THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons, by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them that the Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great-Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces while on Shore.

An Act for the better Supply of Mariners and Seamen to serve in His Majesty's Ships of War, and on Board Merchant Ships, and other Trading Ships and Vessels.

An Act for repairing the Highways and Bridges in the County of Wigtown.

An Act to enable His Majesty to license a Theatre in the City of Bristol.

An Act to continue and enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Thirtieth Year of the Reign of King George the Second, for building a Bridge over the River Lea, at or near a Place called Jeremy's Ferry; and for making, repairing and widening Roads from thence into the Great Roads at Snarebrook, in the County of Essex, and at Clapton, in the County of Middlesex.

An Act for taking down the Parish Church of Lilford, being a Vicarage united to the Rectory of Achurch, in the County of Northampton; and for repairing the Parish Church of Achurch aforesaid; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for continuing the Terms, and enlarging the Powers, of Two Acts, one passed in the Seventh and the other in the Eighth Years of His present Majesty's Reign, for repairing and widening the Roads from Oxford, over Botley Causeway, to Fifeild in the County of Berks, and Witney in the County of Oxford.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of several Acts passed in the Sixth and Twelfth Years of King George the First, the Twenty-eighth Year of His late Majesty, and the Ninth Year of His present Majesty, for repairing the Roads from Stevenage, in the County of Hertford, to Biggleswade, in the County of Bedford, and other Roads therein mentioned.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Twenty-fifth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing the Road leading from Long Horsley Bar or Gate, on the Post Road near the Town of Marpeth, by or through Long Horsley, Weldon Bridge, and Whittingham, to the River

Breamish, and from thence to Piercy's Crofs, in the County of Northumberland.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of several Acts, for repairing the Road from Highgate Gate-house, in the County of Middlesex, to Barnet Block-house, in the County of Hertford; and the Road from the Bear Inn in Hadley to the Angel in Enfield Chase; and also Cane-wood Lane, leading from Highgate to Hampstead, in the said County of Middlesex; and the Road beginning at Barnet Block-house, and ending at the Bear Inn in Hadley aforesaid.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Stokenchurch, in the County of Oxford, to Wheatley Bridge, and from the said Bridge to Enslow Bridge, and from Wheatley Bridge to the Mile-way, leading towards Magdalen Bridge, and from the Mile-way, leading from St. Giles's Church, near the City of Oxford, by Begbroke, to New Woodstock, in the said County.

An Act to enlarge the Term of an Act, passed in the Thirtieth Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing and widening the Road from Towcester, through Silverston and Brackley, in the County of Northampton, and Ardley and Middlesex Stoney, to Weston Gate, in the Parish of Weston on the Green, in the County of Oxford.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers, of an Act made in the Thirty-second Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing the Road from Wakefield to Austerlands, in the West Riding of the County of York.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of King George the Second, for repairing and widening the Road from the Bars at Boughton, within the Liberties of the City of Chester, to Whitchurch; and from thence to Newport, in the County of Salop, and other Roads in the said Act mentioned; and for making a Road of Communication from the said Road, between Whitchurch and Newport, to the present Turnpike Road from Newport aforesaid, to Eccleshall, in the County of Stafford.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Birches Brook to Buildwas Bridge, and from thence to join the Watling Street Turnpike Road at Tern Bridge, in the County of Salop.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of Three Acts of the Third and Seventeenth Years of the Reign of King George the Second, and the Tenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for repairing the Road leading from Galley Corner, adjoining to Enfield Chase, in the Parish of South Mimms, in the County of Middlesex, to Lemsford Mill, in the County of Hertford.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act, made in the 29th Year of the Reign of his late Majesty King George the Second, for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads leading from the Market-house, in the Town of Much Wenlock,

lock, in the County of Salop; and for amending, widening, and keeping in Repair, the Road leading from Glecton Hill to Cressage, in the said County. And to Twenty seven Private Bills.

P R E S E N T,

The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 23th Day of October 1776, to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st of December then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tencers as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy. And whereas His Majesty was also pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the 8th Day of November, 1776, to promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen, who might secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, by any of His Majesty's Sea-Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the 31st Day of December, 1776. And whereas His Majesty was likewise pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the 15th Day of August last, to promise and declare, That every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should voluntarily enter himself to serve on Board any of His Majesty's Ships, on or before the 31st Day of October then next, should receive as of His Majesty's Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, to be paid in Manner thereby directed. And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations, for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, hath been prolonged and extended to the 28th Day of this instant February; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Rewards should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said 28th Day of this instant February, to the 30th Day of April next, inclusive. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 7th Day of November last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23d of this instant February: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time

longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April, the 13th of August, and the 3d and 10th of October last, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whomsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the said 23d Day of this instant February, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April, the 13th of August, and the 3d and 10th of October last, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring, and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition" — And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Yesterday being the Day appointed by His Majesty for a General Fast and Humiliation, His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant proceeded in State to Christ Church, attended by several of the Nobility and Gentry, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commons of the City of Dublin, and escorted by a Squadron of Dragoons, where a most excellent Sermon, suitable to the Occasion, was preached by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Cork and Ross. The Sword of State was carried to and from Church by the Earl of Cavan. There were numerous Congregations in all the Churches and other Places of Worship throughout this City; and the Day was observed in the most devout and solemn Manner.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, on Sunday Night last, about Midnight, Nine or Ten armed Ruffians broke open and entered the Dwelling-house of Daniel Clewen, of Finchley in the County of Middlesex, Farmer, and violently assaulted the said Daniel Clewen, his Wife and Family, putting them in Fear of their Lives, and carried off a Quantity of Wearing Apparel, Linen, Plate, and Money, to a considerable Amount: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in breaking open and plundering the said House, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And whoever will apprehend, or give such Notice at the Public-Office in Bow-street as may be the Means of apprehending, the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of FORTY POUNDS offered by Act of Parliament, on the Conviction of each, and shall receive TWENTY POUNDS Reward on the Conviction of the first of them, from the said Daniel Clewen.
