St. James's, October 24, 1778.

THE King and Queen set out on Monday last the 19th Instant, at half past Twelve o'Clock, from the Queen's House, and arrived at Thorndon Place in Essex, the Seat of the Right Honourable the Lord Petre, at Three o'Clock. His Majesty was attended by the Marquess of Lothian, Gold Stick in Waiting, the Honourable Colonel St. John, and the Honourable Colonel Harcourt, two of His Majesty's Aides-de-Camp, and Lieutenant-General Carpenter, Equerry in Waiting; and the Queen, by the Marquess of Carmarthen Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household, and the Countess of Egremont, one of the Ladies of Her Majesty's Bed-chamber: Their Majesties were escorted by Detachments from the Troops of Horse and Grenadier Guards, and from the King's Regiment of Light Dragoons. On the King and Queen's Arrival near Brentwood, and near the Camp, a Royal Salute was fired from the Artillery; the Streets of the Town, and the Road, and the Avenue towards Lord Petre's as far as his Lordship's Park Gate, were lined by the Grenadiers of the Camp, the 25th and 60th Regiments of Foot, and the East Riding of York and the East Kent Regiments of Militia, under the Command of Major-General Sir David Lindsay.

A Guard of a Captain, Two Subalterns, and One Hundred Men, from the 6th Regiment of Foot, were posted at Lord Petre's House.

On Tuesday Morning, at Three Quarters past Nine o'Clock, the King and Queen went from Lord Petre's House; His Majesty on Horseback, attended by His Suite, and also by General Lord Amherst; and the Queen in Her Chaise, with Lady Egremont, and attended by the Marquess of Carmarthen Her Majesty's Chamberlain, to review the Troops encamped at Warley. On His Majesty's Appearance at the Front of the Line, the Cannon were fired from the Right to the Left of the Camp.

The King proceeding along the Front of the Light Infantry, the Artillery, and Grenadiers, was received and saluted at the Right of the Line by General Lord Amherst, and Lieutenant-General Peirson; and by the Major Generals at the Head of their respective Brigades; as was also the Queen. Their Majesties proceeded along the Front of the whole Line receiving the Salutes of the several Officers, and returned by the Rear of the Line; when His Majesty having placed himself in a convenient Situation, saw the whole Line march by in Grand Divisions, and also the Artillery. The Line then went through their several Firings; after which the Light Infantry and Grenadiers with the Artillery marched immediately through the Woods towards Little Warley (followed by the whole Line

in two Columns) where, as well as in the adjacent Woods, several Batteries were placed, and many Manœuvres of Attack and Defence were performed with a continued Fire of Musquetry and Cannon, to which the Situation and Variety of the Ground was very favourable, and afforded much Pleasure to the numerous Spectators. The King during this Time continued on Horseback, and saw the whole Disposition of the Troops.

Lord Petre having erected a Stand nearly in the Centre of the Scene of those Manœuvres, for the better Convenience of the Queen's seeing them, Her Majesty repaired thither as soon as the Line had gone through their Firings, and was attended in the Stand by the Marquess of Carmarthen, Earl Waldegrave Her Majesty's Master of the Horse, Lady Egremont, Lady Petre, and Lady Amherst: The several Manœuvres being over a little before Three o'Clock, the King went towards the Stand, where a Circle being formed by the Horse, and Grenadier Guards, the several Officers of the Regiments were introduced, Regimentally, to His Majesty, and had all the Honour of kissing His Majesty's Hand. The King was graciously pleased to express great Satisfaction at the Appearance, Discipline, and good Order of the several Regiments, and the Royal Artillery; and likewise His Approbation of the Manœuvres which were performed: And mounting His Horse again, a Royal Salute was fired on His Majesty's leaving the Field.

The King returned to Lord Petre's House, where His Majesty, and likewise the Queen, arrived a little after Four o'Clock.

At Ten o'Clock on Wednesday Morning, the Avenue from Lord Petre's Park, and the Road and Streets of Brentwood, being lined by the Light Infantry, the 6th and Liverpool Regiments of Foot, the North Gloucester and North Lincolnshire Regiments of Militia under the Command of Major-General Hall, Their Majesties attended by Their Suites, and Lord and Lady Petre, left Thorndon Place, on their Way to Navestock, the Seat of the Earl Waldegrave, where Their Majesties arrived a little before Eleven; and having continued there till near Three, Their Majesties set out on Their Return to the Queen's House, where Their Majesties arrived at about a Quarter past Five.

