Extract of a Letter from Smyrna, dated the 9th of July, 1778, transmitted to the Lord Viscount Weymouth by his Excellency Sir Robert Ainslie, His Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople.

REVIOUS to the 16th of last Month, some flight Shocks of Earthquakes had been felt here, and on the Evening of that Day, an exceeding strong One happened; however happily without producing any Mischief, but the Shocks continued, from Time to Time, daily, 'till the 3d Instant, when at Half an Hour after Two in the Morning a most violent One happened, which damaged, more or less, a great Number of Buildings in the Town, and threw down a Turkish Mosque, where several People were killed; the Consterna, tion and Terror this occasioned induced a great Part of the Inhabitants to retire to the neighbouring Villages, Gardens, &c. for Safety. The next Morning, amidst the repeated Shocks of Earth-quakes, at Three o'Clock we had the dismal Profpect of a most dreadful and extensive Fire, which began in the Armenian Quarter of the Town, al-most opposite the French Consul's House, which being assisted by a strong Northerly Wind, and little Water attainable, upon Account of the Pipes being broke and choaked up with Earth, in consequence of the Earthquakes, and the People discouraged from giving Assistance, by the strong Shocks which threw down damaged Houses, and killed many, occasioned the Fire to burn with most incredible Fury for near 24 Hours, confuming it is calculated near one Third of the City, which has occasioned a most melancholy Scene of Misery and Desolation; the Greek Nation has suffered an immense Loss of Property, Armenian Jews and Turks are very great Sufferers, and this City may be faid almost totally ruined; the Consequences in all Respects will be long and severely felt; a great Part of the Street inhabited by the Europeans has been destroyed, quite from the Custom House, where the European Merchandize is landed to near the Capucin Convent. It is now hoped that weshall be soon free from the alarming Apprehensions of the Earthquakes, as few have been felt within these Three Days past, and we are informed from a Dutch Captain who was off one of the Islands of Nourla, (about 18 Miles from Smyrna) that a firong Shock, felt here on the 5th, at near Three in the Morning, had occasioned a considerable Opening of the Earth, opposite to where he lay at Anchor, and that he apprehended his Ship to be damaged from the Violence of the Shock; and perceiving the Fire at Smyrna, it induced him to dispatch his Boat hither for Information, upon a Supposition that the City had been thrown down by the Earthquake, and was productive of the Fire. This Circumstance may probably contribute to our Safety, in having formed a Vent to expel the inflammatory Exhalations.

It is confidently affured, that the Fire was occafioned by Incendiaries, five or fix Jews; one was hanged, and another thrown into the Fire. Other Attempts, it is faid, have been made to renew this

dreadful Calamity.

Dresden, September 13. A Corps of Austrians has entered Saxony near Marienberg in the Circle of the Mountains, and has laid Anneberg under a Contribution of 30,000 Dellars; which the Citizens not being able to pay, the Austrians carried some of the principal ones away as Hostages, and had rerired to their Head Quarters at Bernstein. His Royal Highness Prince Henry of Prussia has quitted his Camp at Nimes, and passed the Elbe Yesterday, the 12th lustant, at Leitmeritz. General Solms has joined General Platen with a few Officers; and Lieutenant-General Bennigsen has now the Command of the Saxons at Gabel.
