St. James's, October 6, 1778.

[Continuation from the last Gazette.]

THEIR Majesties set out from Winchester on Wednesday the 30th of September, a little before Eleven o'Clock, and arrived at the Bishop's Palace at Salisbury at a Quarter before Three, and were received by a Captain's Guard from the King's Regiment of Dragoon Guards from the Camp. Their Majesties were addressed by the Bishop and Clergy, and by the Dean and Chapter. The Mayor and Commonalty of the City of New Sarum likewise waited on Their Majesties there, with the Earl of Radnor the Recorder, who addressed Their Majesties in a Speech of Congratulation on their safe Arrival. Their Majesties then, with their Suites, and attended by the Bishop and Clergy, the Dean and Chapter, the Mayor, Recorder, &c. went to view the Cathedral; and entering at the West Door the Anthem of *God save the King*, and another Anthem suitable to the Occasion of Their Majesties Royal Visit, were performed by the Choir. After passing some Time in the Cathedral, and admiring it's Architecture and Antiquities, Their Majesties returned to the West Door, where a very great Concourse of People were assembled. Their Majesties passed on Foot through the Guard, amidst the joyful Acclamations of the numerous Spectators, to the Deanery House; where, after making a short Stay, Their Majesties proceeded in Their Carriages to Wilton House, the Seat of the Earl of Pembroke, where Their Majesties arrived about a Quarter after Four o'Clock. The Guard of the King's Regiment of Light Dragoons attended Their Majesties from Salisbury, and a Guard of the Bedfordshire Militia had been before placed at Wilton House to do Duty as the King's Guard. On Their Majesties Arrival They were waited upon and addressed by the Mayor, Recorder, and Burgesses of the Borough of Wilton. Great Numbers of People followed Their Majesties Carriages from Salisbury, many joined them on the Road, and from Wilton; and a very great Concourse assembled at the Gates of Wilton House, where they continued until Night.

On Thursday Morning, a little before Nine, Their Majesties left Lord Pembroke's House; the King on Horseback, and the Queen in Her Majesty's Chaise, attended by Their Majesties Suites, and proceeded through the Camp towards the Ground where the Regiments of Cavalry were previously arrived, for the Purpose of His Majesty's Review. The Weather this Morning was unfavourable, there being several very heavy Showers of Rain; notwithstanding which the Number of Spectators collected together is scarcely to be described. Their Majesties entered the Line of the Cavalry on the Right, and, passing along the Front, received the Salutes of the General Officers, and the several Officers of the Regiments, and returned by the Rear; soon after which, the Front of the Line being cleared, and Their Majesties having placed themselves on an Eminence, the Troops began their Exercise, first marching by in Squadrons, and then

went through several Manœuvres both on Horseback and on Foot, with the Firings and Exercise of the Light Dragoons, which exhibited at the same Time a very useful and a very pleasing Scene. The Regiments dismounted, and marched by the King and Queen in grand Divisions. The Review ending at about Two o'Clock, His Majesty alighted from His Horse, and, proceeding a few Paces forward, attended by His Suite, the several Officers of the Regiments were introduced to His Majesty, regimentally, as at Winchester, and had all the Honour of kissing His Majesty's Hand. The King was graciously pleased to approve the Appearance, Discipline, and good Order of the Regiments; and, mounting His Horse again, His Majesty was pleased to take a considerable Circuit, to indulge such of the Spectators, as from their great Number could not get sufficiently forward, with a nearer and less interrupted Sight of His Majesty: For the like Purpose, and to gratify the Multitude, whose Loyalty had brought them together on this Occasion, His Majesty was pleased to return to Wilton House on Horseback; where His Majesty arriving about Four o'Clock, He was pleased, together with the Queen, attended by Their Suites, and the Earl and Countess of Pembroke, to visit several Parts of Lord Pembroke's Park, and alighted at his Lordship's House at Half past Four o'Clock.

At Half past Nine o'Clock on Friday Morning Their Majesties, attended by Their Suites, and the Earl and Countess of Pembroke, left Wilton House on Their Way to Stonehenge, which Their Majesties examined very attentively. Their Majesties arrived at the Duke of Queensberry's House at Ambresbury at Eleven o'Clock, where they staid a little more than an Hour, and then proceeded on Their Return to Windsor, where Their Majesties arrived at Six o'Clock in the Evening.

Before Their Majesties left Wilton House, the King was graciously pleased to order a Sum of Money to be put into the Hands of the Mayor of Salisbury, to be by him distributed to the poor and distressed Families of that City and Suburbs; to make a Present to the Widows of the Clergy there, to the Ringers of the several Parishes, and to the Vergers of the Cathedral; and to direct, as at Winchester, a Return and State to be made of the several Persons confined for Debt there, in order that such of them as shall appear to be proper Objects may receive His Majesty's Royal Bounty for their Enlargement.

The numerous Assemblies of the People in the Roads, Villages, and Towns, through which Their Majesties passed during the whole Journey, with the Ringing of Bells, the Decorating of the Houses with Boughs of Trees, Flowers, and Garlands, together with the continual Acclamations, and the Joy, which the People testified on Their Majesties passing, very strongly marked the Duty, Loyalty, and Affection, with which all Ranks of People were animated by the Presence of Their Majesties; and gave Their Majesties the greatest Satisfaction.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, in the Night of Saturday the 18th of July last, Robert Jennings, one of the Crew of the Assistance Cutter, in the Service of the Customs at Dover, who has a Deputation from the Commissioners of the said Revenue, empowering him to seize Prohibited and Uncustomed Goods, being in the due Execution of his Duty, within the Limits of the said Port, with Seven Men in the Boat belonging to the said Cutter, in order to look after the Smugglers, fell in with a Boat loaded with a great Number of Casks of Spirituous Liquors, which the Officers chased till the Goods were run on Shore, and then made Seizure thereof, and also of the Boat;

That thereupon the Smugglers, who were assembled on the Beach, began to resist the Officers in the Performance of their Duty, by obstructing them therein, and firing upon them, and actually shot one of the said Officers dead upon the Spot;

That the Coroner's Inquest have set on the Body, and brought in their Verdict Wilful Murder by Persons unknown;

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of the Offenders, who shall discover his or their Accomplices, (except the Person who actually killed the Officer) so that they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
