We heartily join in the general Satisfaction which diffuses itself through all your Majesty's People of Ireland on this happy Change of our Affairs; and we assure your Majesty, that if any Thing can add to our Zeal, at a Time when the ambitious Views of France and Spain call for the Efforts of every brave and loyal Subject we feel a new Vigour given to it by those fresh Instances of Friendship and Affection towards us, which cannot fail most powerfully to incite us to stand forth in supporting the Honour, maintaining the Dignity, and extending the Glory of the British Empire.