Before Their Majesties left Thorndon Place, the King was graciously pleased to leave a Sum of Money for the Poor of the Parish, and for the Ringers of the Places where Their Majesties passed.

Great Numbers of People were assembled at the Review, and in the Roads and Villages through which Their Majesties passed, on their Journey to and from Thorndon Place. The Houses were decorated with Boughs of Trees, Flowers, &c. and

and a general illumination prevailed in and about Brentwood, in Lord Petre's Park, and at the Houses in the Neighbourhood of the Camp; which Testimonies of Loyalty, together with the Ringing of Bells, and the repeated Acclamations of Joy which the People expressed as Their Majesties passed, were very pleasing, and afforded great Satisfaction to Their Majesties.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, by an Act of Parliament passed in the Tenth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intitled, "An Act to prevent the further spreading of the Contagious Disorder among the Horned Cattle in Great Britain," His Majesty is empowered, (amongst other Things) from Time to Time, as often as he shall find it necessary so to do, by His Royal Proclamation, to be issued by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, or by His Order in Council to be published in the London Gazette, to prohibit generally, or from any particular Country or Countries, or from the Isles of Alderney, Jersey, Guernsey, or any of the Islands or Dominions belonging to Great Britain, the Importation of any Cattle, or of any Manner of Hides or Skins, Horns or Hoofs, or any other Part of any Cattle or Beast, into the Kingdoms of Great Britain or Ireland, or into any of the Islands or Dominions thereto belonging: And whereas His Majesty hath received Information, that the Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle has broke out in the Ukraine:— His Majesty doth thereupon, with the Advice of His Privy Council, find it necessary to Order, and doth hereby accordingly Order and Command, that no Horned Cattle, nor any Manner of Hides, Skins, Horns, Hoofs, or other Part of any Horned Cattle or Beast, nor any Hay, Straw, Litter, Fodder, or other Things which have been employed about Infected Cattle, or the Hides or any other Part of such Cattle, or have been in or near the Places where any such Infection hath been, and are liable to retain the same, shall be imported from any Ports or other Places within the Dominions of Russia or Poland, until His Majesty's Pleasure shall be further signified. And His Majesty is further pleased, with the Advice aforesaid, to Order, as it is hereby Ordered, that the utmost Care be taken not to permit any Entry to be passed for any Cattle, or for any Manner of Hides or Skins, Horns or Hoofs, or any other Part of any Cattle or Beast, which are already, or may hereafter be, brought from the Places aforesaid, directly or indirectly, into any of the Ports of Great Britain or Ireland, until further Order. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lord Lieutenant of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 25th Day of October 1776, to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordi-

nary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st of December then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy. And whereas His Majesty was also pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 8th Day of November, 1776, to promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, by any of His Majesty's Sea-Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the 31st Day of December, 1776. And whereas His Majesty was likewise pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 15th Day of August 1777, to promise and declare, That every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should voluntarily enter himself to serve on Board any of His Majesty's Ships, on or before the 31st Day of October then next, should receive, as of His Majesty's Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, to be paid in Manner thereby directed. And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations, for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, hath been prolonged and extended to the 31st Day of this instant October; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Rewards should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this instant October to the 31st Day of December next, inclusive. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Vienna, October 10. The Prussian Artillery have retired from the Camp occupied by the King of Prussia near Schatzlar, and are gone into the Neighbourhood of Schweidnitz. Four Regiments of Infantry and two Battalions of Grenadiers, and Ziethe's Hussars, have likewise left the Camp; the Infantry are marched towards Landshut, and the Hussars towards Smideburg. The Rest of the Camp continue in their Situation.

The Prussian Corps under Lieutenant-General de Wu. ch quitted on the 6th Instant their Camp near Ratschenberg, and retired towards Ruckers and Lewin: Lieutenant-General Marquis de Botta has changed his Position, and has fixed himself with his Corps near Lodenitz.

Vienna, October 7. The Nobility and Foreign Ministers had the Honour this Morning to pay their Respects, for the first Time, to the Grand Duke and Dutchess of Tuscany.
