THE following Address having been transmitted by his Excellency the Earl of Buckinghamshire, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, to the Lord Viscount Weymouth, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been presented to His Majesty :

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in Parliament assembled, in the present critical Situation of Affairs, beg Leave humbly to approach your Majesty with the most unfeigned Assurances of Loyalty, Duty, and Attachment, to your Majesty's Royal Person and Government; and to declare, that, at a Time when the Public Tranquility is in Danger of being further disturbed by the Interposition of a Foreign Power, we feel ourselves called upon to take the earliest Opportunity of expressing our Zeal for the Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, and our earnest Wishes and warmest Regards for the Prosperity of Great Britain. We think it at this Time peculiarly incumbent on us to assure your Majesty, that your Majesty may rely with the greatest Confidence on the entire Affections of your faithful Subjects of Ireland; and depend on their co-operating cheerfully with your Majesty, to the utmost of their Ability, in asserting the Honour of your Majesty's Government, and establishing the Security of your Dominions.

A PROCLAMATION,

For Recalling and Prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We are informed, that great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation; and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever and wheresoever, (being Our natural born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they and every of them do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such Foreign Services, and return Home to their native Countries. And further We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever (being Our natural-born Subjects) from entering, and do charge and command them, and every of them, from henceforth to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State,

or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without Our special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience and exact Conformity. And We do hereby publish and declare, that the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do hereby declare, that if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Seafaring Men (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, they shall not be reclaimed by Us as Subjects of Great-Britain. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirtieth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-eight, in the Eighteenth Year of Our Reign.

A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS divers Persons have been guilty of the illegal Practices of clandestine importing and running of prohibited and uncustomed Goods, and thereby subjected themselves to great Penalties, for which some have been already convicted, and are in Execution for the same, and others are under Prosecution, and many more liable to such Penalties, to avoid which they abscond, or are gone into Foreign Parts, which has, or may prove the Ruin of themselves and their Families; and whereas they may yet be of Use to Us and their Country in the present Conjuncture of Affairs, by serving Us in Our Navy or Army, in case they are rendered capable thereof, by Our gracious Pardon; We being desirous of giving them an Opportunity of entering into Our Service, and in Hopes of putting a Stop by this Means in a great Measure to Practices pernicious to the Publick Interest, and destructive to the Persons and Families of so many of Our Subjects, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation; and We do hereby promise and declare, that in case any fit and able Person or Persons, who has or have incurred any Penalties in, by, or for the clandestine importing, running, landing, relanding, unhipping, concealing, or receiving, or being assisting in such running, landing, relanding, or unhipping any Prohibited Goods, Wares or Merchandizes, or any Goods liable to the Payment of the Duties of Customs or Excise or either of them, or who have been abused, obstructed, or hindered any Officer or Officers of the Customs or Excise in the due Execution of their Duty, or who are under any Prosecution, Judgment, Outlawry in Prison, or under or subject to any Execution for any of the said Offences, or gone beyond Sea to avoid the same, shall, on or before the Eleventh Day of May next, in case they are Seamen, voluntarily enter themselves as Sailors in Our Service, either with the Officers of Our Ships or Vessels of Our Royal Navy, or other Officers of Our Navy empowered to enter Men to serve on Board Our said Ships or Vessels, or, in case they are not Seamen, enlist themselves as Volunteers in Our Service as Soldiers or Marines; all and every such Person, and Persons shall have our gracious Pardon of and for all and every such Offence and Offences and Penalties, and all Indictments, Informations, Prosecutions, Convictions, Judgments, Imprisonments, Executions, and

that may arise or accrue for or by reason or means of any of the said Offences, or other Matters or Things aforesaid. Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirtieth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and Seventy-eight, in the Eighteenth Year of Our Reign.

Admiralty Office, April 4, 1778.

By a Letter received from Vice-Admiral Gayton, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships at Jamaica, dated the 15th of January last, it appears, the Number of American Prizes taken at that Time by the Ships of his Squadron amounted to Two Hundred and Nineteen.

Captain Cumming, of His Majesty's Ship the Aurora, writes, in a Letter from Barbadoes, dated the 14th of January, that he had the Day before fallen in with and taken the St. Peter, a Rebel Privateer, commanded by Samuel Chace, of 18 Guns, 6 Pounders, and 130 Men: The said Privateer had been from Martinico Five Weeks on a Cruise, and taken the Industry, — Darling, Master, from London to Barbadoes.

Captain Colpoys, of His Majesty's Ship Seaford, in a Letter dated Barbadoes the 20th of January, gives an Account of his having taken on the 18th, the General Washington Brig, fitted out by the Congress, mounting 18 Guns, 4 Pounders, as many Swivels, and 130 Men:

Memel, March 17. The Distemper among the Horned Cattle in Lithuania has ceased for several Weeks; and the Importation of Raw Hides is again permitted into his Prussian Majesty's Dominions from Lithuania.

Vienna, March 17. Yesterday Count Thierheim, Captain of the German Guards, and Prince Kinisky, late Grand Master of Artillery, were declared Field-Marsbals.

Vienna, March 21. Last Night, at a Drawing-Room in the Apartment of the Archduchess of Milan, where their Imperial Majesties were present, the Nobility and Foreign Ministers had the Honour of paying their Court to their Royal Highnesses, whose Departure for Milan is fixed for Monday next.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the King, That there are at this Time several Deserters from the different Corps in His Majesty's Land Service, who might be induced to return to their Duty by an Offer of His Majesty's gracious Pardon; and that such an Instance of His Royal Clemency would have due Influence upon their future Behaviour: His Majesty is pleased to grant His Free Pardon to all Deserters from His Land Forces, who shall surrender themselves before the 11th Day of May next, either to the Regiments to which they belong, or to some other Corps in His Majesty's Service, or to any Additional Company or Recruiting Party in Great Britain or Ireland.

Such Deserters, if able-bodied Men and fit for Service, shall be attested in the Corps to which they

belonged, and not be claimed to be claimed by any other Corps to which they may have formerly belonged.

And whereas many of the said Deserters may have enlisted in other Corps, and are now serving therein: His Majesty is graciously pleased to extend to such Deserters the Benefit of this Pardon; and to direct that they shall continue to serve in the Corps wherein they now are, and not be claimed by that in which they formerly served.

And whereas several of the said Deserters have been apprehended, and are now in Goal, or in Regimental Custody: His Majesty is likewise pleased to grant to them His Free Pardon, of which they are to have the Benefit, upon their Arrival at their respective Regiments, or upon their being enlisted by some other Corps or Recruiting Party.

Any Soldier who may desert, after these His Majesty's most gracious Intentions are made public, shall not be included in the above Pardon, but be proceeded against with the utmost Severity.

John the Painter P S these hand Bills must be up Before the Judge goes out of town.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in Writing or Sending the said Threatening Letter, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
