A PROCLAMATION.
GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it hath been represented unto Us, that Endeavours have been, and are still used by the Powers at War with Us, to procure from various Places in Our Dominions a Supply of Arms, Ammunition, Naval Stores, and Provisions for Victualling their Fleets and Armies; and that there is Reason to suspect that some Persons corruptly and traiterously, by Means of Clearances fraudulently obtained for Places within Our Dominions, or within the Territory of Powers in Amity with Us, or by other artful Contrivances, have sent or delivered, or have laden on Board to be sent or delivered, to or for the Use of the French King, or of the King of Spain, or their respective Officers and Subjects, Arms, Ammunition, Naval Stores, and Provisions for Victualling their Fleets and Armies: And whereas such Practices cannot be carried on without the Assistance of many Persons, of whom those not principally concerned therein may be ignorant of the Heinousness of their Offence, and of the Danger in which they are involved: We therefore taking the same into Consideration, and to the Intent, that by the due Execution of the Law, in the Punishment of such Offences, the dangerous and wicked Practices above-mentioned may hereafter be prevented, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and to declare, that every Person who shall be aiding and assisting to the Enemies of Us and Our Kingdom, by supplying them with Arms, Ammunition, Naval Stores, Provisions, or by any other Means giving Aid and Comfort to them, in the Prosecution of the War, levied and carried on against Us and Our Dominions, shall be prosecuted, and, upon Conviction, punished with all the Rigour of the Law against Offences of such Magnitude: And for the better Detection of Persons guilty of the aforesaid Offences, or of Practices tending to effectuate the same, We are graciously pleased to promise, that if any Person shall discover any other Person concerned in sending, transporting, or delivering, or in lading on Board, or in providing for the Purpose of being sent, transported, or delivered, to or to the Use of the French King, or of the King of Spain, or their respective Officers or Subjects, any Arms, Ammunition, Naval Stores or Provisions, during the Continuance of the present War, so that such Person may be apprehended and brought to Justice; such Discoverer shall have and receive as a Reward, upon Conviction of every such Offender, the Sum of Three Hundred Pounds, and also Our Gracious Pardon for the said Offence, in case the Person so discovering shall himself be liable to be prosecuted for the same: And the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Treasurer of Our Exchequer are hereby required to make Payment accordingly of the said Rewards: And we do hereby strictly charge and command all Our Magistrates, and all Officers of Our Customs, and all other Our loving Subjects, that they do, in their several Places and Capacities, use their utmost Diligence to find out, discover and apprehend all Persons offending in Manner before-

mentioned, in order that they may be brought to Justice.

And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of Publick Worship, and to take Care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

Our Will is therefore, and We charge, That incontinent this Our Proclamation seen, ye pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance. And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sheriffs of the several Shires, Stewarts of Stewarties, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published; and We appoint them to send Doubles hereof to the several Paroch Kirks within their Bounds, that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned the same may be published and read from the Pulpits, immediately after Divine Service.

THE Bag of Letters from Leicester, of Monday the 13th Instant, which should have arrived here last Tuesday, not having come to Hand, and there being strong Reason to suspect that the said Bag was stolen at Dunstable on the Night of the 13th Instant, by a Person named Serjeant Taylor, a private Soldier in the Royal Irish Regiment, quartered at Dunstable, who deserted on Friday the 17th Instant.

The said Serjeant Taylor is described to be Twenty Years of Age, Five Feet Ten Inches high, wears his own Hair of a brown Colour clubbed, of a fair Complexion, grey Eyes, strait, well made, and handsome, except that one Leg is rather thicker than the other, was born at Kidderminster, is by Trade a Weaver, was enlisted by Lieutenant Ellis, of the Royal Irish, at Worcester, the 1st of January, 1777, and is supposed to be now dressed in a dark drab Coat, with cross Pockets, enamelled Buttons, a new-fashioned clouded Waist-coat of an orange Ground with black intermixed, and Death-head Buttons, a blue Surcoat of Bath Coating with a crimson Collar, Buckskin Breeches, and a round Hat with two narrow Bands and two Steel Buckles.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the said Serjeant Taylor, will be intitled to a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS.
