Whiteball, April 20, 1779. ESTERDAY Morning Lieutenant-Colonel Campbell, of the 7tft Regiment of Foot, arrived in Town from Georgia, by whom a Letter has been received from Major-General Prevoft, commanding His Majefty's Troops in that Province, to the Right Honourable Lord George Germain, One of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State; of which the following is an Extract.

Extrad of a Letter from Major-General Prevoft to Lord George Germain. Dated Head Quarters, Ebenezer in Georgia, March 5, 1779

I DID myself the Honor on the 19th of January last to acquaint your Lordship of my having arrived at Savannah, and, agreeable to the Commander in Chief's Instructions, taking upon me the Chief Command of His Majesty's Troops in this Province.

As foon afterwards as the proper Arrangements could be made, Lieutenant-Colonel Campbell was detached up the River with a felect Corps of about Soo Regular Troops, and fome Irregulars, to endeavour to penetrate to Augusta, and to open the Communication with the back Inhabitants of the Provinces. The Colonel effected his March to Augusta with few Obstructions, and without any Loss, notwithstanding the Length of the Road and the Difficulties of the Country he had to pass through.

Lieutenant-Colonel Prevoft, with a confiderable Detachment, had been fent to fuftain, join, or otherwife co-operate with Colonel Campbell, as should be judged best for His Majesty's Service, and had taken Post at Briar Creek, to keep the Enemy below in Check, and to cover the Advance when necessfary.

vance when necenary. But because of the Length and Difficulty of the Communication, it was judged proper for the Whole to fall back to Hudson's Ferry, Twentyfour Miles above this, and which now forms the upper Extremity of our Chain on the River. Colonel Campbell has fince gone to Savanuah, to eftablish, in confequence of his Instructions from His Majesty's Commissioners, fome Civil Regulations in the Province previous to his Departure for England & And here, though I must lament the Loss His Majesty's Service will fustain in the Absence of fo able and active an Officer, I think it no unfavourable Circumstance however, that one fo every Way capable will have the Honor of giving your Lordship every necessary Information regarding the Service of this Country : His penetrating to far into it, gave him good Opportu-

nity of knowing it; and his being fully poffeffed of all my Ideas, which are also his own with regard to prefent Circumflances and future Views, he has it much better in his Power to communicate them verbally, than I can in Writing; to him therefore I beg Leave to refer your Lordship. He is also acquainted with the Situation and State of the Rebels as well as of the King's Army, and knows the Resources and Expectations of each.

Captain Parker, of His Majefty's Ship Phœnix, and commanding the Squadron on this Service, is also about to leave us, in Compliance with his Inftructions from Rear-Admiral Gambier.

Itructions from Rear-Admiral Gambier. I cannot fufficiently express to your Lordship the high Sense I have of that Gentleman's active Zeal for the Service, and his ready and chearfol Concurrence and Co-operation, when he could either act or affift. The most happy Cordiality has conflantly substituted between the Departments; and though I hope that will always continue, yet the Departure of such an Officer may not easily be made up to us in this Quarter. We may also feel this Diminution of our Naval Force, which, to be fure, was never more than adequate to the Service.

I now proceed to inform your Lordihip, that fome Days ago Intelligence being received that the Rebels, in confiderable Force, had taken Post at Briar, Creek, 13 Miles above our Post at Hudson's, and that they were bufied in repairing the Bridge, (which had been defiroyed by Colonel Campbelli n his Return downwards) as if intending to advance by that Route, our Post was reinforced, and Dif-positions fecretly made to give them a proper Reception: And it being much to be withed that they would put the Creek in their Rear, which would put it in our Power to attack them on advantageous Ground, Means were used to inspire them with Confidence to attempt it. But after waiting z Days, finding that they meant only to establish them. felves there for the Purpole of hampering us in our Quarters, and cutting us off from all Communica-tion with the Upper Country, and perhaps had Views of Co operation with their Main Army, it was judged proper to diflodge them. Accordingly Major M'Pherson, with the 1st Battalion 71st Regi-ment, and some Irregulars, with Two Field Pieces, was directed by Lieutenant-Colonel Prevoft to advance towards the Bridge to mark the Movements he himfelf had made with the 2d Battalion 71ft Regiment, a Corps of Light Infantry commanded by Sir James Baird, and Three Companies of Grenadiers of the Florida Brigade, with which he took a long Circuit of Fifty Miles to crofs the Creek above them, and endeavour to gain their Rear; Difpositions were also made by the Army to favor the Attempt, and to amufe and keep Mr. Lincoln in Check, fhould he in the mean Time attempt any Thing

