An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers, of an Act made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for repairing and widening the Roads therein mentioned, leading to and from the Towns of Shipton Malet and Iwelchester, in the County of Somerset, so far as the same relates to the Roads therein called the Iwelchester Turnpike Roads.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of King George the Second, for repairing and widening the Roads leading from the City of Gloucester towards Cheltenham and Tewkesbury, in the County of Gloucester.
