AT the Court at St. James's, the 17th of April, .1780,

PRESENT, The KING's Moft Excellent Majesty in Council. HEREAS fince the Commencement of the War in which Great-Britain is engaged by the unprovoked Aggreffion of France and Spain, repeated Memorials have been prefented by His Majefty's Ambaffador to the States General of the United Provinces, dethe States General of the United Provinces, de-manding the Succours flipulated by Treaty; to which Requisition, though strongly called upon in the last Memorial of the 21st of March, Their High Mightiness have given no Answer, nor fignified any Intention of complying therewith: And whereas by the Non-Performance of the clearest Engage-ments, they defert the Alliance that has fo long subfilted between the Crown of Great Britain and subsisted between the Crown of Great-Britain and the Republick, and place themfelves in the Condi-tion of a Neutral Power, bound to this Kingdom by no Treaty, every Principle of Wildom and Justice requires, that His Majesty should confider them henceforward as standing only in that distant Relahencetorward as itanding only in that diltant Kela-tion in which they have placed themfelves : His Majefty therefore having taken this Matter into His Royal Confideration, doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, judge it expedient to carry into immediate Execution those Intentions which were formally notified in the Memorial pre-fented by His Ambaffador on the 21ft of March laft, and previously fignified in an Official Verbal Deand previously fignified in an Official Verbal De-claration, made by Lord Vifcount Stormont, One of His Majefty's Principal Secretaries of State, to Count Welderen, Envoy Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary from the Republick, nearly Two Months before the Delivery of the aforefaid Memorial: For thefe Caufes, His Majefty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth declare, That the Subjects of the United Provinces are henceforward to be confidered upon the fame Footing with those of other Neutral States not privileged by Treaty; and His Majefty doth hereby fuspend, provisionally, and 'till-further Order, all the particular Stipulations respecting the Freedom of Navigation and Commerce, in Time of War, of the Subjects of the States General, contained in the feveral Treaties now fubfilling becontained in the leveral Freaties now fulfilling be-tween His M jeffy and the Republick, and more particularly those contained in the Marine Treaty between Great Britain and the United Provinces, concluded at London, December τ_{TT} , 1674. From a humane Regard to the Interests of Indi-miduals and a Defire to prevent their fuffering by

viduals, and a Defire to prevent their fuffering by any Surprize, His Majefty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth declare, that the Effect of this His Majefty's Order shall take Place at the following Terms, viz. In the Channel and the North Seas, Twelve Days

after the Date hereof.

From the Channel, the British Seas, and the North Seas, as far as the Canary Islands inclusively,

either in the Ocean or Mediterranean, the Term shall be Six Weeks from the aforelaid Date.

Three Months from the faid Canary Islands as far as the Equinoctial Line or Equator.

And laftly, Six Months beyond the faid Line or Equator, and in all other Parts of the World, without any Exception or other more particular Defeription of Time and Place.

Extract of a Letter from Sir Henry Clinton, Knight of the Bath, to Lord George Germain, dated Head Quarters, James Ifland, South Carolina, March 9, 1780. Received by the Swift Packet, Captain Nichols, from New York.

W Y last Dispatch, No. 83, will have in-formed your Lordship, that the Admiral and I only waited positive Information concerning Count d'Effaing's Fleet to put to Sea. Intelli-gence of their having quitted the Coast arrived late in December, and the Troops having been fome Time embarked, the Admiral was enabled to fail the afth

I will trouble your Lordship with no other Particulars of a very redious Voyage in uncommon bad Weather, than to mention, that in our Losses of Transports the Lives of the Crews have been faved; that only One Ship is miffing, having on Board a Detachment of Heffians, and fuppoled to have bore away for the West Indies: but that we have to regret the total Loss of an Ordnance Ship which foundered at Sea, and of much the greater Part of the Horfes brought for Cavalry or other public Ufes.

It was judged beft to proceed by a fecond Na-vigation from Tybee to North Edifto, and from thence to pais to John's and next to James Ifland. By a Bridge over Wappoo Cut we have from this laft gained the Banks of Ashley River.

My Intention is to pais to the Neck of Charles Town as foon as possible. The Enemy, I find, have collected their whole Force to that Place. This is faid not to exceed 5000 Men at prefent; but Reinforcemerts are daily expected.

