will befiege Brifac, and that the French upon an appiehendion there of, are making great provision of all things necessary for its defence. They likewise for the Schleftadt, and have caufed all the Works to be undermined. As for Monbelliard they have demolished and abandoned it.

Mentz, April 24. The Imperialists who have wintered in the Country of Wertemborg, are on their march towards the Rhine, which they will pass at Oppenheim, and fo follow the Duke of Lorrain, who has ere this paffed the Mofelle at Treves. We are told that his Highness, when all the Troops are come up to him, will have an Army of near 40000 fighting men, who we promise our selves will make great progressesthis Campagne on the fide of Lorrain. Trier, April 25. Yesterday arrived here the Duke

of Lorrain, and was welcomed with a difcharge of all our Cannon; his Army confifts in about 18060 men; to morrow they will pass the Mofelle, over our Bridge, and take their march towards Lorrain. We do not as yet certainly know what his Highneffes first action will be, though much has been faid of his befieging Merz, which the French do not feem much to apprehend. The reft of the Imperial Troops as we hear have all quitted their quarters, and are marching with all diligence towards the Rhine, which they will pais at Oppenbeim, and to come down likewife towards these parts, while the Troops of the Circles, under the command of the Eleetoral Prince of Suxony, block up Brifas. A very great Magazine hath been provided here, and another at Luxemburg, for the fervice of the Imperial Army this Campagne.

Cologne, April 27. ' The States of the Dutchy of Fuliers, and of the County of Berg are affembled at Dufeldorp, the Duke of Neulurg having demanded 300000 Crowns of them. We expect 9 or 10000 Munfter Troops sudden ! y in thefe paits, in their march towards the Spanish Netherlands. From Coblentz they write, that the Duke of Lorra.n advances towards Luxemburg, and that the Marefetal de Crequi has drawn feveral Troops together, to obferve his motions.

Nimeguen, April 24. The Heer Heugh, Ambaffador of Denm.rk, who went to confer with the Elector of Brandenburg at Wefel, returned hither yesterday. Very little of business that we can hear of, has passed kere of late; for fince the feveral Ambaffidors gave in to the Mediators the refpective demands of their Mafters, hardly any thing of moment has been transacted here. The Troops designed for the forming a Body near Ruremond, are on their mirch, and in a day or two they will be fixed in the flation they are to hold. It is faid that there are present in Maestricht above 10000 mien.

Hague, April 30. The 26th inftant the Heer Pentionaris Fagel returned hither from Flanders, where he had been to wait upon the Prince of Orange, at his quarters at Eckelosfrom whence we fince received Let ers syhich give us an account, that one man having been drawn by Lot out of each Company of the Sieur Falgenburgs Regiment (being in all nine) who had very ill behaved themfelges in the late Battel, they had, according to the featence of a Council of War, been hanged for an example to the relt. The Letters add, that feveral perfons, who were supposed to be killed or taken pilfoners, came daily to the Army, which we doubt not bue will be in a condition to act against the Enemy some time the next mynth.
