*Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Gayton, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Jamaica, to Mr. Stephens, dated on Board the Antelope in Port Royal Harbour, Jamaica, September 7, 1777.*

**T**HE Number of Rebel Vessels taken by His Majesty's Ships under my Command at present amounts to One Hundred and Sixty-two.

The Spanish Ambassador at this Court is gone to Badajos, to receive the Queen-Mother, and to introduce to her the Persons, whom the King of Spain has sent thither, to conduct her Majesty through the rest of her Journey.
