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*Madrid, April 7.*

**T**HE last of March the Queen parted from *Aranjuez* to *Toledo*, where her Majesty was received by the Magistrates of the City, and all the Persons of Quality that were there, with great Ceremony. The Confessor of his Highness *Don Juan of Austria*, hath had several private Conferences with *Don Fernando Valençuela*, for whose Trial, several Commissioners or Judges are appointed. At *Cadix* and at *St. Lucar* are fitting three Men of War, which are designed to Convey several Vessels laden with Ammunition and Provisions to *Sicily*, on them will embark *Don Fernando Carrillo*, who is appointed to command the Armada, though not with the quality of General, which is not disposed of as yet.

*Vienna, April 11.* The Count *de Waldstein*, designed Envoy Extraordinary to the Court of *England*, has been forced by an indisposition to defer his journey much longer than he intended. On Thursday last parted from hence the Marquis *de Grana*, carrying instructions from the Emperor to the Duke of *Lorraine*. General *Cops* is appointed to command the Imperial Troops which are to act in *Pomeran* this Campaigne.

*Copenhagen, April 17.* In our last we told you, that 4 or 5000 men were sent over to *Landskroon*, it seems their design was upon *Helsingburg*, which they executed on Wednesday morning, and in a short time made themselves Masters of the Town, the *Suedes* that were there retiring into the Cittadel; the *Danes* having plundered the Town, returned to *Landskroon*. The *Suedes*, upon advice of these Troops passing over to *Schonen*, have quitted the Posts they had taken on this side of *Christiansstadt*, and have formed a Camp near *Lundun*, which the Heer *Meerheym*, Governor of the place, understanding, made a Sally, and had the good fortune to attack the *Suedes* in their Rear, and to take several Prisoners.

*Méyßenheim, April 17.* Yesterday the Duke of *Lorraine* arrived here, and having only stayed to hear Mass, continued his march with 10000 Horse, and 5000 Foot, all brave chosen men, towards *Treves*, by the way of *Walderfungen* and *Diedenhoun*. The rest of the Imperial Troops begin to quit their quarters, and will have their Rendezvous the beginning of the next month near *Francfort*.

*Francfort, April 18.* The Imperial Troops having passed the *Rhine* at *Oppenheim*, are now marching with all diligence towards the *Moselle*, which they will pass, as is said, at *Treves* or *Coblenz*, and so advance to *Luxemburg*; these Troops are said to make up in all about 18000 men, and we are confident the Duke of *Lorraine* will not lose time, but immediately enter upon action against the Enemy. The whole Imperial Army will Rendezvous some time about the middle of the next month in our Neighborhood. We hear nothing as yet of the march of the *Munster* and *Luxemburg* Troops, who have had their Winter-quarters in these parts.

*Cologne, April 19.* The 16 instant, the Duke of *Newburg* returned to *Düsseldorf* from *Wesel*, where he had been to confer with the Elector of *Brandenburg*.

*Brussels, April 23.* The Garrison which was in *Cambray* is coming hither, the last Night they had their quarters at *Brais le Comte*, and this Night they will be at *Nostre-dame de Hall*, consisting in about 2500 Foot, and 400 Horse, part of them will, as we are informed, be sent to *Vilvorde*, and the rest will remain in Garrison here, and *Don Pedro Savala*, the late Governor of *Cambray*, is ordered to go to *Mons*, to assist the Duke of *Archebot* in case there should be occasion. The Treaty with the Bishop of *Munster* is finished, and the Envoy that was here is returned homewards, to halt the march of the 9000 men that Bishop is to send hither; with which, and the *Osnabrug* Troops, our Governor the Duke *de Villi Hermosa* proposes to have by the middle of the next month an Army of 24000 men, to act under his command. His Highness the Prince of *Orange* continues his quarters between *Ghent* and *Bruges*, and though several of his best Regiments were very much ruined in the late Fight, yet his Highness doubts not to have them recruited in a month or six weeks at farthest, and by that time to have a better Army than he has had yet. The *States General* have sent his Highness 300000 Florins, and 4000 Musquets; and we are told his Highness expects a farther Sum of 600000 Florins. The Most Christian King has, as we are informed, sent a detachment of 1500 men towards *Germany*, to join the *Marfchal de Crequi*, the rest of his Troops his Majesty has put into quarters of refreshment, and is himself gone towards *Dunkirk*. It is said that his Majesty will reside there most of this Summer, but without any certainty; *St. Omer*, we hear, is surrendered to the *French*. The Duke of *Lorraine* is coming down apace, and there are some Letters from *Treves*, which say that his Vanguard arrived there the 19 instant.

*Amwerp, April 23.* The Prince of *Orange*, who has his Quarters between *Ghent* and *Bruges*, having taken a Muster of his Troops, finds, as we are told, his loss in the late Fight not to be so considerable, as was at first imagined. Those Regiments which suffered the most, are sent into Quarters, and other fresh Regiments to supply their places. The Prince, we hear, has caused some Officers, who behaved themselves very ill in the fight, to be executed.

*Hague, April 23.* The *States General*, we are told, have written to the Prince of *Orange*, to thank him for his endeavors against the Enemy, and for the pains and dangers he exposed his Person to, of which they pray him to be careful, for that the happiness and preservation of the State so much depends upon his safety; to which they add, that as his Highness will do well to recompence those that behaved themselves bravely in the late Fight so that it will be necessary that those that were wanting in their duty, be exemplarily punished for a terror to others. The *States* at the same time have resolved, besides the money that hath been already sent to his Highness, to supply him with a farther sum of 600000 Florins. We are intimated that 9 Regiments are on their march from these Countries to reinforce his Highness, who we doubt not but will in a short time have his Army compleat again. Here is made publick a List of the Killed and Wounded in the late Fight, which however is not altogether perfect.
