Plymouth, Jan. 1. A small Vessel arriving here in fix:cen daies from Bourdeaux informes us, that 40 fail of French ships lay then ready laden with Victualls bound for Brest, with two Dutch Convoys, one a ship of 14 Guns, the other of 26 Guns, besides sour Fireships. He farther tells us, that at Conquest there are two Fregats, one of 60, the other of 40 Guns bound for Callisswith a Fleet of 60 fail of French Merchant ships under their Convoy.

By out Relident in the Ottoman Court, we are informed, That the Grand Visier intends in person to go for Candia, omitting no expences for the effectual profecution of that War. He has lately sens orders to the Visier at Buda, to summon in the leveral Bassa's to Greechisch-Weissemburg, to take order for all sorts of Military preparations; but with what defign, is net yet known.

Venice, Decemb. 24. On Munday last, according to appointment, Signior Dominico Ballarino, entred upon his charge of High Chancellor. Signfor Morefini intends the next week to embarque for the Armata, and with him feur Gentlemen that are by the Senate designed to be enrolled amongst the Nobility, being persons of great abilities, and have formerly ferved this Republick in very eminent charges; besides these, many Colonels, and other Officers, go Voluntiers to le.ve under the command of Signior Moresimi.

Some Vessels lately arrived from Zante, advise us, That Signior Molino with a Squadron of fix ships, is now attending at Corfu, to convoy the fleet cut some time fince under the command of Semitecolo, with Provisions for the Armata: They likewise tell us, that two large Saichs laden with Horses, were taken by some of our Vessels in their passage from Napoli di Romania to Canea.

By Letters from Candia of the nineteenth palt, we are affured, but the Grand Visier is arrived in Canea, and received with much joy by the Turks, which they testified by three days continual feathing.

They now give out, that as foon as the feafon of the year will permit them to take the field, they intend to lay a close fiege to Candia; to which end, they are already preparing their Cannon, and all other necessaries for that enter-
