To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the High Sheriff and the Grand Jury of the County of Limerick, at Spring Assizes, One thousand seven hundred and eighty.

Most gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the High Sheriff and Grand Jury of the County of Limerick, with Hearts filled with the warmest Sentiments of Gratitude, humbly beg Leave to return your Majesty our most grateful and sincere Acknowledgments for the paternal Care your Majesty has, at this important Crisis, been graciously pleased to manifest for the Trade, Welfare and Prosperity of this your Majesty's Kingdom of Ireland.

Ever firmly attached to your Majesty's Sacred Person, Royal Family, and Government, if that Attachment could admit of Increase, we should find an additional Incentive to our Loyalty and Zeal in your Majesty's Bounty on a recent Occasion, to which we owe that Extension of Trade which this Kingdom is now likely to enjoy.

Extract of a Letter from the Right Honourable Lord Longford, Captain of His Majesty's Ship the Alexander, to Mr. Stephens, dated Spithead, March 16, 1780.

ON the 12th Instant, being to the Westward of Scilly, we gave Chace to a large Frigate in the S. E. Quarter, and after Eighteen Hours Chace got within Half Gun-Shot of her; at Daylight in the Morning of the 13th she hoisted French Colours, and we fired Chace Guns at each other for about Two Hours. When we had got nearly alongside her, my Foretop-mast, without b.in. Ru.k, of any Part of the Rigging cut, and without Wind, went over the Side: I found it quite rotten. The Courageux continued the Chace. and about Noon, after firing a great Number of Shot, came up with and took her. She proved the Monsieur Privateer, of Granville, of Forty Guns, Twelve and Six Pounds, and Three Hundred and Sixty-two Men, commanded by Jean de Bochet. She had been Eight Days from L'Orient, and taken nothing. She is a very fine Frigate, almost new, 134 Feet on the Gun Deck, and I hope will be found fit for His Majesty's Service.
