And we further beg Leave to assure His Majesty, that, animated with a grateful Sense of the many Blessings we enjoy, and by that unremitting Zeal which this Kingdom has ever manifested in the Support of the just Rights of His Majesty's Crown, and the Welfare and Prosperity of our Country, we shall at all Times be ready, at the Hazard of our Lives and Fortunes, to stand forth in the Pub lick Defence, trusting, under Providence, His Majesty will find that there is a Strength and Spirit in His People, which will be found adequate not only to repel every Infult and Attack, but to affert and vindicate the Honor, the Dignity, and the Reputation of these Kingdoms.
