The humble Address of the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, and other Freeholders of the County of Lowth, at an Assizes held for said County, at Dundalk, this Ninth Day of March, 1780.

WE beg Leave to offer to your Majesty our most sincere Thanks for your Majesty's gracious and parental Attention to the Welfare of this Kingdom.

Our Hearts overflow with Gratitude for the great and happy Measures, which the Wisdom of your Councils, the liberal Sentiments of the British Parliament, and the generous Concurrence of the whole British Nation, have completed for our Relief. Admiralty-Office, March 25, 1780.

CAPTAIN Byron, of His Majesty's Ship the Proserpine, arrived the 21st Instant, in the Evening, with Dispatches from Rear-Admiral Hyde Parker, with whom he parted the 24th of last Month, off Antigua.

The Admiral mentions the safe Arrival of Sir Hyde Parker, in the Phoenix, at Barbadoes, with General Vaughan and the Troops, and the Trade under his Convoy; and that it was his Intention to accompany Sir Hyde, with the Troops and Trade bound to Jamaica, as far on their Way as Antigua.

The Admiral adds, That *Monf. Le Motte Piquet*, having slipped out of Fort Royal Bay in Martinico, with Seven Sail of the Line and One Frigate, he divided his Squad on, putting Nine Ships under the Command of Commodore Collingwood, and reserving an equal Number to himself, and immediately put to Sea in Pursuit of the Enemy: The Commodore's Division got Sight of them on the 8th of February, and immediately gave Chace, but had the Mortification to see them escape, under Favor of a Breeze along Snore, into the Road of Basse Terre in Guadaloup, where they sheltered themselves under Cover of the Fort. The Commodore continued to cruize between that Island and Martinico, with a View of intercepting *Monf. Le Motte Piquet*, if he should attempt to return to Fort Royal.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 25th Day of October, 1776, to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st of December then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 8th Day of November, 1776, to promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, by any of His Majesty's Sea-Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the 31st Day of December, 1776: And whereas His Majesty was likewise pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 15th Day of August 1777, to promise and declare, That every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should voluntarily enter himself to serve on Board any of His Majesty's Ships, on or before the 31st Day of October then next, should receive, as of His Majesty's Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, to be paid in Manner thereby directed: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations, for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, hath been prolonged and extended to the 31st Day of this instant March; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Rewards should be continued to be paid for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this instant March to the 30th Day of June next, inclusive. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
