WHEREAS, by Order in Council of the 23d of October last it was directed, That no Horned Cattle, nor any Manner of Hides, Skins, Horns, Hoofs, or other Part of any Horned Cattle or Beast, nor any Hay, Straw, Litter, Fodder, or other Things which have been employed about infected Cattle, or the Hides, or any other Part of such Cattle, or have been in or near the Places where any such Infection hath been, and are liable to retain the same, should be imported from any Ports, or other Places within the Dominions of

Russia or Poland, until His Majesty's Pleasure should be further signified: And whereas it hath been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that the most exact Enquiry hath been made, and that it doth not appear that there hath been any Contagious Distemper amongst the Horned Cattle in any of the Provinces of Poland: His Majesty taking the same into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Obstructions on Trade, as far as is consistent with the Security of this Kingdom against such a Calamity, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the said Prohibition be taken off, so far as respects the Importation of the above mentioned Articles from any Ports or Places within the Dominions of Poland.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lord Lieutenant of His Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

St. James's, February 2, 1779.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that, about Six o'Clock in the Morning of the 2d of last Month, a dreadful Fire broke out in the Royal Hospital for Seamen at Greenwich, which extended itself with such Rapidity and raged with such Violence, that, before the same could be extinguished, the Chapel and Cupola, with several of the Wards in Queen Mary's Building, were destroyed, and other considerable Damage done; and whereas it has been further represented to His Majesty, that, notwithstanding the most diligent Enquiries, it hath not yet appeared whether the said Fire was the Effect of Accident, or wilfully and maliciously occasioned by some Evil-disposed Person or Persons at present unknown: His Majesty, therefore, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice any Person or Persons who may have been concerned in wilfully and maliciously setting Fire to the said Hospital, as above-mentioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One of the said Offenders (except the Person or Persons who actually set Fire to the said Hospital) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Offence, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and duly convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement for bringing to Punishment the Person or Persons who may have been concerned in the above mentioned atrocious Offence, the Commissioners and Governors of the said Hospital do hereby promise a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be paid without any Deduction whatsoever, by the Treasurer of the said Hospital, to any Person or Persons who shall discover the Offender or Offenders, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted as aforesaid.

ON Saturday last the 16th Instant, about Six o'Clock in the Evening, the Post-Boy was attacked and robbed, at a Place called Priest's Bridge, about Four Miles North of Morpeth, of the whole Scotch Mail, and the Bags from Berwick, Belford, and Atnwick, which should have arrived here this Morning, by Two Footpads, armed with Bludgeons, who stopped the Boy, cut the Mails from the Cart, and immediately conveyed the same into a Wood adjoining, of whom no further Description can be given from the Darkness of the Night.

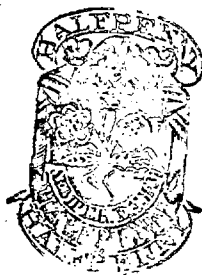
