And the Meeting, in order to carry their Refolutions into Execution, nominate and appoint the Right Honourable the Earl of Kintore, the Right Honourable the Viscount of Arbuthnott, Lord Adam Gordon, Lord Gardenston and Monboddo, Sir Alexander Ramfay, Sir David Carnegie, Sir James Nicolfon, Sir William Ogilvy, Mr. Barclay of Ury, Mr. Carnegie of Pittarrow, Mr. Duncan of Muchells, Mr. Auldjo, Mr. Foulerton, Mr. Scott of Commieston, Mr. David Scott, Mr. Scott of Brotherton, Doctor Young, or any Five of them, as a Committee; and this Meeting in the first Place inflantly appoint their Prefes to form a proper Address at the Sight of the Meeting, and to trans-mit it to Lord Adam Gordon, to be by him, or his Directions, presented to His Majelty in the most proper and respectful Manner; and also to form a Subscription Paper, according to the Spirit of these Refolutions, to be inftantly subscribed by the Gentlemen prefent, and Copies thereof, together with Copies of these Resolutions, to be sent to every Gentleman of the County by proper Perfons, to folicit their Subscription and Adherence to these Refolutions, and alfo Copies transmitted to such of the Members of the County as refide at a Diffance; and they name and appoint Robert Burne, Writer in Stonhaven, the Clerk of the prefent Meeting, to be Clerk to the further Procedure in this Affair, and to transmit the Subscription Papers, &c. as above directed, and to get printed Copies of them for the Purpole, and this he is appointed to do without Delay; and the Meeting appoint the Committee to meet for the First Time in the House of James Andrew, at Bridge of Leapie, upon the Twentyfourth Inftant; and they appoint the Clerk to form from these Resolutions a proper Abstract, to be infert in the Edinburgh and Aberdeen News-papers. Most Gracious Sovereign, W E, your Majesty's loyal Subjects, the Justices of the Peace and Commissioners of the Land-Tax, and other Proprietors of Land within the Stewartry of Kirkcudbright, affembled this Day at the Head Burgh of the Stewartry, beg Permiffion to offer your Majefly our warmeit Affurances of Attachment to your Royal Perfon and Family, and of Zeal for the Safety and Honour of your Dominions, in this critical Situation of Public Af-Zairs.

Confcions of the Dignity of our Situation as Subjects of the British Empire, it has ever been our most earnest Defire that its political and commercial Rights be inviolably preferved; Rights which have on repeated Occasions called forth the Ambition and Envy of the faithlefs Houfe of Bourbon in unavailing Efforts to infringe them : For the Wildom of British Councils, and the Spirit of British Subjects, have hitherto, by the Bleffing of Providence, rendered those Efforts ineffectual.

At this important Juncture, a speedy Supply of Seamen for manning your Majesty's Fleet appears an Object meriting the ferious Attention of every Friend to the Religion and Liberties of his Country.

To contribute every Aid within our Power towards this most necessary Measure is the Purpose of the prefent Meeting. Premiums have been held out by it to induce Seamen to become Volunteers on Board the Royal Navy; and where Rewards may prove ineffectual, we confider it our Duty to force proper Perfons into the Service of their Country, by fuch compulsory Measures as are not repugnant to its Laws.

Permit us, most gracious Sovereign, in our own Names, and in the Names of your other Subjects in this County, to affure your Majefty, that our Fortunes and our Lives shall ever be devoted to fruf. trate the Attempts of the Enemies of Great Britain.

May it please your Majesty, WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Representatives of the Royal Boroughs of Scotland, in Annual Convention affembled, humbly beg Leave to approach your Throne, to express our firm Attachment to your Majefty, and our determined Refolution to act in Behalf of our Country against her ancient Enemies

We have beheld, with Concern and Indignation, the Trade of your Majefty's Colonies, which of Right belongs to your Realms, by the unnatural Conduct of your rebellious Subjects, transferred to the Hands of your Enemies, who, after infidioufly fupporting the Rebellion of your Subjects, have commenced open Hostilities against your Majesty.

As Representatives of a large Body of the mer-cantile Part of your Majefty's Subjects, we are confcious that it is our Duty to exert ourfelves to carry on fo just a War; -attended that War may be with fome Inconvenience and Interruption to Trade in the mean Time; but it is effential to its future. Security. The most effectual Aid we can give, is, by exerting ourfelves to the utmost in enabling your Majesty to reduce your Enemies to Reason, by encreasing your Maritime Force; and we have taken such Measures as to us were attainable to promote this End.

In the General Convention of the Royal Boroughs of Scotland, holden at the City of Edinburgh on the Fourteenth Day of July, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Seventynine Years, by their Commissioners therein affembled.

THE which Day the Commissioner from Dunbar moved, That, as this Kingdom was prefently at War with France and Spain, the Convention fliould