In the mean Time, as the Rebels have made the Defence of Charles Town their principal Object, I have determined on my Part to affemble in greater Strength before it; and, with this View, have called immediately to this Army a Corps f had left in Georgia. They will pass the Savan-nah River, and join me by Land.

The Force afloat at Charles Town is Four Rebel and 1 French Frigate, with an old 60 Gun Ship, and fome Brigs and Gallies.

Although our long Voyage and unavoidable De-lays fince have given the Rebels Time to fortify Charles Town towards the Land, a Labour their Numbers in Negroes has greatly facilitated ; yet,

confiding

confiding in the Merit of the Troops I have the Honour to command, in the great Affiftance I have from Earl Cornwallis, and the further Cooperation of the Navy, I entertain great Hopes of Succefs.

I cannot clofe my Letter without expressing how much 1 am obliged hitherto to Admiral Arbuthnotfor the Affistance given me through Captain Elphinstone, who as yet has been chiefly employed in the Naval Transactions immediately relative to the Army. This Gentleman's unsemitted Attention to us from his fo ably and fuccessfully conducting the Transports into North Edisto to this Hour, with the great Benefit I have derived from his Knowledge of the Inland Navigation of this Part of the Coast, merit my warmelt Thanks.

P. S. Since the above, a Reinforcement is arrived in Charles Town, faid to confift of 2000 Men from the Northern Army.

[TRANSLATION.]

Extract of a Letter from Lieutenant-General Knypbaufen to Lord George Germain, dated New York, March 27, 1780.

HAVE the Honor to inform your Lordfhip, that fince General Clinton's Departure from hence on the 26th of December laft, we have had the longest and most fevere Winter that was ever remembered: All was Continent; and Horses with heavy Carriages could go over the Ice into the Jerseys from one Island to another; and it is only fince the 20th of February that the Rivers and Straits have been navigable.

The Rebels thought to avail themfelves of this eafy Communication, and threatened an Attack upon Staten Island, where there were about 1800 Men under the Command of Brigadier General Sterling, who were pretty well intrenched. For this Purpose General Washington, whose Army was hutted at Morris Town, fent a Detachment of 2700 Men, with Six Pieces of Cannon, Two Mortars, and fome Horfe, commanded by Lord Sterling, who arrived on the Island early in the Morning of the 15th of January, our advanced Posts having retired upon their Approach. They formed the Line; and having made fome Movements in the Courfe of that Day, withdrew in the Night, after having burnt One House, pillaged some others, and car-ried off with them about 200 Head of Cattle. The Day of their Arrival on the Island I embarked 600 Men to attempt a Passage, and support General Sterling; but the floating Ice prevented their Succefs, and obliged them to return. I imagine that the Appearance of these Transports, with Troops on board, which they could fee towards the Clofe of the Day, induced them to make this fudden Retreat, as they could not tell what Succefs they might have. Some Prifoners were made in their Retreat.

Some Days after, an advanced Poft, which they had at Newark, confifting of One Company, was furprized and taken by a Detachment from hence and from Paulus Hook, under the Command of Major Lumm; and the fame Day General Sterling fent another Detachment under Lieutenant-Colonel Bofkirk, who furprized the Piquet Guard at Elizabeth Town, and made z Majors, z Captains, and 47 Men, Prifoners of War. Both these Enterprizes were effected without any Loss on our Side. Some Time after General Mathew fent a Detachment of Guards and Provincial Horse, under the Command of Lieutenant-Colonel Northon, to attack a Post at John's House upon the White Plains. This did not facceed entirely to his Wishes; but the Rebels who were posted in a House were however attacked and eislodged, with the Loss of 40 Men killed and 97

made Prisoners, among whom were i Lieutenant-Colonel, 1 Major, and 5 Inferior Officers. We had 3 killed and 15 wounded.

In the Night of the 22d of this Month we partly furprized and took a Rebel Post in the Jerseys, confifting of 250 Men, of whom we made only 65 Prisoners, owing to Two Embarkations, One from hence under Lieutenant-Colonel Macpherson, and another from Kingsbridge under Lieutenant-Colonel Howard, not arriving at the appointed Time. Our Loss upon this Occasion was very inconfiderable. Captain Armstrong of the 42d Regiment is wounded. By these little Enterprizes during the Winter, as far as we can ascertain, we have made 320 Prifoners, and killed about 65 of the Enemy. By the best Intelligence I have been able to get,

By the beft Intelligence I have been able to get, General Walhington's Army at Morris Town confulls of about 5000 Men, befides Militia. There has been a great Defertion among them; Tired of the War, and diffatisfied with the depreciated Value of their Money, a general Difcontent pervades the whole Army.

