THE following Addresses having been transmitted to the Lord Viscount Weymouth, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, have been presented to His Majesty: Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council of the City of Exeter, in Chamber assembled.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

ANimated with the warmest Sentiments of Duty and Attachment to your Majesty's Royal Person and Government, we your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen and Common-Council of the City of Exeter, beg Leave, in this Time of public Alarm, to assure your Majesty of our steady and most zealous Support in the Prosecution of the present War, against the United Strength of the House of Bourbon. We are fully sensible of your Majesty's pacific Disposition towards those Powers, who not only unprovoked, but regardless of the repeated Instances of your Majesty's Friendship and Moderation, have voluntarily entered into the Contest subsisting with your Majesty's revolted Subjects in America, in Breach of public Faith, and with a View only of gratifying their own ambitious Designs.

Amidst the Difficulties, which surround us, we cannot, however, but reflect with the highest Satisfaction on the Success which attended the British Arms in former Times, when the Spirit of the Nation was called forth and fully exerted. The same Spirit still exists; and relying on the Justice of our Cause, we trust that, under the Divine Providence, your Majesty will be enabled, by the vigorous Efforts of your Subjects, and the distinguished Valour and Ability of your Majesty's Forces, to humiliate the Pride, and frustrate the unjust Attempts of your Enemies; and to convince them of the Danger of insulting the Honour of your Majesty's Crown, and invading the Rights of Great Britain.

On our Part we shall be always ready to stand forth in the Defence of our Country, and for the Preservation of our happy Constitution; and most earnestly pray, that your Majesty may long continue the Guardian and Protector of a Free, Brave and United People.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty, The humble and dutiful Addressees of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Freeholders and Heritors of the County of Stirling.

WE, your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Freeholders and Heritors of the County of Stirling, think it our

Duty in the present important Crisis of publick Affairs, to express our firm Attachment to your Majesty's Person, Family, and Government, and our Gratitude for the Happiness we have enjoyed since your Majesty's Accession to the Throne of your Ancestors. Convinced that your Majesty's Conduct to Foreign States has been guided by the same Principles of Equity and Moderation that have been so conspicuous in your Government at Home, it is with the highest Indignation and Resentment we have seen those ambitious Powers, who have so often disturbed the Tranquility and menaced the Liberties of Europe, combined in the most hostile Measures against your Majesty's Kingdoms; and justifying these Measures on Pretences the most frivolous and ill-founded. But as the unjust and aspiring Views of the Princes of the House of Bourbon have, on many former Occasions, been checked and defeated by the spirited Exertions of the British Nation, we trust, that through the Divine Blessing on your Councils and Arms, and supported by your own Magnanimity, and the Zeal and Affection of brave and generous Subjects, your Majesty will be enabled to resist and repel, and finally triumph over the united Efforts of France and Spain. Though in this Hour of Danger and Alarm, we cannot but express our Regret, that a national Militia has not been extended to this Part of the united Kingdom; and that your faithful Subjects here have been precluded from that best and most constitutional Defence; we beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that in our Sphere we shall contribute with Cheerfulness to every Expence, and co-operate with Ardour in every Measure that may be judged most conducive to the Protection of your Kingdoms, and to the Maintenance of the Honour and Dignity of your Crown.

AT *Stirling*, the Tenth Day of *July*, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-nine Years, the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Heretors, and Freeholders of the County of *Stirling*, assembled in the Town Hall, in Pursuance of a publick Intimation by the Sheriff, at Desire of His Majesty's Advocate, the most Honourable the Marquis of *Graham* in the Chair; and considering the Necessity of an immediate Supply of Seamen to man the Navy in the present Conjuncture of Publick Affairs; the Meeting resolved to address His Majesty; and an Address was framed, approved, and subscribed by the Præses, in Presence and by Appointment of the Meeting accordingly, and ordered to be transmitted to the Right Honourable Sir *Lawrance Dundas*, in Absence of the County Member, to be presented to His Majesty.

And the Meeting further resolved, in order to

show their Zeal and Readiness to contribute every Thing in their Power to the strengthening the Hands of Government, by the procuring of Volunteers for the speedy manning of the Navy, that they will raise by Subscriptions such a Sum as shall enable them to offer Bounties for that Purpose; and the Members present subscribed liberally on a Paper of this Date; and in order that the Noblemen, Gentlemen, and others of the County, whose Business or Residence elsewhere has prevented their Attendance this Day, may have an Opportunity of subscribing and contributing also, the Meeting resolved, that the Præses shall send circular Letters to them, requesting their Subscriptions; and that Mr. McKillop, their Clerk, find proper Hands to send Subscription Papers through the County, along with Lord Graham's Letters; and that the Money shall be paid in to the Clerk, and be issued by him according to the Directions of the following Gentlemen, who are hereby appointed a Committee, to the Effect following, viz. Sir James Dunbar, of Mochrum, Bart, William Morehead, Esq; of Herberthshire, William Caddell, Esq; of Banton, John Napier, Esq; of Craiganal, and David Gourlay, Esq; of Hepdarroch, or any Two of them, to apply the Money subscribed in the Manner they shall find most conducive for that Purpose; and appointed Mr. Gourlay Conveener of the Committee, with Power also to him to call a General Meeting of the County upon this Business, when he or the Committee shall think fit; and ordained these Resolutions to be published in the Edinburgh Newspapers, and Extract to be transmitted to London, with the Address (signed) Graham. To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

