THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons, by Robert Quarme, Esquire, Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them that the Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great-Britain, the Lord President of the Council, and several other Lords therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for granting to His Majesty several additional Duties upon Wines and Vinegar imported into this Kingdom.

An Act for granting to His Majesty several additional Duties on Advertisements, and certain Duties on Receipts for Legacies, or for any Share of a Personal Estate divided by Force of the Statute of Distributions, or the Custom of any Province or Place.

An Act to protect Goods, or Merchandize, of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture, of the Islands of Grenada and the Grenadines, on Board Neutral Vessels bound to Neutral Ports, during the present Hostilities.

An Act for allowing a Bounty on the Exportation of British Corn and Grain in Ships the Property of Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty.

An Act to amend an Act, made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for the Encouragement of Seamen, and the more speedy and effectual Manning His Majesty's Navy, and for making further Provisions for those Purposes.

An Act for repealing the Duties payable upon Pot and Pearl Ashes, Wood and Weed Ashes, imported into Great Britain, and for granting other Duties in-Lieu thereof, for a limited Time.

An Act for repairing, enlarging, and preserving, the Harbour of Aberystwyth, in the County of Cardigan.

An Act for amending and rendering more effectual Two Acts, passed in the Tenth and Eleventh Years of His present Majesty's Reign, for better supplying the City of Worcester, and the Liberties thereof, with Water, and for the better paving and lighting the said City, and for removing and preventing all Obstructions and Annoyances therein.

An Act for the better Government and Regulation of the Poor in the Town and Parish of Maidstone in the County of Kent.

An Act for repairing, lighting, watching, and cleansing, the High Street or Road called Goswell-Street, leading from Aldersgate Bars without Aldersgate, London, to the House of Woodhouse Coker, Gentleman, near the Turnpike at the End of the said Street or Road, in the County of Middlesex; and also Bull Yard, Glasshouse-yard, the North Side of Fan's Alley, Mount Mill, and Willow Court, contiguous to the said Street or Road on the East and West Sides thereof, and for removing Nuisances therefrom, and preventing the like for the future.

An Act for enlarging the Powers of an Act, made in the Twentieth Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, for building a Bridge cross the River Thames, from the Parish of Walton-upon-Thames, in the County of Surrey, to Shepperton, in the County of Middlesex.

An Act to explain and amend an Act, made in the Seventeenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to repeal an Act, made in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of King Charles the Second, intituled, The Master of the Rolls empowered to make Leases for Years in order to new-build the old Houses belonging to the Rolls; and for the better regulating the Method of granting Leases of the said Rolls Estate for the future; and for making Compensation to the Earl of Macclesfield and Sir Thomas Sewell, for their beneficial Rights and Interests in certain Leases made of the Rolls Estate; and for regulating the Method of making Leases of the said Estate for the future.

An Act for building a Bridge across the River Wye, between Whitney and Clifford, in the County of Hereford.

An Act to continue the Term, and alter and enlarge the Powers, of an Act, made in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing and widening the Roads from the Town of Stockbridge, in the County of Southampton, to the City of Winchester, and from the said City through Bellmour Lane to the Top of Stevens Castle Down, near the Town of Bishop's Waltham, in the said County, and from the said City of Winchester, through Otterborne to Bargate, in the Town and County of the Town of Southampton.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act, passed in the Thirty-second Year of King George the Second, for repairing and widening the Road from The Cross at Broken Cross in Macclesfield, in the County of Chester, to the Turnpike Road at Buxton, in the County of Derby; and for making and keeping



In Repair certain Branches of Road to communicate with the said Macclesfield Road.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of Two Acts, one made in the Thirty-second Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for repairing and widening several Roads therein mentioned, in the Counties of Southampton and Dorset; and the other, made in the second Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, to amend the said former Act; and for amending and widening the Road between Ringwood Gate in the County of Southampton, to Woolfbridge, and from thence to the great Western Road, between a Place called Thickiborn and Cashmore Inn, so far as the said Two Acts relate to the Fifth Division of Road directed to be repaired and widened by the said last mentioned Act.

