St. James's, March 4, 1786.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to the King That on the 26th of February last, Mr. Joseph Nicholson, Supervisor of the Excise at Canterbury, having made a Seizure of a considerable Quantity of Foreign Geneva at Whitehall, he was removing the same to Canterbury, under an Escort of a Corporal and Eight Dragoons on Foot, when a large Gang of Ruffians with Fire Arms followed them, and, without demanding the Goods, fired upon them, killed Two Dragoons upon the Spot, wounded Two others, and shot through the Hat of another; after which they unloaded the Waggon, and carried the whole Seizure away with them.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Murders, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the Offenders, (except the Person or Persons who actually committed the said Murders) who shall discover any one or more of his Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
