The humble Address of the Magistrates and Town Council of the Burgh of North Berwick.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Magistrates and Town Council of your a-tient Burgh, animated with the most ardent and sincere Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, humbly beg Leave to assure your Majesty, on the present Emergency of Affairs, when the united Force of the House of Bourbon, fraught with ambitious and dangerous Designs, threatens Destruction to your Majesty's Dominions, that we will, to the utmost of our Power, give every Support to the Defence of your Person and Government; which will be with our Lives and Fortunes.

May the Most High, by whom Princes reign and Empires are supported, render abortive all the Attacks of your Enemies. And we pray that your Majesty may live long, and hand down to your Posterity the Imperial Throne of Great Britain undiminished in it's Splendor.

The King has been pleased to constitute and appoint Soame Jenyns, Esq; the Honorable Robert Spencer, commonly called Lord Robert Spencer, the Honorable Charles Greville, William Eden, Esq; Thomas De Grey, Esq; Andrew Stuart, Esq; and Edward Gibbon, Esq; to be His Majesty's Commissioners for Trade and Plantation.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Gloucester, for electing a Bishop of that See, void by the Death of Dr: William Warburton, late Bishop thereof; and also a Letter recommending the Right Reverend Father in God James, now Bishop of St. David's, to be chosen by the said Dean and Chapter Bishop of the said See of Gloucester.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of St. David, for electing a Bishop of that See, void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God James, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Gloucester; and also a Letter recommending John Warren, Doctor in Divinity, to be chosen by the said Dean and Chapter Bishop of the said See of St. David.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, Lord Advocate of Scotland, to be Keeper of His Majesty's Signet in Scotland.

The King has been pleased to order Letters Patent to be passed under the Great Seal of the Kingdom of Ireland, containing Grants of the Dignity of Baronet of the said Kingdom unto the following Gentlemen and their Heirs Male, viz.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,
For recalling and prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States.

G E O R G E R.

WHEREAS We are informed, that great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever and wheresoever, being Our natural born Subjects, who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such Foreign Services, and return Home to their Native Countries: And further, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever, being Our natural-born Subjects, from entering, and do charge and command them, and every of them, from henceforth to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever without Our Special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience and exact Conformity: And we do hereby publish and declare, That the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt, according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do hereby declare, That if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men, (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Turks, Algerines,