May it please your Majesty,

YOUR dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Master, Wardens, and Commonalty of the Society of Merchant-Venturers of the City of Bristol, ever zealous for the Welfare of your Kingdoms, your Majesty's Royal Person and Family, and the Government, as by Law established, beg Leave to approach your Majesty, at this Time of public Threatning, with our humble Address.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most gracious Sovereign,

AT this important Period, when your Majesty's Arms are engaged in reclaiming your revolted Subjects in America, and in repelling the combined and unprovoked Attempts of France and Spain, We, your Majesty's Subjects, who from your Colonies have taken Refuge in Great Britain, beg Leave to approach the Throne with Hearts and Lives devoted to your Majesty's Person and Government, and to offer our unfeigned Thanks for those unparalleled Exertions which your Majesty has been pleased to make, for the Relief and Protection of your faithful Colonial Subjects:—And, notwithstanding your Majesty's Arms have not been attended with all the Effect which those Exertions promised, and from which Occasion has been taken to raise an indiscriminate Charge of Dissaffection in the Colonists;—we beg Leave, some of us from our own Knowledge, and others from the best Information, to assure your Majesty, that the greater Number of your Subjects in the confederated Colonies, notwithstanding every Art to seduce, every Device to intimidate, and a Variety of Oppressions to compel them to abjure their Sovereign, entertain the firmest Attachment and Allegiance to your Majesty's sacred Person and Government.—In Support of these Truths, we need not appeal to the Evidence of our own Sufferings; it is notorious, that we have sacrificed all which the most loyal Subjects could forego, or the happiest could possess: But with Confidence we appeal to the Struggles made against the Usurpations of the Congress, by Counter Resolves in very large Districts of Country, and to the many unsuccessful Attempts by Bodies of the Loyal in Arms, which have subjected them to all the Rigours of inflamed Resentment;—we appeal to the Sufferings of Multitudes, who for their Loyalty have been subjected to Insults, Fines, and Imprisonments, patiently enduring all, in the Expectation of that Period, which shall restore to them the Blessings of your Majesty's Government;—we appeal to the Thousands now serving in your Majesty's Armies, and in Private Ships of War, the former exceeding in Number the Troops enlisted to oppose them;—finally, we make a melancholy Appeal to the many Families who have been banished from their once peaceful Habitations; to the public Forfeiture of a long List of Estates; and to the numerous Executions of our Fellow Citizens, who have sealed their Loyalty with their Blood.—If any Colony or District, when covered or possessed by your Majesty's Troops, had been called upon to take Arms, and had refused; or if any Attempts had been made to form the Loyal as Militia, or otherwise, and it had been declined, we should not on this

Occasion

Occasion have presumed thus to address your Majesty: but if on the contrary, no general Measure to the above Effect was attempted, if Petitions from Bodies of your Majesty's Subjects, who wished to rise in Aid of Government, have been neglected, and the Representations of the most respectable Loyalists disregarded, we assure ourselves that the Equity and Wisdom of your Majesty's Mind will not admit of any Impressions injurious to the Honour and Loyalty of your faithful Subjects in those Colonies.

Revering and firmly attached to the British Constitution, which it has been the Glory of your Majesty's Family to strengthen, and of your Reign to improve, we lament the Infatuation of such of our Fellow-Subjects in America, who, acting upon different Principles, or deluded by their Leaders, have thrown aside their just Allegiance, and cast themselves upon the Assistance of the ancient Enemy of their Country, Liberties, and Religion; an Alliance which may enslave, but never can establish the Happiness of your Colonists.—Animated with these Sentiments, we supplicate the Supreme Disposer of Events, to crown your Majesty's Endeavours with a Success proportioned to the Righteousness of your Cause; to frustrate the ambitious Designs of your Enemies; and finally to restore to your Majesty's Subjects in America, that mild Government, under which they long enjoyed so much Felicity.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,
For recalling and prohibiting Seamen from serving Foreign Princes and States.

GEORGE R.
WHEREAS We are informed, that great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, Our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of Our Kingdom; We have therefore thought it necessary, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever and wheresoever, being Our natural-born Subjects, who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they, and every of them, do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such Foreign Services, and return Home to their Native Countries: And further, We do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatsoever, being Our natural-born Subjects, from entering, and do charge and command them, and every of them,

from henceforth to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State; or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever without Our Special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf; to all which We expect due Obedience and exact Conformity: And we do hereby publish and declare, That the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur Our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt, according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And We do hereby declare, That if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights; and other Seafaring Men, (being Our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Turks, Algerines, or any others; they shall not be reclaimed by Us as Subjects of Great Britain.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Thirtieth Day of June, One thousand seven hundred and seventy-nine, in the Nineteenth Year of Our Reign.
