THIS Day being the Anniversary of the King's Accession to the Throne, who entered into the Eighteenth Year of His Reign, there was a numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty upon the Occasion. At One o'Clock the Guns in the Park, and at the Tower, were fired; and in the Evening there were Illuminations, and other Public Demonstrations of Joy, in London and Westminster.

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Proclamation of the Fifteenth Day August last, entitled, "A Proclamation for continuing the Encouragements to Seamen who shall enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War, and the Rewards for discovering such Seamen as shall conceal themselves; and also for giving Encouragement to such Able-bodied Landmen who shall enter into His Majesty's Service at Sea," will expire on the 31st Day of this instant October: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Bounties and Rewards should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, That the Time limited by His Majesty's aforementioned Proclamation, for Payment of the Bounties and Rewards therein mentioned, be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first Day of this instant October to the Thirty-first Day of December next, inclusive. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
