

been on their march towards Ruremond. The Munster Troops which came from *Wetteravia*, are at present encamped at *Urdingen* in the lower Diocess, where on Tuesday last they joine those that came from *Wesphalia*, making in all seven Regiments. The Artillery belonging to the *Osnabrug* Troops is arrived here, and we are assured that they will march some time the next week. After what was reported of the march of the *Lunenbourg* Forces, we are somewhat surprized to understand by our Letters from *Francfort* of the 2d instant, that they still continue in their quarters, without that it was known when they would quit them, to the great trouble of the Country people, who desire nothing more impatiently than to be rid of their guests. The *Marquis de los Balagues*, Ambassador of *Spain*, is arriv'd at *Nimeguen*.

Paris, June 3. The *Munster* Troops continue at *Urdingen* in this Diocess, where in a day or two they expect their Bishop, after whose arrival they will continue their march towards *Flanders*. In the mean time 2000 men more of the Bishop of *Paderborne* are marching to join them. The Bishop of *Osnabrug* is expected here some time the next week, and then, it is believed, his Troops will quit their quarters, and begin their march towards the *Meuse*. We have Letters from *Trier* of the 4th instant, which says, that they had new order, that the *Sieur de Monclar* had quite abandoned the *Lower Alsace*, and was marching with what Troops he had drawn together to join the *Marschal de Crequi*, and that the *Duke of Lorrain* upon advice thereof, had sent *Major-General Schultze* with 6000 men to attack *Luzelstein*, which guards the passage into *Alsace*.

Paris, June 4. Some days since we had an account, that the *Marschal de Crequi* was at *Manoy* with an Army of about 20000 men, and that the *Duke of Lorrain* was advanced towards *Marfeld*; but yesterday we received advice, that the *Marschal de Crequi* finding himself too weak for the *Imperialists*, was retired towards *Metz*, to meet the *Marschal de Schomberg*, who is now marching with 24 or 25000 men to join him, and that the *Imperialists* might be the more incommoded in their march after him, he had caused all the Forage and Corn as he marched, to be destroyed. *Colonel de Witt*, with 300 *Dragoons* has taken the Castle of *Kircheln*, the French Garrison that was there marching to *Metz*, so that now the *Imperialists* are possessed of all the Castles and Places of strength on the *Saar*, the party of *Luxemburg* being abroad, and having pass'd the *Meuse* not far from *Metz*, had the good fortune to meet with the *Sieur de Roy*, formerly Intendant of *Philipburg*, coming with a good sum of Money from

Hague, *June 5.* The Ships designed for the Spanish service, in the *Mediterranean*, are now fitting out with all the diligence possible, upon the assurance the Admiralties have received, of the speedy payment of the monies due to them on that account. The *Sieur Everx* is already abroad with several Men of War to secure our Navigation against the French Capers. *Don Emanuel de Lyra*, the Envoy of *Spain* is gone to the Bishop of *Munster*, to press him to hasten the march of his Troops, for want of which, and those of the *Dukes of Luxemburg*, the Prince of *Orange*, and the Governor of *Flanders* are very much disappointed in the measures they have taken. My Lord *Barkely*, Ambassador and Plenipotentiary of His Majesty of Great Britain, is arriv'd here on his return for England. The Duke of *Orange*'s Army continues in the Country of

Dendermond, and we cannot yet certainly tell when they will decamp, which it is said they would have done, ere this, in case the Confederate Troops were come up. The French Army under the command of the Duke of *Luxemburg*, march'd on Monday last from *Gembours* towards *Charleroy*. By the way of *Luxemburg* we have advice, that the *Marschal de Crequi* was retired near to *Metz*, and that the *Duke of Lorrain* was come with the Imperial Army to the *Abby of Bonlay*, which is about three Leagues from *Metz*; so that we are still in expectation, our next Letters will tell us of some action.

Paris, June 12. From *Metz* we have advice, that the Duke of *Lorraine* had possess'd himself of the Castle of *Linservilly*, three Leagues from *Metz*, near which place the *Marschal de Crequi* is encamped, having caused all the Corn and Forage for some Leagues round to be destroyed. That the Duke of *Lorrain* was encamped with the Imperial Army near *St. Amand*; That the Kings *Gensdarms* and *Carres du Corps* had join'd *Monseur de Crequi*, who had beheads sent to *Monseur de Schomberg* (who was posted near *Curignay*) to demand a farther reinforcement of him. From *Flanders* we hear, that the Prince of *Orange* intended to march the 9 or 10 instant; That the Duke of *Luxemburg* had sent the Cannon he fetched off from *Mestricht* to *Dinay*; to be new Cast, and was encamp'd with his Army between *Gembours* and *Charleroy*. The *Marschal de Schomberg* is marching to join the *Marschal de Crequi*.
