and that they have been repulsed with great loss, though this morning it is said they have gained a point of the faid Counterscarp, and that they push on their attacks with great vigor; however, we doubt not, if the Burghers continue their resolution to desend the place to the laft, but the Enemy will have work enough, and that if at last they take the place, it will cost them dear. In few days we shall be able to make a better judgment con-

cerning the success of this Siege.

Paris, Mach 17. The Letters we receive from the Carry before Valenciennes, give an accoung, that the Siege was puffed on with great vigor, that with their Cannon and Bombet they did great execution upon the Town, that they had gained the Counterscarp, and that they hoped to be suddenly Markers of the place.
