Mosco, April 13. His Court has been of late full of trouble and disorder, occasioned by the indisposi-tion of the young Gzar, with a suspicion that he was poison'd, which, as you have heretofore heard, several persons of quality were charged to have had a hand in, and thereupon committed to prison, and examined, and even put to the torture; but hitherto nothing appears to ground an accusation against any one, and even the suspicion of the Czars being pollon'd is very much lessened. The great preparations which are making by the Ottomans does not a little perplex this Court, which is very fenfible they are intended against them; and therefore the Gzur is endeavouring to make Alliances with his Neighbours, and for that purpose is going to fend Ambassadors to the King of Poland, and to the King of Perfia, which latter, it's thought, may be easily persuaded to break with the Grand seignior, after he shall be engaged in a War against us. The Ministers of the King of Denmark and the Elector of Brandenburg are not wanting to make all such representations to these Ministers, as they think may have any effect upon them, to encline them to a suprifire with Sueden, in which hitherto they have not mer wich the success they defire.

Naples, May 4. This week failed from hence five Galleys of the Duke of Turfis Squadron, having on board 300 men, of those that were last raised, bound for Palermo. Our Vicerop has defired the Marquis de Bayonne to pass to Sicily, so take care of the Kings affairs there, till the Cardinal de Porto Carero, to whom that Government' is committed pro interim, arrives. The Body of the deceased Viceroy, the Marquis de Gastel Rodrigo, is brought hither, and will be transported to Spain to be there intered. From Pal 1mo we have advice, that about men had been sent from thence to reinforce the Garrison of Trapani; and that the Duke de Vivoque was preparing to take the Field. Milan, May 5. The Prince de Ligne our Governout has appointed a General Rendezvous of the Troops in this Dutchy to be held the S instant; in the mega time, those designed for sicity march towards Final, where they are to embarque. From Genous they writes that they had received advice by a Fenuca, that about 40 Sail of French Ships, of which, 12 were Capital Men of Wars and the rest laden with Soldiers, Ammunician, and Provisions, were arrived at Messing the Soldiers consisted in about 4500 men.

Madrid, May 4 The King is arrived at saragofa, having been received with all the honours and respects the place was capable of, and all imaginable demon-

veration of affection in the people; the kings arrival there was on the 1st. instant, and the same day his Majesty took the psual Oath in the Cathedral Church, for the maintaining the priviledges of the Kingdom of Arragon. The Count de Humanea, appointed Ambassador from this Crown to the Emperor, will in sew days begin his journey from hence. People here are much concerned to hear of the great progresses made already this year in Flanders by the French; but what comforts them is, the great expectation they have, that the conclusion of the Campagne will be as much to our advantage, as the beginning has been to our disadvantage, being assured, that the Emperor alone will have near 60000 Meg in the Field, besides the Army of the Prince of Cantes, and the other Princes confederate in this War.

Vietna, May 74. The news we have from Hungary is not very good, for the Rebels feem to prepare to renew the War, which will oblige the Emperor to fend more Forces into those parts to suppress them. The Bishop of Gurck, the first of the Emperors Ambassadors for the Treaty at Nimegaen, has not yet fixed the time for his departre from hence, which he seems not much to hasten. We are told, that the Duke of Lorrain, who commands the Emperors Forces in Germany, has a very unlimited Commission, to act as he shall find best.

Ditto, May 16. The 4th of the next month the Emperor goes to Marienfel, where he will pass some time. At Offen is agrived another Turkish Chiaus, we cannot tell what his business may be; but suppose he comes to give this Gourt an account of the change of the Bass in some one of the Turkish Frontier places. The Bishop of Gurek, as we are informed, has received his Dispatches, and will now in sew days begin his journey to Nimighen.

Copenhigen, May 22. The Baron of Rusenstein is to command the Army this Campagn; he is at present at Landscroon, to mark out a Camp for our Troops; there are already at Landscroon 10000 men, and within 14 days 12000 more will be sent over thither. The Subdest in the mean time are very quiet, the Recruite and Reinforcements they expect from Subden being not yet come up. To morrow the King goes over to Landscroon, and will return again the next day. The Men of War that are designed to go and lie before Cottenhurger are leady to sail.

Hamburg, May 29. The five Lunenbarg Regiments, which have for some time had their chlatters in still territories of the Duke of Mecklepours. have see, ceived orders to march forthwith to jugar the Amberial and Brandenburg Tridops in Pome ren, who will such be in a posture to act against the Enemy till the Sess of section of the month. Strasburg, May 21. The Sieur de Monclat having affembled what Proops he could, the 18th, instant they marched with several pieces of Canon, under the command of the Sicur de la Reque, towards Lorrain, to reinforce el e Mareschal de Crequi who, as we are told, affembles a Body of Troops near St. Diey, and has at prefine in Lorrain an Army of about 20000 men. Colognes May 15. That the Mareschal de Crequi yery narrowly observed the motions of the Enemy, his Forces encamping from Bonzonville as far as Fouille, his head quarter being within four miles

of Meiz.

Paris, May 29. His Majesty having taken a review of his Forces, and given his orders for the operations of this Campagne, parted the 27th. instant from the Army, which was then encamped at Thulin, and would from thence march to Gemblours and Pieton.