Thing in this Quarter. Our Plan was happily effected. The Rebels being in some Measure fur-priz d, on the 3d Initant were totally deteated and dispersed, with the Lofs of Seven Pieces of Cannon, feveral Stand of Colours, almoit all their Arms, all their Ammunition and Baggage, which were left to the victorious Troops, the Intrepidity and Be-haviour of which I am entreated by Lieutenant-Colonel Prevoft to report to your Lordship to be laid before His Majetty. Permit me at the fame Time to mention him as a Perfon deferving fome Mark of His Maj ity's Royal Favour, his indefati-gable Activity and his faithful Services intitle him to your Lordihip's Patronage.

The fecond in Command, Brigadier General Elbert, one of their bell Officers, feveral more of Note, in the Whole Twenty-feven Officers, were taken, with near Two Hundred Men, about 150 were killed on the Field of Battle and adjoining Woods and Swamp; but their chief Lofs confuts in the Number of Officers and Men drowned in attempting to fave themselves from the Slaughter, and plung-

ing into a deep and rapid River. The Lois on our Side was only Five Private killed, and One Officer and Ten Privates wounded. The Rebels, by the belt Accounts, were above I wo Thoufand. Their Commiffary, our Prifoner, fays, Two Thoufand Five Hundred. On our Side Three Grenadier Companies of the 60th Regiment, Sir James Baird's Light Infantry, the 2d Battalion 71it Regiment, Captain Tawes's Troop of Light Dragoons, with about 150 Provincials, Rangers and Militia, making in all about 900, composed the Corps that attacked.

The yood Confequences of this Defeat will, I ppe, foon appear. The Rebels will not again difhope, foon appear. turb us in this Province. Our Communication with our back Friends and the Indians will be open; and though I cannot think it prudent to extend immediately far upwards; in the mean Time, whilit we guard what we have already got, we hold ourfelves in Readinefs to catch at further favourable Incidents, as they may occur.

I have only to add to your Lordship, that I wish you to be affured that nothing within the Compass of my Abilities shall be left undone, that may be thought to tend to the Advantage of His Majesty's Service.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS the King, in Parliament, being defirous to reftore the Bleffings of Reconciliation and Peace to Great Britain and the Colonies, did, in the Course of the last Year, repeal certain Acts, which were found to have excited Jealoufies, and to have given Apprehensions of Danger to Liberty in the faid Colonies: And whereas the Inhabitants of Georgia have acknow-ledged, that the benevolent Overtures of Great Britain in that Respect are such as come up to every Wifh that they, in the Hour of temperate Delibe-

ration, or the utmost Apprehensions of Danger to Liberty, had ever expressed, and have sealed that Acknowledgment by the facred Teffimony of their just Allegiance to the Crown:

We, the Commanding Officers of His Majeffy's Fleet and Army, from a juft Regard to the Welfare of Georgia, and for the Prefervation of Peace and good Order among its Inhabitants, do hereby declare, that all the Laws of the Province of Georgia, which were in Force at the End of the Year 1775, are and fhall continue in full Force until fuch Time as a Period of lefs Difquiet shall enable a future General Affembly to alter or amend them. And, for the more immediate and effectual Execution of Juffice, without which the Property of Individuals cannot be fafe, public Confidence reftored, nor domestic Tranquility confirmed, we hereby nominate and appoint the following Gentlemen to the feveral Departments of the Civil Government in Georgia, till His Majefty's Pleasure is known, namely,