An Act for converting into Money the Statute Labour in the Stewartry of Kircudbright, for the Purpose of repairing the Highways, Bridges, and Ferries, within the said Stewartry.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act, passed in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing and widening several Roads from Tetbury, and other Places in the County of Gloucester, so far as the same relates to the Road from Tetbury to the Gates on the West of Symond's Hall Down, and from the House at the Top of Frocester Hill, where the Turnpike Gate lately stood, to the Turnpike Road from Cirencester towards Bath, and from the Field called Bouldown Sleight, to the End of a Lane adjoining to the Road from Horsley to Tetbury near Tiltup's Inn; and for amending and keeping in Repair the Road from the said Turnpike Road near Howell's Down, across Owlpen Down, to a Lane leading to Lampern Hill, and from another Part of the said Turnpike Road near The Lutter Wood Turnpike, across Owlpen Down aforesaid, all in the said County of Gloucester.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Tenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act for repairing and widening several Roads leading from the Town of Louth in the County of Lincoln.

An Act for making and maintaining a Road from Sage Cross, in the Town of Melton Mowbray, in the County of Leicester, to the Town of Grantham, in the County of Lincoln.

An Act for amending the Road from the West End of Seend Street, to the Horse and Jockey in the Parish of Box, in the County of Wilts, and certain other Roads leading out of the said Road; and for making an additional Road, from the said Road in the Chapelry of Seend, to communicate with the Devizes Turnpike Road, at or near Somerham Brook, in the same Chapelry, all in the said County.

An Act for continuing the Term and Powers of so much of an Act, made in the Thirty-second Year of the Reign of his late Majesty, for repairing the Roads from Mold to Denbigh, and from thence to Tal y Cafn and Conway, and from Wrexham to Rutbin, Denbigh, and Rhyddlan, in the Counties of Denbigh, Flint, and Carnarvon, as relates to the Road from Wrexham to Denbigh.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of an Act, made in the Thirty-first Year of the Reign of his Majesty King George the Second, intituled, "An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Town of Guldeford, to the Directing Post, near the Town of Farnham, in the County of Surrey.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act, passed in the Thirty-second Year of King George the Second, for repairing and widening the Road from a Place called the old Gallows, in the Parish of Sunning in the County of Berks, through Wokingham,

New Bracknowl, and Sunning Hill, to Virginia Water, in the Parish of Egham, in the County of Surrey. And to Fifteen Private Bills.

An Account of the CEREMONY observed in Investing Sir Hector Munro with the Ensigns of the Most Honourable and Military Order of the BATH, at the Durbar near Madras, the 13th of October, 1779.

EARLY in the Morning all the Officers of His Majesty's Ships of War that could be spared from Duty, with Numbers of the Gentlemen of the Settlement, both Civil and Military, assembled at Major-General Sir Hector Munro's House in Fort St. George. About Half past Seven o'Clock Four Khans of the Presence waited on him, to compliment him in his Highness's Name, and to conduct him to the Durbar.

The Governor, the Gentlemen of the Council, and Brigadier-General Stewart, went early in the Morning to Chepauck, to attend on his Highness the Nabob, and wait with him Sir Hector's Arrival; as would also Admiral Sir Edward Vernon, but was prevented by Indisposition.

At Eight o'Clock the Procession began in the following Manner:

His Highness's Secretary in a Palanqueen, with His Majesty's Order and the Ensigns of the Order of the Bath in a rich Gold Brocaded Bag laid on a Crimson Silk Cushion: Sir Hector Munro: The Officers of His Majesty's Navy: And the Gentlemen of the Settlement both Civil and Military; in Palanqueens and other Carriages. Beyond the Gates of the Fort, the Procession was joined by several of the Nabob's State Elephants richly clothed and dressed; some with Houdars and Flags; others with Kettle Drums; besides a Number of Silver Colours carried by Persons belonging to the Durbar. A Detachment of His Highness's Cavalry, and another of his Infantry, attended to assist as a Guard, and to lead the Way. The Whole was attended with Music, according to the Custom of the Country. The Road from the Governor's Garden-house to the Nabob's Palace was lined on both Sides with the Company's Troops, consisting of a Detachment of the Artillery, with four Field Pieces; a Company of European Grenadiers; and two Battalions of Seapoys, who received the Procession with presented Arms, Drums beating, Colours flying, and the Officers saluting Major General Sir Hector Munro as he passed.

