HIS Majesty was, this Day, pleased to Order, that the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Tuesday the First Day of September next, should be further prorogued to Thursday the First Day of October following.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 25th Day of October 1776, to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st of December then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy. And whereas His Majesty was also pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 8th Day of November, 1776, to promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen, who might secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, by any of His Majesty's Sea-Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the 31st Day of December, 1776. And whereas His Majesty was likewise pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 15th Day of August 1777, to promise and declare, That every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should voluntarily enter himself to serve on Board any of His Majesty's Ships, on or before the 31st Day of October then next, should receive, as of His Majesty's Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, to be paid in Manner thereby directed. And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations, for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, hath been prolonged and extended to the 31st Day of this instant August; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Rewards should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby

accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this instant August to the 31st Day of October next, inclusive. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 22d of May last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23d of this instant August: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April, the 13th of August, and the 3d and 10th of October, 1777, of the 19th of July last; and the 7th of this instant August, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whomsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the said 23d Day of this instant August, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act

“to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition.”—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty’s Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty’s Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

ADAMIRAL Young, Commander in Chief of His Majesty’s Ships at the Leeward Islands, hath in his Letter to Mr. Stephens, dated the 16th of June last, sent a List of Prizes taken by the Ships of his Squadron, since those published in the Gazette of the 11th of July last, of which the following is a Copy:

Pera of Constantinople, July 3. The Plague is now spread throughout Constantinople and its Environs, which occasions a very great Desertion among the Christian Inhabitants, and even among the Turks. Many Ships in the Harbour are infected, in which Number are two French, one Venetian, and one Ragusean. By the best Accounts, the Number of Burials have some Days amounted to nearly One Thousand.

Vienna, August 7. The Chancellor of the Court, Prince Kaunitz Rietburg, has just received an Account from the Commandant of Esfig, that the ordinary Courier from Constantinople of the 17th of July had been attacked near Scharikioi, between Sophia and Nissa, by 60 Men on Horseback, who came out of a Wood, and assassinated him and the Janissary who attended him; in consequence of which the Mail was taken away, and all the Letters of that Post are missing, as well those for the Imperial Court as for private Persons. His Excellency, on the Receipt of this Intelligence, immediately took the necessary Measures, not only to inquire into the Truth and Circumstances of the Fact, but also to recover, as far as may be possible, the Mail which is missing, or at least such Letters as the Assassins, who appear to be a Band of Robbers, may not have carried away or destroyed.

Berlin, August 11. On the 7th Instant the Headquarters of his Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia were at Schwoicka. Lieutenant-General Moellendorff was the same Day at Längenau, Lieutenant-General Belling at Wartenberg, and Colonel Usedom near Gräbern. The Austrians have evacuated Tetschen, Tapolitz, Aussig, and Leitmeritz: These Places, together with Sandau, Leypa, Reichstadt, Nimes, and Olschwitz, as also Krottau and Kratzau, are occupied by Prussian Troops.

Dresden, August 12. On Monday between Eleven and Twelve Hundred of the Prisoners, taken near Gabel, were brought into Dresden, and lodged in the New Town, together with the Colonel of the Regiment of Caprara, some of the Officers, three Field Pieces, and three Standards; the rest are to follow in a few Days, and are all to proceed to Berlin, and from thence to be conveyed to Kustrin and Stettin.

General Platen has moved forward with the whole Corps, (amounting to about 20,000 Men, including General Anhalt’s Corps, and the Saxons that are under his Command) into Bohemia, towards Toeplitz, Aussig, and Leitmerik; the Austrians under the Command of Prince Charles of Lichtenstein having abandoned all that Country, and joined the main Body under Field Marshal Laudon, whose whole Army, according to the last Accounts, had retired from Weiswasser over the River Iser, and was on the 5th or 6th Instant encamped between Bakofen and Munkingratz, a little to the Northward of Jung-Buntzel; and it appeared they meant to keep that Position, as it prevents Prince Henry from attacking the Emperor in Flank, or from approaching the King’s Army. Prince Henry’s Army has not changed its Position; his Number, according to the best Accounts, amounts to 69,000 Men, including General Solm’s Corps of Saxons.

The Army under the Emperor, near Konigingratz amounts to 81,000 Men; that under the Marquis de Botta, at Hoff in Moravia, from Sixteen to Seventeen Thousand Men, which Corps is destined for the Defence of Olmutz; two additional Corps under Generals Werner and Stouterheim, near Creützendorff, opposite Troppaw, amount likewise to near that Number: These, added to the Corps of Laudon, and 8,600 that garrison Egra, form the whole of the Imperial Army in Bohemia and Moravia.

Brussels, August 18. On the 17th Instant died, at Enghein near this Place, of the Small Pox, in the 58th Year of his Age, Charles Maria, Duke and Prince of Arenberg, Arschot, and Kronij, Knight of the Golden Fleece, Field-Marshal in her Imperial Majesty’s Service, and Grand Bailiff of the Province of Hainault.

