WE, the High Sheriff, Nobility, Representatives, Clergy, Freeholders and Gentlemen, of the County of Waterford, actuated by the most sincere and inviolable Attachment to your Majesty's Sacred Person and Government, humbly beg Leave to express the grateful Sense we entertain of the many Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's mild and auspicious Reign.

At a Time when the Tranquility of your Majesty's Reign is threatened to be further disturbed by the insidious Designs of a Foreign Enemy, we should be wanting in Duty to the best of Princes, did we neglect to assure your Majesty of our unshaken Loyalty and Fidelity.

Conscious that our Rights can alone be secure under your Majesty's Illustrious House, we shall most cheerfully, with our Lives and Properties, stand forth in Defence of our happy Constitution, and your Majesty's Crown; and we trust, under Providence, that such effectual Measures will be taken, as will render all Attempts of your Majesty's Enemies against the Peace of your Majesty's Kingdoms vain and fruitless.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs and Commonalty, of the Town of Carrickfergus, and of the County of the said Town.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs and Commonalty, of the Town of Carrickfergus, and of the County of the said Town, inheriting from our Ancestors a Spirit of Loyalty, and confirmed in it by Education and Habit, beg Leave, upon the present critical Occasion; humbly to approach the Throne, to assure your Majesty of our most hearty and unfeigned Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person, and to the Honour of your Crown; and to express our Joy at the Prospect now opened to us of seeing your Majesty's Reign distinguished by a Removal of those Restraints, under which the Commerce of your Majesty's faithful Subjects of Ireland hath hitherto unfortunately laboured. Though placed in a Situation remote from your Majesty's Person, yet feeling most sensibly the Influence of your Royal Virtues, we should esteem ourselves criminal, if we omitted this Opportunity of testifying our Gratitude for the Blessings which we enjoy under your Majesty's Government. In a Time of common Danger, it is the Duty of every Subject of the Empire to offer his Assistance for the Defence of its just Rights; and we think it a Duty peculiarly incumbent on our Corporation, whose Sufferings and Services in the Cause of Constitutional Government have procured to it many signal Favours from your Majesty's Royal Progenitors, Monarchs of this Realm. In Testimony whereof, we have caused the Common Seal of our Corporation to be hereunto annexed, this 12th Day of May, 1778.