At the first Gate leading to the Palace he was met by the young Prince Seyful Mulk, the Nabob's Third Son; and at the Inner Gate he was received by the Two Princes Omdat ul Omrah, and Ameer ul Omrah, the Nabob's Two Eldest Sons, who conducted him to the Palace Gate, where his Highness waited for him; and, embracing him, led him to the Durbar. His Highness's Secretary, placing His Majesty's Order, and the Ensigns of the Order of the Bath, near the Musnud; the Nabob, accompanied by the Two Princes and Sir Thomas Rumbold, led Sir Hector Munro to a private Apartment, where he presented him with a Star made of Diamonds, which was attached to the Left Breast of the Major-General's Uniform; of which he requested his Acceptance, as a most honourable Mark of Respect to His Majesty, and

Friendship to himself. His Highness then left him with the Two Princes; and, returning to the Durbar, resumed the Musnud as His Majesty's Representative: On which His Majesty's Ships the Rippon, Asia, Coventry, and Sartine, saluted the Sovereign with Twenty-one Guns each; as did also the Fort, and the East India Ships in the Road.

His Highness then delivered to his Secretary His Majesty's Order for Investing Sir Hector Munro with the most Honorable Order of the Bath, which was read by him to an immense Number of People: The Officers of His Majesty's Navy, the Governor, Council, and almost all the Gentlemen of the Settlement, both Civil and Military, attending.

Then Sir Hector, supported by the Two young Princes, coming in full View of the Musnud, where the Nabob was seated as His Majesty's Representative; with all his Khans and Officers of State about him; they made a low Reverence to the Sovereign; then, coming to the Middle of the Durbar they made another; and, on advancing to the Musnud, a Third. Sir Hector then presented the Nabob with Twenty-one Gold Mohurs, as a Nazur, according to the Custom of the East. His Highness then rising from the Musnud, directed the Knight Elect to kneel, and taking the Ribbon in his Hand, he put it over Sir Hector's Head; expressing himself at the same Time, in Persian, to the following Effect.

"His Most Illustrious Majesty the King of Great Britain having, upon many Occasions, honoured me with particular Marks of His Royal Friendship, and having been graciously pleased to appoint me, by special Commission, to represent His Most Sacred Person for the Purpose of investing you with the Honourable and Military Order of the Bath, conferred upon you as a Mark of His Royal Approbation for your Military Service; I am happy in having this publick and distinguished Opportunity of returning you my most particular Thanks for the essential Services which you have rendered me by the Reduction of Pondicherry, and expelling our Enemies from the Carnatic."

To which Sir Hector returned the following Answer in English, which was translated in Persian to his Highness.

"Sensible of the high Honour conferred on me by the King my Master, I receive, with a Heart full of Gratitude, this Mark of Royal Favour. And I have the additional Satisfaction of receiving this Honourable and Military Badge from the Hands of your Highness, whose long and steady Attachment to His Majesty, to the British Nation in general, and to the East India Company in particular, is well known. Permit me to assure your Highness, that an exact Account of the particular Attention and Respect, with which you have treated the Royal Commission on this Occasion, shall be faithfully transmitted to Europe for His Majesty's Information."

The Fort then, by Order of Sir Thomas Rumbold, saluted Sir Hector Munro with Seventeen Guns.

The Ceremony being ended, his Highness conducted Sir Hector Munro back to the Palace Gate; from whence he was attended by the Two Princes Omdat Ul Omrah and Ameer Ul Omrah to the Entrance of the Palace, where they took Leave of him.

Sir Hector afterwards subscribed the following Oath in Presence of the Governor and the Counsellors of Fort St. George: "I Hector Munro, Knight, do promise to observe the Statutes of

"the

"the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, in every Point and Particular."

In the Evening the Nabob gave a most splendid Ball to all the Ladies and Gentlemen of the Settlement, at one of his Houses on Choultry Plain. The Gardens were illuminated with Lamps innumerable; and disposed so much to advantage, as to have the most elegant and pleasing Effect. His Highness, attended by the young Princes his Sons, and his Officers of State, came to the Ball about Seven; on which there were displayed a great Variety of most magnificent Fireworks, which lasted till between Eight and Nine; when his Highness retired. About Ten an elegant Supper was given to above Three Hundred People; after which, the Company returning to the Ball Room, continued to dance till near Two o'Clock.

The Elegance that appeared through the whole Entertainment, added to the great Propriety with which every Thing was conducted, gave the greatest Satisfaction to every Person present.
