An Act for making and repairing several Roads round the City of Bristol.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of several Acts of Parliament made in the Tenth Year of the Reign of Queen Anne, the Eighth Year of King George the First, and the Twenty-second Year of His late Majesty, for repairing the Road leading from Kilburn Bridge in the County of Middlesex, to Sparrow's Herne in the County of Hertford.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Eleventh Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for repairing and widening several Roads leading to the Town of Lantrifent; and also the Road leading from Newbridge to a Place called the Old Furnace, all in the County of Glamorgan.

Dresden, May 5. The Whole of the Prussian Army in this Electorate has taken every Step preparatory to their Marching, but hitherto neither of the Columns have begun to move.

Vienna, May 6. The Emperor has been pleased to appoint Lieutenant-General Count Joseph Coloredo to the Command of the whole Artillery of this Monarchy, with the same Powers which were enjoyed by Prince Kinsky, but without the Title of Grand Maitre.

The Command of the Troops in Italy, vacant by the Death of Marshal Wied, has been bestowed upon General Count Xaverius Harrach. The Regiment of Deuxponts, Dragoons, has been given to the Second Prince of Waldeck; the Regiment will however retain its former Name.

Copenhagen, May 8. A Placart has been published, dated April 19, prescribing certain Premiums and Regulations for the sending and importation of Provisions and other Merchandize to and from the Danish West-India Islands, with other Points relative to the West-India Trade.