We beg Leave to assure your Excellency, that, moved by the Experience we have had of your Zeal for, and your Ability and Readiness to promote the Welfare of, this Country, we feel in ourselves such an Opinion of, and Confidence in, in your Administration, that we cannot but hope, that through His Majesty's Grace and Favour to a faithful and loyal People, your Excellency will long continue to be the Chief Governor of this Kingdom.

THIS Day his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, with the usual Solemnity, and the Commons being sent for, gave the Royal Assent to the following Bills:

An Act for granting unto His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, certain Duties therein contained; and for the further Advancement of the Trade of this Kingdom.

An Act for the Advancement of the Trade of this Kingdom.

An Act for improving the Police of the City of Dublin.

An Act to enable the Chief Justice, or other Justice of His Majesty's Court of King's Bench, or the Chief Justice or other Justice of His Majesty's Court of Common Pleas, in the Absence of the Lord Chief Baron of the Court of Exchequer, to swear the Lord Mayor of the City of Dublin into his Office.

An Act for the Amendment of the Law with respect to Outlawries, returning Special Jurors, and the future Effects of Bankrupts in certain Cases.

An Act for ascertaining the Boundaries of the Parish of St. Mary's, on the North East Side thereof, and for preventing Inconveniences arising from the uncertain State of the same; and for ascertaining the Boundaries between the County of the City of Dublin and the County of Dublin, in some Places where the same are uncertain, and thereby preventing Persons guilty of Offences therein from escaping the Punishment of the Law.

An Act to exclude Traders from the Benefit of an Act, intituled an Act to prevent Frauds committed by Bankrupts who do not keep regular Books of Accounts, and for continuing the said Law, and for other Purposes.

An Act for the further Improvement of the City of Dublin, in the Manner therein-mentioned.

An Act for the Relief of His Majesty's Subjects of this Kingdom, professing the Popish Religion.

And to Two Private Bills.

After which his Excellency made the following most gracious Speech to both Houses of Parliament.

His Excellency John Earl of Buckinghamshire, Lord Lieutenant General and General Governor of Ireland,

His Speech to both Houses of Parliament, at Dublin, on Friday the 14th Day of August, 1778.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

THE Business of the Session being concluded, I am happy to have it in my Power to release you from a very long and fatiguing Attendance. It is Time that your respective Countries, after having shared the Advantage of your public Labours, should avail themselves of your private Virtues; should enjoy the Benefit of your Presence; and profit by your more immediate and particular Attentions.

The Zeal and Unanimity manifested by both Houses of Parliament for the Support of His Majesty's Crown and Dignity, and the Defence of these Realms, whilst they evince the Loyalty and Magnanimity of this Kingdom, must necessarily tend to the Discouragement of our Enemies, and are highly acceptable to His Majesty, as incontestable Proofs of an affectionate Duty to him, and a sincere Attachment to your Country.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I am to thank you in His Majesty's Name for the Supplies which you have granted, and for the Provision which you have made for putting and maintaining this Kingdom in a State of Defence. Those Grants shall be faithfully applied, and it shall be my Endeavour, that the Welfare and Security of the People may amply compensate for those Charges which the Exigency of publick Affairs has unavoidably occasioned.

My Lords and Gentlemen,

I flatter myself, that the Regulations which have taken Place this Session, will prove essentially serviceable to that valuable Branch of Commerce, the Fisheries of Ireland. It is with Pleasure that I see an Act passed for establishing a Militia, which by enabling His Majesty, when He shall think proper to call forth that Part of the national Strength, may materially contribute to the Protection and Defence of the Kingdom. The Law for relieving the Roman Catholics from some of those Disabilities, under which they have hitherto laboured, will, I hope, attain the desirable End of promoting and establishing good Will and mutual Confidence among His Majesty's Subjects, and by rendering us more united at Home, make us more formidable to our Enemies Abroad. I congratulate with you on the late Extension of the Trade and Commerce of this Kingdom; it is a Circumstance peculiarly fortunate to me, that an Event which promises such Advantages to Ireland, should have taken Place during my Administration.

While you justly enjoy the Approbation and Gratitude of your Country, for having promoted so many useful Laws, I am persuaded you will not forget what is due to the paternal Care of an affectionate Sovereign, and the kind Disposition of Great-Britain towards this Country, you will cultivate jointly, as in sound Policy they are inseparable, the true Interests of both Kingdoms.

Your kind Approbation of my Conduct affords me a Satisfaction, which I can the more truly enjoy, because I am conscious of having endeavoured to de-

serve it. In adopting a different Line of Conduct, I should have been wanting in that Trust reposed in me by my Sovereign, who withes nothing so earnestly as the Prosperity of His People. I am happy in being able to represent to His Majesty, that His Royal and beneficent Attention meets a full and suitable Return, in the grateful Loyalty and affectionate Duty of His Subjects of this Kingdom.

After which the Lord Chancellor by his Excellency's Command said,

My Lords and Gentlemen,

IT is his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant's Pleasure, that this Parliament be prorogued to Tuesday the 22d Day of September next, to be then here held. And this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Tuesday the 22d Day of September next.
