tended the Frigate that engaged the Arethufa ; upon his requefling the Commander of her to stand to the Fleet, he made him Anfwer, that he fhould do as the Frigate did; and, upon the Frigate's firing upon the Arethufa, fired his Guns into the Alert; Captain Fairfax immediately run on Board of him, and they continued in that Situation in clofe Fight, upwards of an Hour, when the French Veffel Iurrendered. Captain Fairfax killed him five Men, and mortally wounded feven; the Alert had four Men wounded, two of them, it is apprehended, mortally.

Several French Merchant Ships passed through the Fleet Yesterday unmolested : I did not think proper in anywife to interrupt them in their Com-Ushant was then in Sight from the Mastmerce. head.

# ( C O P Y. ) Victory, at Sea, June 20, 1778.

-SIR,

E ARLY in the Morning of the 18th, a Ship in the N. W. Quarter was feen flanding into the Fleet, but foon hauled away : The Foudroyant, Courageux, and Robuft, were fent in Pursuit of her; and having repaired, as well as Time would permit, the Milford's Damages, which the received by the French Frigate's having, while in Converfation, sheered on board her, she was likewise sent in Chace. In the Morning of the 19th, the Profer-pine had joined, whom I also directed to chace 3 very light Winds, and Easterly: Before Twelve, the Frigates and other Ships were drawn close up with the Chace, a French Frigate, and the Signal being made to the Ships to bring the Chace into the Fleet, fhe was brought in accordingly, the French Officer having no Means whatever to avoid what has happened to him. From the Behaviour of the French Frigate the Licorne on the 18th in the Morning, I judged it my Duty to detain this Ship likewife. I directed Captain Hood, of the Robust, to take the Officers out of the Ship, and distribute the Crew among the Ships with him ; inftructing him to fignify to the French Captain, that I was under the Necessity of taking this Step from the extraordinary Conduct, of the Captain of the Licorne ; at the fame Time recommended to Captain Hood to take Care, that nothing but the civilest Treatment should pass towards the French Officers and their People, and every Thing taken Care of on Board the Frigate : She is called the Pallas, of 32 Guns and 220 Men; and, as well as could be learnt, had been eight Days from Breft I am, SIR, on a Cruize.

Fully perfuaded that the fole Object of your Ma-jefly's Ambition is to render all your People happy, and that your tender Concern for the Welfare of your Subjects will suggelt such Means as are ade-quate to the Importance and Difficulty of the pre-Tent Circumstances, we take the earliest Opportu-tunity to declare, that we will, to the utmost of our Ability, do every Thing, on our Part, to preferve the publick Peace, and repel the Attempts of every Enemy.
