Though we lament the approaching Horror of War, and earnessly beseech the Almighty that the Olive Branch of Peace may be extended over every Part of your wide Dominions; our firm Considence in your Majesty's Wisdom and Justice impels us to declare, that we are ready to promote every Measure that shall be necessary to secure the Honor and Dignity of your Throne, and advance the Safety and Happiness of your People.

E, the High Sheriff, Representatives, Gentlemen, Clergy, and Freeholders of the County of the County of Dublin, humbly beg Leave to approach your Majesty with the most unfeigned Assurances of that Loyalty, Duty, and Affection to your Majesty's Person and Government, which we flatter ourselves have at all Times distinguished your Majesty's faithful Subjects of this County.

Though we trust our Attachment and Fidelity to your Majesty cannot be doubted, yet we think it incumbent on us to renew the Expressions of them at this important Crisis; and we beseech your Majesty to be assured, that the Persidy of France serves only to animate our Minds, if possible, with additional Zeal against the natural Enemies of our

King and Country.

Should that restless Nation direct her ambitious Projects towards this Kingdom, we have no Doubt but that she will find it protected by the paternal Care of a just and affectionate Prince, and defended by the Efforts of a brave and united People.

If the Wisdom of the Legislature shall think proper to arm us with the constitutional Assistance of a well regulated Militia, we have no Doubt that it will contribute much to repel any Attack that may

be attempted against this Country.

Unanimity is the Basis of Victory; we therefore affure your Majesty, that whenever the Domestic Tranquillity of Great Britain or this Kingdom shall be threatned or disturbed, your Majesty will find us ready to stand forth and support, with our Lives and Fortunes, the Honour and Dignity of your Crown, and the Safety and Welsare of these Kingdoms.

E, the High Sherist, Grand Jury, and Gentlemen of the Country of Williams tlemen of the County of Weitmeath, full of the strongest Feelings of Loyalty and Affection, behold with Horror and Indignation the treacherous Schemes concerted by France, the natural Enemy to our Constitution and Liberty; maliciously tending to subvert the one and to destroy the other; not daring openly to support their Violation of Faith by the Strength or Bravery of their Forces, in a Time of profound Peace and Amity with your Majesty, they have infidiously fomented an unnatural Civil War in your Dominions, to avail themselves of the Calamity in which every State is involved that is divided in itself: We beg Leave humbly to assure your Majesty of our unshaken Fidelity and Attachment to your Royal Person and Government; and that, with our Lives and Fortunes, vigoroufly f fort every Measure, which may tend to affert

That we have read, with the utmost Indignation and Resentment, a Copy of the Declaration delivered by the French Ambassador to Lord Viscount Weymouth, and that we cannot but applaud the Measure taken by His Majesty in Consequence of that offensive Communication on the Part of the Court of France, in sending Orders to his Ambassador

fador to withdraw from that Court.

That, confiding in His Majefty's paternal Attachment to the Welfare of His People, and His spirited Regards for the Honour of His Crown, we make no Doubt but He will pursue such Measures as may effectually preserve and affert those great Objects; and that as we are conscious no Part of His Majesty's Dominions can exceed His faithful Subjects of Ireland in the most loyal Attachment to His Person and Government, so we are persuaded that His Majesty will extend His Royal Care and Attention to the effectual Protection and Desence of this Kingdom; and that we entreat his Excellency to assure His Majesty, that in so doing he may rely on the most zealous and affectionate Support of this House, and that we shall chearfully employ every Means in our Power to make good whatever Expence shall be necessarily incurred thereby, sincerely lamenting that our Abi-

lities
