occasions confirmed by himself. He afterwards proceeded to the main business concerning Gastro, which he earnestly preised in behalf of the Dake of Parma, which the Pope seemed to refer to a consultation of Cardinal, as soon as the other great affairs that highly concern the interest of Christendom will permit him; which at present take up all the time, that by reason of his indisposition he is able to allot for business; but promised his endeavors to satisfie the delires of the French King, and in due time to comply with him in behalf of the Said Duke.

This week his Holinels appeared in the Confistory with much more health and vigor then was expected from him; where Don Sigismundo was formerly declared his Nephew, his family being accordingly established, and himself employed in visiting the Colledge of Cardinals. The Pope has likewise made him Gran Crece of Maltha, in which charge he succeeds the Carcinal Antonio Barbarini, lately promoted to be Grand Prior of Rome. He has also preferred the Mafter of his Chamber Monfi for Ciaja, to the title of Prior of Ireland; the Cardinal Landigrave of Hesse, formerly created by his Imperial Majesty, Protector of the Empire, is also by the Emperor honored with the Protection of Hungary, and by the Queen Regent of Spain, made Protector likewile

Stragon, Valenza, Catolonia, and Majorca. Na les, Decemb. 14. The Duke de Ferrandina, General of the Gallies of Sicily, is preparing with all possible speed the Gallies designed for Genoua, to attend the Duke of Albuquerque, and if the wind ferve them, may put to

Sea this night.

The great stormes we have lately had upon these Coasts, have done much jujury to the Merchants especially upon the Coasts of Calabria and Sicily, to the wrecking of at the least forty Merchants, several of them richly laden, and amongst them five Tartanes that lately went from this place, one of them laden with Oyles, the other four with Corne belonging to several Merchants.

From Sicily we are informed, that by realon of the great Raynes the City of Palermo, has suffered much damage by a great and sudden inundation, which has thrown down some of the houses, and made great spoil in G ods and Provisions, and drowned several persons, especially those Prisoners that were secured in the Suburbs, and were unable to save them-

Clves by flight.

On Sunday, November theseventh, there hapned an unusual and lamentable accident to the City of Sciorthino, about eighteen miles distant from Syracuse, belonging to the Prince di Cessaro, and the Marquels di Seristino of Gaetta. The City being scituated on the side of an high Mountain, consisting of a foft and mouldring stone, it hapned that a great piece of the Rock that had long hung over them, breaking loose from its place; in its descent, bare down before it about 100 Houses of that City, and with their ruines, destroyed about 500 persons, with a Church, together with the Priests and Singing-men, and many of the Layety that were then at Mais: The greater part of the Houses, having for their conveniences, Gellers and Caves made in the Mountian, several voices of men have been fince the ruine of the, Houles heard from them: as also under the place where this moving Rock fixed it self, several of them have been with great care and labor, drawn out and preserved, but some of them are shut

up without possibility of being recovered.

Another part of the same Mountain seems to threaten the City with the like danger, which the Citizens by their past calamity, being grown very apprehensive off, are to the number of about 7000 feeking out a more remote and fafe habita-

zion in a Town in the Plains below that Mountain.

Legorne, Decemb. 20. The fixteenth instant arrived here swo French Men of War from Thoulon, viz. The Siren, Cavalier de Caldan Captain, and the Sea-Horfe, Cavalier de Peda Captain, each of them carrying 52 Guns, and 350 Men, and ('tissaid ) both of them bound for the Levant. Captain Caldan came on shore, and making a visit to the Governor, returned again immediately to his ship.

Some few days fince arrived also a Venetian, call'd the Se. Anthony of Padous, with Reifins from Zante, and bound

his Ostend.

The St. Carlo, a French ship, arriving here from Scanderoon, confirms the taking of several French Merchants by the Algier Vellels under the Colours of Tripoli, which they have fent into Tripoli.

The great Duke of Fiorence is removed thence to Ambregiana, a Palace of his, about twelve miles eithant from Florence, where he intends to pass the Holidays, and from

thence to remove to Pisa.

Paris, Jan. 8. The second instant about ten at Night. her Majesty was happily delivered of a Daughter, and the news immediately congratulated by a great number of Bonefires; the next day his Majesty received the Complements of the Queen of England, and all the great persons and Ladies of the Court, with the Ambassadors, Ministers, and Officers of the City; making likewise their Complements and Addresses to his Mujesty at St. Germans en Laye, with their ulual Presents.

On the fifth, the Chancellor of France with the Council. Parliament, Judges and Clergy, together with the Popes Nuntio, and the publick Ambassadors, met at the great Church of Nostre Dame, where they heard the Te Deum, which concluded with the discharge of the Cannon from the

City, Arfenal, and Eastille.

Middleburgh, Fan. 7. Though the generality of the People are in all places pleased with the thoughts of Peace. yer all our preparations are for War, which notwithstanding is interrupted at present by the Frost. Four men of War are gone out of Zealand, bound for Guiny, and fix Capers are put to Sea, intending to try their fortunes about the Caribbee Illands.

Some intentions there are of fending an Ambassador to the Emperor; to which end, Prince Maurice continues ar the Hague; but nothing of that nature will be determined till the meeting of the Allembly of the States of Holland, towards the beginning of February.

From Amsterdam we are advised, That twenty of our Men of War that went out at Sea, have suffered much damage by ill weather, and are again returned to the Texel.

Five Men of War that went some days fince from the Texelshad the fate to fall into the hands of feven of the English, who linking one of them, burnt a second, and carried off two others; onely one of them returning into the Texel with the news, and full of the marks of that encounter.

The Oftenders under an Arrest, are again dismist, leaving behinde them 100 of our Seamen found aboard; of whom, some that formerly quitted the service of the States will be severely punished. All those that engage themselves to appear the next Spring are fer at liberty, and the rest imprisoned.

Weymouth, Jan. 2. This morning came in a Privateer . of this Town, called the Hopeful Providence, with three French Colours at his Stern: Having fince he went out taken four Prizes, whereof one of them was unhappily cafe away at Guernsey, but the Goods saved, two other were sent into that Island, belonging both of them to Rohan, laden with Wines from Bonrdeaux: A fourth he has now brought in with him, belonging to Haure de Grace, laden with Salt, Wines, and Oyl; being a large Vessel carrying two Guns, and some number of Men, who made a fight the greatest part of Sunday laft.

Lyme, Fan. 2. This morning arrived two Vessels from ferses and Guernses, speaking the good condition of those Islands: Besides the prizes brought into Guernses by Captoin Abbott in the Hopeful Providence, the Governors Privateer hath taken two Dutch prizes, one of 150 Tunsy the other of 100 Tuns with Wine and Brandy 5 and Captain Earl, a Dartmouth Privateer, bath seised a small French Vessel of 30 Tuns laden with Wine, and another Vessel of 50 Tuns, pretending to be a Swede, bound for Nantes.

Briftot, Jan. z. Here is newly come in an Oftender with Iron, and some Pitch; likewise a Vessel from Scotland, with Tar and other lading, taken out of prizes there brought in: Allo twelve or thirteen Vessels from Ireland, with the Commodities of that Countrey, who report all those Coasts to be very clear, no enemy lately appearing to disturb them.
