**T**HE Squadron under the Captain Pashaw, consisting of Seven Ships of the Line, Four Gallies, Five Galiots, Six Armed Ships, and Thirty Transports, having with great Risk and Difficulty warped out of the Canal, set Sail for Sinope on the 21st of last Month, where they all arrived safe on the 28th, except One Ship of Seventy Guns, which put back to repair some Damage. This News was brought by a Tartar on the 1st Instant, and confirmed by Letters received Yesterday from the Pashaw. A small Fleet is ready to follow, to proceed with the first fair Wind, consisting of the Ship which put back as above, Two Frigates of Forty Guns, Six Zebecks from Twelve to Sixteen Guns, and Twenty Transports with Stores and Provisions. Bodies of Horse and Foot continue to pass almost daily from the Asiatick Provinces, in their Way to Iackza and Ismael. 300,000 Men are already assembled on the European Frontier.

An Express arrived this Morning from the Captain Pashaw, by which we learn that the Troops were ready to embark on different Expeditions for Crimea and Kuban, in which Province the Turkish Tartars have gained a considerable Advantage, and drove Shahin Gherai's Party from Avantage. The Plague makes great Havock in the Fleet; the Second in Command has been carried off by it.

*Vienna, August 12.* From Marshal Laudohn's Army we learn, that Major-General de Vins had been detached to stop the farther Progress of the Prussian and Saxon combined Army, under the Command of His Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia, and prevent their entering into Bohemia; but meeting with a much superior Corps of the Enemy at Tolstein, not far from Georgenthal, he was obliged to retire. The Van, commanded by M. de Vins, retired in good Order, and without Loss; but the Rear, under Colonel de Bossi of the vacant Regiment of Gaisrugg, being unable to withstand so great a Number of the Enemy, the Colonel, with about 1000 Men of the Battalions of Capra and Gaisrugg, and of the Regiment of Slavonians of Peterwarden, were, after an obstinate Resistance, made Prisoners; the rest were dispersed.

On Advice being received of a Transport of Provisions going to the Prussian Army, Major Naudorf of Wurmsler's Hussars was sent, on the 6th Instant, to intercept them with two Divisions of the said Regiment. This Officer, assisted by Captain Leydolt, made so proper Dispositions as to accomplish the Object of his Mission near Rukers. This Transport consisted of 240 Provision Waggons, laden with 2400 Quintals of Meal, and 13 Suters Waggons. The Hussars attacked the Convoy with so much Precipitation, that they could only make two Discharges of Cannon, and seven of Small Arms. The Provision and Suters Waggons were burnt, and 476 Provision Horses were brought to the Camp by the Hussars. The Cannon of the Enemy, which could not be carried off, was destroyed.

The Desertion continues more than ever amongst the Enemy; great Numbers desert with their Horses, particularly Ziethen's and Lossow's Hussars. On the 6th arrived 130, 34 of whom with their Horses and Arms.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 25th Day of October 1776, to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st of December then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy. And whereas His Majesty was also pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 8th Day of November, 1776, to promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen, who might secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, by any of His Majesty's Sea-Officers employed for raising Men; on or before the 31st Day of December, 1776. And whereas His Majesty was likewise pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 15th Day of August 1777, to promise and declare, That every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should voluntarily enter himself to serve on Board any of His Majesty's Ships, on or before the 31st Day of October then next, should receive, as of His Majesty's Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, to be paid in Manner thereby directed. And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations; for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, hath been prolonged and extended to the 31st Day of this instant August; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Rewards should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this instant August to the 31st Day of October next, inclusive. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

**W**HEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 22d of May last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will

expire on the 23d of this instant August: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April, the 13th of August, and the 3d and 10th of October, 1777, of the 19th of July last, and the 7th of this instant August, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whomsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the said 23d Day of this instant August, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, "An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.