LIEUTENANT Colonel Campbell adds to Life of Artraiver Coloner Campbell adds to the foregoing Accounts, that at Augusta and round it, the Inhabitants, to the Number of 1400 Men, fubmitted, fwore Allegiance to the King, took the Benefit of His Majefty's gracious Protec-tion, and were formed into 20 Companies, in the Stile of Militia, for the Defence of their Property against the Incursions of the Rebels from Carolina.

That after his Return down the Country Intelligence was received, that a Body of the Loyalis' of North and South Carolina, confifting of about 600 Men, after being repulsed by the Rebels, were in Search

Search of the Royal Army by the back or upper Road. That the advanced Part of the Army was immediately moved towards them; and that 300 of them joined the King's Troops, and are formed under their own Leaders with every possible Attention and Encouragement,

That fince the last Action many Deferters from the Continental Troops in Carolina had come in, and were forming into Companies; and that a Lieutenant Colonel and 30 Men had arrived in one Night immediately before his Departure.

Petersburg, March 26. The King of Great Britain having been graciously pleased to nominate James Harris. Efq; His Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at this Court, to be a Knight Companion of the Moft Honourable Order of the Bath; and his Majesty being desirous that he should be knighted and invested with the Enfigus of the faid Örder in the most honourable and most diftinguished Manner, Mr. Harris applied to her Imperial Majesty the Empress of Russia, by Or-der of the Ki. g his Master, to defire she would be pleased to represent His Majesty on this Occasion; to which his Imperial Majelly very readily conient-ed, expressing in the floongest Terms her Sentiments of Friendship and Affection towards His Britannick Majefly, and was at the fame Time pleafed to appoint. Sunday the 21st Instan:, immediately after Divine service, for the Pestormance of the Ceremony, which was as follows :

Mr. Harris having, at Noon, repaired to the Palace according to Appointment, he was there re-ceived by the Grand Master of the Ceremonies, who conducted him into the Audience-Room, where her Imperial Majefty was attended by Count Panin, the Vice-Chancellor, and Marshal Galitzin, her Aide-de-Camp in Waiting; the Great Duke and Dutches, and all the principal Officers of the Court, being in an adjacent Apartment, with the Folding-Doors open. Mr. Harris being introduced by the Grand Mafter of the Ceremonics, made a low Reverence on his Entrance, a fecond in the Middle of the Room, and a third on his approaching her Imperial Majefty; and Mr. Harris then kneeling, her Imperial Majefty immediately invested him with the Ribbon and Badge of the Order; and then taking from a Table a Gold-hilted Sword richly ornamented with Diamonds, the Emprefs touched his Left Shouider Three Times with it, pronouncing thele Words, Soyez Bon et Honorable Chevalier du Nom de Dieu; and on Sir James Harris's rifing up, and kiffing her Imperial Majetty's Hand, the Empress added, Et pour vous prouver combien Je suis contente de vous, Je vous fais Present de l'Epée avec laquelle Je vous ai sait Chevalier. Then Sir James, after expressing to Her Imperial Majesty his respect ful and grateful Senfe of thefe most gracious and extraordinary Marks of Favour, withdrew from the Emprefs's Prefence, obferving the fame Ceremony as at his Entrance.

Copenhagen, April 6. A dreadful Accident hap-pened here last Wednesday, by the blowing up of a Powder Magazine in the Bastion of the East Gate; by which feveral People were killed, the Sailors Cafernes ruined, and feveral of the fineft Palaces and Houses, though fituated at a very great Distance, very confiderably damaged. The Cause of this Missortune is at prefent unknown.
