Dresden, February 7. For some Days past al-most the whole of the Army quartered in this Electorate has either been in Motion or preparing to move. Several Bodies are in March towards the Frontiers of Bohemia. A Corps under General Teuffel, of about 100 Volunteers, drawn from the Regiments near this Place, was to have passed the Forest of Eichwald on the other Side of Dippoldif walde the Night before last, and it appears their March is directed towards Toplitz; at the same Time General Mollendorf, with a Body of between 15 and 1600 Men, moved from Freyberg towards Seyda, on the Road to Commotau; and we fince hear, that, after having penetrated into Bohemia, had met with some Resistance near Brix, in which he had his Horse killed under him, but his Loss was very inconfiderable; and when the last Meffenger came away, the General had made above 100 Prisoners, and taken two Pieces of Cannon. The Saxon General Anhalt, with as numerous a Body, has also moved forward towards Adorf, in the Road to Egra.

When the last Accounts came away from Silesia, the Austrians remained in Possession of Habelschwert and Zugmantel in the County of Glatz; and the King of Prussia had marched out of Schweidnitz

with an Intention to diflodge them.

St. James's, February 20, 1779.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that on Thursday the 21st Day of January last, about Eight of the Clock in the Evening, Two Guns loaded with Balls, Slugs, and large Shot, were discharged at the Room where John Harward, of Hayne in the Parish of Plymtree in the County of Devon, Esq; usually sits, at Hayne aforesaid, which Balls, Slugs, and Shot, shattered the Windows, and some of them penetrated the Wainscot on the opposite Side of the said Room; and that on the 26th Day of the same Month of January, a Letter in the following Words was brought to the House of the said John Harward, at Hayne aforesaid, by the General Post, viz. (superscribed) For John Harward, Esq; at Plimtree near Culumpton, Devon:

John Harward

Old Harward I will tell thee thou art an old Rogue and I am Sorry that I should lost my Labour the other Night, I was informed that thee received a Slight Wound but now I find to the Contrary therefore I would have thee take Care for the last Error will be worse than the first.

P. S. You old Turk you are no Cristian, nor Englishman, Butt you are a Land Mare Maid half fool and half Rogue, take heed and dont Deceive thy Neighbour nor thy self for you are Deceived by your nasty beeches of Whores this from your

And also that, about the 3d or 4th Day of this present Month of February, a Letter was brought to the House of Francis Rose Drewe, of Grainge in the Parish of Broadbembury in the said County of Dewon, Esq; by the General Post, of which Letter the following is a Copy, viz.

London Jan. 1. 1779.
Drew thee art a Narrow Back, Lowsey, false, Little forswareing, Little Rogue I dont look upon thee no more than the Leaf of an Asp for he Whivers and is gone, and be ye no more in rememberance I would have thee remember the old Carey's Coach when he received a Brace of Balls I would have thee drop in the Knees and give thanks to Powder for its Dampness I would have thee Live like a Gentleman not like a Land Mar Maid half sool and half Rogue as thou behaves thyself.

Which Letter appears to be writen in the same Hand Writing as that to Mr. Harward.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and tringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in discharging the said Guns, or in writing or sending the said Letters, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person or Persons who did a stually discharge the said Guns, or write the said Letters) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Ac-

complices therein, so that he, she or they may be appropered and convided thereof.
