ders; but this is cerrain, that very confiderable Magazines are providing at Trives and Luxcmourg, for the the ufe of the fuid Imperial Troops. We are told that a confderable Sum of Mony hith been remited hither from Sptin, for the paying the arrears due to the Admiralies, on account of the laft Equipage for the Mcditcrranean.

Braffels, Marcbi6. This morning his Excellency the Duke de Vill. Hermofa, received advicefrom the Duke d'Arfihot, Governor of Mons, that the Enemy make no great progrefs in the Siege of Waleaciennes, bcing much incommoded by the weather, which though it be fair, yet is fo ex remesold, that the Soldiers fiffer extremely ; and befidcs, thar their Cavalry begins to have fome want of forrags. That they have four Batreries, which play inseffanly upon the Tonn, and bave done fome execution, taving fit feveral houfes twice on fre in the Town, which eas foon quacnched by he induftry of ahe Furghers, unto haveranken all imaginable care to provide againft fuch assidents, by unfaring the Streess, and making Channẹls in them, which they keep full of Water, dab. Thar the Befiegers direct the ir principalartack upon the Hornwoik, on Mount Auzine, and bave endeayoured to gain the Counterfcatp of the fame, bur have been repulfed with conliderable lofs: andemong others we are told, that the Sieur $d u$ Miy Iieutenant Genctal of the French Arrillery, and the Marquis de chamilly, with other perfons of qualicy have been killed; and we are in great hopes here, thak the Enepy will find this Siege a work of difficulty, efpecially jit the Burghers continne the fame courafe and xefolution they have hitherto hown to defend the place to the laft. Yellerday arrived here an Exprefs from Germany, bringing Letters from the Duke of Corrain, dated the tenth inltant, at his quarters at Elingen, in which he affures his Excellency, that he would march the nexr day with feveral Imperial Regiments of Horfe, making in all about 10000 men, tayards the $R$ hine, which he inended for the greater convediency to pars at leyeral places, and having joined feveral Troops of the Electors of Mentz and Treves, would endeavor to fall into France, and to give the Erench a diverfion. This news ian extremely pleafed this Court, which hopes that the $\mathrm{Ni}_{\mathrm{i}} \mathrm{At} \mathrm{Chriftian}$ King will be by this means obliged to fenl pait of the Forces, now employed in die Siege of Valenciennes towards Germiny. From Borgen-op Zoom we bave likewife advice, thatall the Dutch Infancry was embarked there, in order to their paling to the place of Rendezvous, the Cavalry marching by Land, under tos command of Count Waldeck. The Letters we receive from the parts about St Omer, tell us, thar the Enemy had indeed poffeffed themfelves of two fmall Redoubrs, which are about a quarter of a League from the Town, in the taking whereof the Marquis de Genlis was among othefs killed on the part of the French, but that the Frince of Roebucke, Governor of the place doubted not but to be able to rerake the fame in few days; the Leuters add, that the French had quitred cajfel, and other Pofts formerly taken by them for the blocking up of St Omer .

Ditro, Macly $\mathbf{\text { 26 }}$. Yefterday arrived the Spanifh Ordinaty, and brought Bills of Excharge for a very confiderable Sum of Mony, which, it s Caid, is to be difpofed cowards the farisfying our Allies, as to the arrears of Subfidies whick remain dpe to them ; by this Ordinary we have adviee that :he Troopsemich were marching towards Catalotia, had been recalled , Thar the Marguis de Villy Sierra, who is ftill kept prifonct al Confuegra, had confeffed feveral matters of very great confequence to the Confeffor of Don funif ; that the Admiral of ciftile was deprived of that Obargeand Title; and that wie Queen had defied liberty to confinue forty days longer

According to the relaticns ue have hare of the Siege of $W_{a}$ le wiciernes, it dorsmot advance fo fall as the French feemed to bave promifed themfelves it would before they undertock it, as well thre ugh the brave defence made by the Befieged, as well the Soldiers as the Burghers, as through the itcommodity of the weather, which makes the Soldiers fuffer expremely in. the Cimp. The Befiegers fire uron the Town from four Batteries, and they within ate not wanting to anfwer them in the fame kind. It is faid that the French hive made two atracks upoh the Counterfarp of the Hornwork, on Mount $A$ utive, and that troy have been. repulfed with great loff though this* morning it is faid they have gained a point of the faid Counterfcarp, and that shey puifh on their attacks with great vigor ; however, we doubt not, if the Burghers continue their refolution to defend the place to the laft, bur the Enemy will have, work enough, and that if at laft they take the place, is will cof them dear. Iri fgiw days we thall be able to make a better judgment concerning the fuccefs of this Siege.
Paris, Maicb 17. The qetters we receive from the Catr $p$ before Valenciennes, give an accpunf, that the siege was pufhe ed on with great vigor, that with their Camon and, Bombet they did great execution upon the Town, that they had gained the Councer ( $¢$ arp, and that they boped to be fuddenly Mafers of the place.