Extract of a Letter from Major-General Patilion to Lord George Germain, dated New York, February 22, 1780.

THE intenfe Froft; accompanied with great Falls of Snow, which began here about the Middle of December, thut up the Navigation of this Port from the Sea, within a few Days after Admiral Arbuthnet's Pleet, with the Troops under the Commander in Chief, had taken its Departure from Sandy Hook. The Severity of the Weather increated to that Degree, that towards the Middle of January all Communications with this City by Water were entirely cut off, and as many new ones opened by the Ice. We could fcarcely be faid to be in an infular State. The Paffage of the North River; even in the wideft Part from hence to Paulus Hook (2000 Yards) was about the 19th practicable for the heavieft Cannon, an Event unknown in the Memory of Man; and very foon after Provisions were transported upon Sleighs; and Detachments of Çavalry marched from New York to Staten Island (11 Miles) upon the Ice. The Eaft River to Brooklyp on Long Island was alfo, for many Days, blocked up.

up. Thus circumstanced, My Lord, this City was laid. open on many Sides to an Attack from an enterprizing Enemy; and notwithstanding the unfuccefsful Attempt they made upon Staten Island on the 14th of January, it was nevertheless ftrongly reported that General Washington was meditating a great Stroke upon New York, with his whole Force, by different Attacks; and although the Undertaking would perhaps have been too daring and unwarrantable, yet the repeated Intelligence we received of the many Preparations they were making for that Purpole, forbid the abfolute Difbelief of fuch a Plan's being under Contemplation : Therefore, ha-ving received in November laft an Address, figned by the principal Inhabitants, in Behalf of themfelves and Fellow Citizens, to put themfelves in Military Array, I thought it a favorable Occasion of putting the Sincerity of their Professions to the Teft, and of adding in the prefent Instance to the Security of the City and Garrison, which the Commander in Chief was pleafed to honor me with the Care and Command of, as well as establishing in future such an internal Defence, as to make a Garrison of less Strength sufficient in general for its Protection. I confulted with General Tryon upon the Expediency: of this Mcalure, and, as he entirely concurred in my Opinion, I did not hefitate (having taken the Senfe too of fome of the principal Citizens) to iffue Senfe too of iome or the principal Citation, a Proclamation, calling upon all the Male Inhabi-tants, "tants, from the Age of Seventeen to Sixty, to embody and take Arms ... The Chearfulnels and Alacrity with which it was univerfally: complied, exceeded all Expectation ; and, in the Space of Seven Days after the Proclamation, we had the Pleafure to fee Forty Companies, from the Six Wards of the City, enrolled, officered, and under Arms, to the Number of 2660, many of the moft respectable Citizens ferving in the Ranks of each Company. Above 900 purchased Arms at their own Expence, and the Whole were defirous of doing the fame, if there had been a fufficient Number of Firelocks In Town for Sale; but that not being the Cafe, it was necessary to supply the Deficiency from the King's Stores. I ordered them however to be issued only as a Loan, and upon Condition of each Captain's becoming responsible, under his Hand, to the Storekeeper, for returning to him, when called upon, the Number he received, or to pay Thirty-fix Shil-lings for each Stand of Arms, if required. The Officers appointed to these Companies are all Perfons

of known well-affected Principles. The laudable Spirit and Ardor being happily raifed, quickly diffused itself amongst all Orders of Men. The several Publick Departments vied with each other who should be most forward in offering me their Services as Volunteers. I readily accepted their Offers, and formed them into Companies ac-cordingly. The Old Volunteer Companies likewife supmeted their Numbers and in a new four Data augmented their Numbers, and in a very few Days I reviewed them all together under Arms, most of them clothed in Uniform at their own Expence. General Knyphausen, General Tryon, and all the General Officers, were present, and expressed the highest Satisfaction at so respectable a Body of Men. The Return, which I have the Honor to enclose, will thew your Lordship the Number of these new-asso-ciated Companies, with the Effectives of each. I have befides received a Memorial from Fifty Gentlemen of the City, offering to form themfelves into a Troop of Cavalry, to mount, clothe, and arm themselves at their own Expence, and to serve, if called upon, either on York or Long Island.

