Westminster, November 26.

THIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Knight, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to make the following most Gracious Speech :

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I HAVE called you together in a Conjunction which demands your most serious Attention.

In the Time of profound Peace, without Presence of Provocation or Colour of Complaint, the Court of France hath not forborne to disturb the Public Tranquillity, in Violation of the Faith of Treaties, and the general Rights of Sovereigns : At first, by the clandestine Supply of Arms and other Aid to My revolted Subjects in North America; afterwards, by avowing openly their Support, and entering into formal Engagements with the Leaders of the Rebellion; and, at length, by committing open Hostilities and Depredations on My faithful Subjects, and by an actual Invasion of My Dominions in America and the West Indies.

It is, I trust; unnecessary for Me to assure you, that the same Care and Concern for the Happiness of My People, which induced Me to endeavour to prevent the Calamities of War, will make Me desirous to see a Restoration of the Blessings of Peace, whenever it can be effected with perfect Honour, and with Security to the Rights of this Country.

In the mean Time, I have not neglected to take the proper and necessary Measures for disappointing the malignant Designs of Our Enemies, and also for making general Reprisals; and although My Efforts have not been attended with all the Success, which the Justice of Our Cause, and the Vigour of Our Exertions, seem'd to promise; yet the extensive Commerce of My Subjects has been protected in most of its Branches, and large Reprisals have been made upon the injurious Aggressors by the Vigilance of My Fleets, and by the active and enterprising Spirit of My People.

The great Armaments of other Powers, however friendly and sincere their Professions, however just and honourable their Purposes, must necessarily engage Our Attention.

It would have afforded Me very great Satisfaction to have informed you, that the conciliatory Measures, planned by the Wisdom and Temper of Parliament, had taken the desired Effect, and brought the Troubles in North America to a happy Conclusion.

In this Situation of Affairs, the National Honour and Security call so loudly upon Us for the most active Exertions, that I cannot doubt of your

heartiest Concurrence and Support. From the Vigour of your Councils, and the Conduct and Intrepidity of My Officers and Forces by Sea and Land, I hope, under the Blessing of God, to derive the Means of vindicating and maintaining the Honour of My Crown, and the Interests of My People, against all Our Enemies.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I will order the proper Estimates for the Service of the ensuing Year to be laid before you; and when you consider the Importance of the Objects for which We are contending, you will, I doubt not, grant Me such Supplies as you shall judge necessary for the Public Service, and adequate to the present Emergency.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I have, according to the Powers vested in Me for that Purpose, called forth the Militia, to assist in the interior Defence of this Country; and I have, with the greatest and truest Satisfaction, been Myself a Witness of that public Spirit, that steady Ardour, and that Love of their Country, which animate and unite all Ranks of My faithful Subjects, and which cannot fail of making Us safe at Home, and respected Abroad.

Goods: Which Information was afterwards certified by the said Lord Justice Clerk, under his Hand and Seal, to One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and the same having been laid before His Majesty in His Privy Council, pursuant to the Act of Parliament of the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, in that Case made and provided;—His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by this His Order in His Privy Council, require and command, That the said William Davidson, John M'Rorie, John M'Taggart the Younger, Robert Graham, David Davidson, Douglas Davidson, Robert Graham the Younger, Hugh M'Kail, William Hector, John Brown, William Ferguson, Robert Breakenridge, and Thomas Ferguson the Younger, and each of them, do surrender himself and themselves within the Space of Forty Days after the First Publication of this Order in The London Gazette, to any of the Lords of Judiciary, or to any One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace in Scotland.

W H E R E A S the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 19th Day of August last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23d of this instant November: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April, the 13th of August, and the 3d and 10th of October, 1777, of the 19th of June, the 7th and 26th of August, and the 10th of September last, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whomsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the said 23d Day of this instant November, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of

His late Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."—And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Stockholm, November 3. On Sunday, the 1st Instant, about Seven o'Clock in the Morning, her Swed sh Majesty was happily delivered of a Prince. This joyful Event was announced to the Publick by the Discharge of above Two Thousand Cannon. Her Majesty and the young Prince are as well as can be expected.

Vienna, November 4. By the last Letters from Silesia we are informed, that the two Armies are still in the same Position.

Duke Albert of Saxe-Teschen arrived here some Days ago from the Army, as did likewise the Marshals Lacy and Laudohn, and also Prince Charles of Lichtenstein within these Eight and Forty Hours.

His Imperial Majesty remains at Prague, or at Brandeis, where he has fixed his Head Quarters.

Vienna, November 11. The Troops on all Sides being settled in Winter Quarters, we hear that the Emperor will hasten his Return to Vienna. His Imperial Majesty is to be on the 15th Instant at Heydenpiltz, the Head Quarters of General Elrichshausen, and will afterwards employ a Day or two in visiting the Out-Posts in that Neighbourhood, and the Fortrefs of Olmutz.

Dresden, November 11. The King of Prussia is arrived at Breslau. Prince Frederick of Brunwick commands at Jagerndorff; and the Hereditary Prince has extended his Troops towards Teschen.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in writing or leaving the said Note and Letter, or either of them, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person or Persons who actually wrote the said Note or Letter) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
