At a Meeting of the Noblemen, Gentlemen, Freeholders, Heritors, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply, of the County of Forfar,

Sir John Ogilvy, of Invercarity, Baronet, in the Chair.

THE Meeting, desirous, in this Time of Difficulty and Danger, to testify by their Conduct their Duty to the King, their Attachment to His Government, and their Regard for their Country, Resolve Unanimously to support, to the utmost of their Abilities, the Naval Power of Great Britain; and, for that End, to offer Bounties to all Seamen belonging to this County, who within the Space of Three Months shall voluntarily engage to serve on board His Majesty's Fleet.

For this Purpose they propose to assess themselves to the Extent of Five Shillings Sterling upon every Hundred Pounds Scots of valued Rent, and to lodge Subscription Papers with Provost John Ure, of Forfar, Clerk to this Meeting, with the several Members of the under-named Committee, and with the Magistrates of all Royal Burghs within this County, for receiving the Subscriptions of those on the Roll, and the voluntary Contributions of such Persons as are not on the Roll of the County, and who are of Opinion with this Meeting that Bounty Money should be given.

They appoint the Earl of Panmure, Sir John Ogilvy, of Invercarity, Baronet, Sir David Carnegie, of Southesk, Baronet, William Douglas, of Bridgetown, George Carnegie, of Pitarrow, James Gardyne, of Middletown, George Graham, of Fleemingtown, Patrick Chalmers, of Auldar, and all Justices of Peace within the County of Forfar, any Three of their Number to be a Quorum, as a Committee for advertising the Bounties to be given, for receiving Contributions and Subscriptions, and for distributing the Subscription Money in the Manner most likely to effectuate the Intention of this Meeting; and appoint the First Meeting of the Committee to be at Forfar, the Thirtieth Instant, at Ten o'Clock in the Morning.

As Magistrates, they will give every Assistance to those employed in the Impress Service, and will endeavour to discover and impress such Seamen as do not voluntarily make offer of their Service.

As a further Encouragement to Volunteers, they will take under their Protection the Wives, Widows and Families of all Sailors belonging to this County, who receive their Bounty Money, and engage in the Service of the Navy.

The Meeting recommend it to their Præses to transmit to the Secretary of State a Copy of this Resolution, and to have it published in the Edinburgh News-papers.