The very meritorious and diffinguished Zeal, which the Officers of the Royal Navy have testified upon this fingular Occasion, demands my most grateful Acknowledgments. The feveral Captains Edgar, Breaton, Ofborne, Ardefoif, and Aplin, whofe Shine wave fath locked up performity offered me Ships were fast locked up, perfonally offered me their Services, to act with all their Seamen on Shore; and Captain Howe of the Thames, as commanding the Whole, fignified to me officially by Letter the Defire of all the Officers to ferve under my Orders, as Commandant, in any Manner they could be most uleful. These handsome Offers were most gratefully embraced, and a Circular Redoubt near the East River, with 8 Twelve-Pounders, and 1 Nine-Pounder, was made over to their Charge; and, as a Compliment due, it was immediately called the Royal Navy Redoubt. The Number of Seamen, about Navy Redoubt. The Number of Seamen, about 350, were divided into Ten Companies, each commanded by a Lieutenant of a Man of War. Two of them have mounted daily in this Reducht, and were to be reinforced by Five more, in cafe of The other Three Companies were then an Alarm. to repair to a Post, the most suitable for them, upon a Height covering the King's Dock-Yard, which was allo to be defended by the Company formed from the Artificers of the Yard, under the Command

of the Naval Storekeeper, as Captain. The Sailors belonging to the Victuallers, Tranfports, fmall Craft and private Trade, armed with Pikes, and under the Direction of Captain Laird, the Agent, were defined to guard and protect the whole Chain of Wharfs and Shipping, from the

.....

Ship-Yard to the lower Battery at the other Extremity of he Town.

The feveral Captains of Militia, defirous of making it permanent, and as ufeful as poffible, have readily agreed to, and fubfcribed many Regula-tions for the good Government of it, for fining De-linquents, Abfentees from any Parade, or from their Tour of Duty on the City Watch; for keep-ing in Repair and in good Condition their Arms and Ammunition, &c. They are likewife out every Saturday, and the Volunteer Companies every Sun-Saturday, and the Volunteer Companies every Sunday, in order to be trained and instructed in the Use of Arms. I have appointed Mr. Amiel, who ferved for Twelve Years as an Officer in the 60th Regiment, to act as Major of Brigade to this Corps of Miliua, with an Affiftant under him ; both of whom are to be paid out of the City Funds.

The Rigour of the Frost is now happily abated, and we are flattered with the Prospect of a com-plete Thaw; so that all Ideas of an Attack are now at an End. Indeed it was much to have been wished they had made one, as we were so well pre-pared to repel it to their Cost. We already learn, that the recent Display of Loyalty here, with the great Acquisition of Force it produced, has had its Effects upon the Friends of Government without the Lines, as well as upon the Enemy, who have been apprehensive of an Attack being intended upon their main Force at Morris Town. It has probably too contributed to the great Defertion, which has lately prevailed amongst their Troops in the Jerfeys, upwards of 160 having come over within thele few Weeks, and enlifted here with the Re-cruiting Parties of our Provincial Corps.

Extract of a Letter from Captain Drake, of His Majefly's Ship Ruffel, to Mr. Stephens, dated New York, March 29, 1780.

A Lthough I have not any Thing particularly in-terefting to inform the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty of, yet I should think it improper to fuffer a Pacquet to depart from this Port without defiring you-to acquaint their Lordships, that I left Viee-Admiral Arbuthnor, off Charles Town Bar, the 8th Inftant, his Flag on Board His Majefly's Ship the Roebuck : He had in Company the Renown, Romulus, Blonde, Perfeus, Camilla, and Raleigh, all prepared to pais the Bar that Morning, had not a Fog prevented it. The Richmond arrived Two Days before, off Tybee, with a Convoy. The Transports were moving from North Edifto, where they landed the Troops, to Stono; when I left it

they landed the Iroops, to Stono; when I left it the Troops were on James's Ifland. The Rebel Frigates within the Bar were placed, viz. the Bricole, Providence, Bofton, Ranger, with Two Galleys off Sullivan's Ifland, Four others, and Three Galleys off the Town. I arrived here, with His Majefty's Ship under my Command, the 21th Inffant, being directed by the Vice-Admiral to take on me the Command of this Port on me the Command of this Port.

My joining the Admiral off Stono, from Tybee, but just before he moved towards Charles Town Bar, and my immediate Departure from thence to come here, would not allow me to give their Lord-thips any further Particulars respecting the Operations intended to be carried on.
