Bits Majely, being determined to take Juch Mea. fures as are necessary for vindicating the Honor of His Crown, is pleased, by and with the Advice of Hic Privy Conncil, to order, and it is hereby or-dered, That General Reprizals be granted against the Ships, Goods, and Subjects of the King of Spain, fo that as well His Majefty's Fleet and Ships, as also all other Ships and Veffels that shall be commillionated by Letters of Marque or General Reprizals, or otherwife, by His Majefty's Commif-fioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, shall and may lawfully feize all Ships, Veffels, and Goods belonging to the King of Spain or his Subjects, or others inhabiting within any the Territories of the King of Spain, and bring the fame to Judgment in any of the Courts of Admiralty within His Majefly's Domi-nions; and to that End His Majefly's Advocate-General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are forthwith to prepare the Draught of a Commission, and prefent the fame to His Majefly at this Board, authorizing the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, or any Person or Perfons by them empowered and appointed, to iffue forth and grant Letters of Marque and Reprizal to any of His Majesty's Subjects, or others whom the faid Commissioners shall deem fitly qualified in that Behalf, for the apprehending, feizing, and taking the Ships, Veffels, and Goods belonging to Spain, and the Vaffals and Subjects of the King of Spain, or any inhabiting within his Countries, Territories, or Dominions; and that such Powers and Claufes be inferted in the faid Commission as have been usual, and are according to former Precedents: And His Majefty's faid Advocate General, with the Advocate of the Admiralty, are also forthwith to prepare the Draught of a Commission, and prefent the fame to His Majefty at this Board, authorizing the faid Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral, to will and require the High Court of Admiralty of Great Britain, and the Lieutenant and Judge of the faid Court, his Surro gate or Surrogates, as also the feveral Courts of Admiralty within His Majesty's Dominions, to take Cognizance of and judicially proceed upon, all and all Manner of Captures, Seizures, Prizes and Reprizals of all Ships and Goods that are or fhall he taken, and to hear and determine the fame; and according to the Course of Admiralty, and the Laws of Nations, to adjudge and condemn all fuch Ships, Veffels and Goods as shall belong to Spain, or the Vaffals and Subjects of the King of Spain, or to any others inhabiting within any of his Countries, Territories and Dominions; and that fuch Powers and Clauses be inferted in the faid Commission as have been usual and are according to former Precedents; and they are likewife to prepare and lay before His Majesty at this Board, a Draught of such Instructions as may be proper to be fent to the Courts of Admiralty in His Majesty's Foreign Governments and Plantations, for their Guidance herein; as also another Draught of Instructions for fuch Ships as shall be commissionated for the Purpofes aforementioned.

The KING's Moft Excellent Majefty in Council. W HEREAS Their late Majefties King William the Third and Queen Mary, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of England, bearing Date the Eighth Day of March, in the Sixth Year of their Reign, did demife and grant unto Craven Howard, John Harrington, Hugh Marchant, and Huntley Bigg, their Executors, Adminifitators and Affigns, for the Term of Ninety nine Years from the Date thereof, the Ufe of all fuch Waters as run down the Common Sewer's within the Bills of Mortality, except the Waters that run down the Common Sewers within the City and Li berties of London, and fuch Waters as are invefted in the Lord Mayor, Commonalty and Citizens of Londo by Act of Parliament, for the driving Mills to be crefted for the more convenient ferving of feweral Places of the Town with Thames and other

Waters: In which Letters Patent it was provided, that the faid Letters Patent, or any Thing therein contained, should not extend, or be continued to extend, to give Privilege to the faid Grantees to make any other Use of the faid Waters than for the Purposes aforefaid, or such others as should not be any ways prejudicial to the natural Ule of the f.: J Sewers ; and that the faid Grantees should not, by any Use of the faid Sewers, bring any extraordinary Charge upon the Inhabitants for repairing and amending the faid Sewers oftener than formerly; And it was also provided, that if at any Time thereafter, during the Term thereby granted, it fhould be made appear unto Their faid Majefties, Their Heirs or Succeffors, or an. Six of Their Frivy Council, that the faid Grant or Demife was or fhould be prejudicial or inconvenient to Their Majefties Subjects in general, that then it fhould and might be lawful for Their faid Majettics, Their Heirs or Succeffors, by Advice of Their Privy Council, to determine the faid Letters Patent. And whereas by fublequent Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of England, bearing Date the Second Day of May, in the Eighth Year of the Reign of His faid late Majefty King William the Third, His faid late Majetty did grant unto the feveral Perfons in the faid former Letters Patent named, their Executors, Administrators and Aifigns, Liberty, Fower and Authority to erect and build, upon their own Ground, Overfhot Mills and Water-works, and lay Pipes in and to the River Thames, and to convey Water from thence for the Supplying the Inhabitants therewith ; and also to lay Pipes from the faid Water-works in the Publick Streets; to have, hold and exercise the fame during the Term of Years by the faid former Letters Patent granted. And whereas the Commiffioners of Sewers for the City and Liberty of Weltminster, and Part of the County of Middletex, have, by their Petition to His Majeft, at this Board, (after reciting the atorelaid two Letters Patent) fet forth, That the faid Grantees, in Purluance of the faid Letters Patent, did erect an Overthot Mill and Waterworks in and upon a Piece of Ground lying on the Weft Side of a Street or Lane, formerly called Hartshorne Lane, and fince called Northumberland freet, in the Parish of St. Martin in the Fields in the Liberty of Wellminster and County of Middlefex, and therewith did ferve the Inhabitants in that Part of the City and Liberty of Westminster with Water from the River Thames for a great Number of Years; but for these Six Years last past, and upwards, the faid Mill and Works, fo turned and worked with the Water of the Sewers, has been converted into a Corn-mill, and is and has been conflantly used for the Purpose of a Grist-mill, and no Water whatsoever has been raifed thereby from the Thames, for the Use of the Inhabitants; which the Petitioners flate to have been the principal Motive that induced His faid late Majefty to make the faid Grant :-That the Owners or Occupiers of the faid Mill have not only, from Time to Time, placed Trunks and Pipes of a confiderable Size, in the Sewers of St. Martin's Lane and the Strand, but have laid and made Dams therein, in order to stay and prevent the Currency of the Water in the faid Sewer to the Thames, and to force the Water down to their faid Mill; and in particular have erected fuch Dams to the Heighth of feveral Feet, quite across the main Sewer in the Strand, near Northumberland Street aforefaid, to turn and force the Water down a private Sewer there that runs under Northumberland Court to their faid Mill; by which Means the Water in the faid publick Sewer is frequently flopped, and made to rife feveral Feet in Heighth ; whereby the Sewer is damaged, and the Water is forced into the Cellars and Kitchens of many of the Inhabitants in the Parts adjacent, to their great Annoy-ance and Damage; and that the faid Commiffioners have been at very great Expence to repair fuch Da-mages, which mult fall upon the Publick, the Petitioners not having been able to prevail on the Own-ers or Occupiers of the faid Mill to make any Sa-tisfaction for the fane, though occasioned by their aforefaid Works in the faid Sewers, and though frequently applied to for that Purpoie; Wherefore and in regard the Water in the faid Sewers, or the faid
