P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 16th of February last, for prohibiting the Exportation or Carrying of Copper Coastwise (except under the Rules and Regulations therein expressed) will expire on the 24th of this instant May; and it being judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, so as that the Exportation or carrying of Copper Coastwise may continue to be restrained, under the Rules and Regulations established in that Behalf;—His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, that the said Prohibition be continued for Three Months, to commence from the 24th Day of this instant May; but it is His Majesty's Pleasure that the same shall not be taken to extend to any Sort of Copper to be Exported or sent Coastwise for His Majesty's Service, by Order and under the Directions or Licence of the Commissioners of the Navy, nor to prevent the transporting or carrying Coastwise of any Sort of Copper (except Sheets of Copper of and under the Weight of Two and an Half Pounds to the Foot Superficial) without any Security being required; nor to the exporting the same to any Parts beyond the Sea, to which it may lawfully be exported (except to any of the Ports belonging to France or Spain) upon Condition that all such Copper as is intended for Exportation shall be inspected and examined by an Agent or Agents, appointed or to be appointed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and that a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of the said Agent or Agents, shall be first had and obtained, setting forth, that no Part of the same consists of Plates of Copper, or Sheets of Copper (except as hereinafter excepted) or Nails made in Whole or in Part of Copper, which can be made Use of for the Purpose of sheathing and coppering Ships or Vessels; which Certificate from the said Agent shall be delivered to the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port in which the said Copper is intended to be shipped, and shall be their Authority for allowing the Quantity of Copper specified in the said Certificate to be put on Board and exported.—And as touching Sheets of Copper of and under the Weight of Two Pounds and an Half to the Foot Superficial, His Majesty is further pleased to permit and allow the same to be carried Coastwise without any Restriction, provided that no greater Quantity than Ten Hundred Weight shall be laden on Board any one Ship, unless Security by Bond hath first been given to the proper Officers of the Customs, in Treble the Value of the Copper intended to be sent Coastwise, to carry the same to the Place proposed, and none other; and to produce and deliver a Certificate or Certificates, within Four Months from the Date of the Bond, from the proper Officers of the Customs at the Ports for which such Copper shall be entered and cleared out, of the same having been all duly landed at such Ports; which Cer-

tificate or Certificates such Officer is required to give, and the Commissioners of the Customs to transmit to the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, in order to be laid before this Board: And His Majesty is likewise pleased to permit and allow the Exportation of Sheets of Copper of and under the Weight of Two Pounds and an Half to the Foot Superficial to any Parts beyond the Seas, to which the same may be lawfully exported (except to any of the Ports belonging to France or Spain,) upon Condition that no more than Ten Hundred Weight of such Copper shall be exported by any one Person or Partnership, and that the Quantity laden or put on Board any one Ship or Vessel, shall not exceed Three Tons in the whole; and also upon Condition that such Sheets of Copper shall be first inspected and examined by the Agent or Agents appointed or to be appointed by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; and that a Certificate, under the Hand and Seal of such Agent or Agents shall be first had and obtained, setting forth, that such Sheets of Copper are of and under the Weight above described.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 16th of February last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23d of this instant May: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April, the 13th of August, and the 3d and 10th of October, 1777, of the 19th of June, the 7th and 26th of August, and the 10th of September, 1778, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of; and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the said 23d Day of

this instant May, - presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entituled, " An Act to impower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to impower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." - And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Sir Peter Parker, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Jamaica, to Mr. Stephens, dated on Board the Salisbury, Port Royal Harbour, April 7, 1780.

THE 15th Ult. the Pallas sent in a Spanish Storeship, of 20 Guns, laden with Two Thousand One Hundred Quintals of Gunpowder and some Ordnance, intended for the Garrisons on the Spanish Main.

The 25th of last Month the Janus arrived much damaged in her Rigging and Hull, with an Account from Captain Cornwallis, that, on the 20th past in the Morning, off Monti Christi, he fell in with Four Sail of French Ships of the Line and a Frigate, with a Number of Merchant-Ships under their Convoy. Our Ships, consisting of the Lion of 64, Bristol of 50, and Janus of 44 Guns, formed the Line a-head, and were chased by the French, who came within Gun-shot at Five o'Clock in the Evening, and a running Fight was maintained during the whole Night; the Enemy not chusing to go alongside of our Ships, though they had it in their Power. The Morning of the 21st was calm, and the Janus being near the French Commodore kept up a constant and well-directed Fire, which obliged him to take the Advantage of a light Air of Wind to sheer off, with the Loss of his Mizzen-top-mast and Foretop-gallant-mast. The Lion and Bristol towed with their Boats to the Assistance of the Janus, which brought on a general Firing for Two or Three Hours; the Remainder of the Day was employed by the Enemy in repairing their Damages, and just before Sun-set, they made Sail again after our Ships, but did not come within Gun-shot the whole Night; soon after Day-light on Wednesday Morning, the 22d, Captain Cornwallis saw Three Sail to Leeward, which he imagined and afterwards found to be the Ruby, and the Niger and Pomona Frigates. The French immediately hauled their Wind, and Captain Cornwallis chased them for Five Hours, but they declined the Combat, notwithstanding the Janus was disabled, and Captain Cornwallis had only Two 64 and One 50 Gun Ship to oppose to Four Sail of the Enemy's Line of 74 Guns each, under the Command, as I have since been informed, of M. de la Mot Piquet. The Names of the French Ship; are the Hannibal, Hero, Vanqueur, Diadem, and Amphitrite Frigate. The French fired so injudiciously that there were only 12 Men killed and wounded in our Three Ships. The marked Conduct and In-

trepidity of Captain Cornwallis, and all the Officers and Men under his Command will, I flatter myself, give intire Satisfaction to their Lordships. Captain Cornwallis expresses himself much obliged to Captain Pakenham, (now acting in the Bristol, in the room of Captain Caulfield, sick on Shore) for his great Attention and Diligence during the whole Time of the Action, and also all the Officers and Seamen of the Three Ships, who behaved with the greatest Spirit and good Order; Captain Glover, he said, was very ill, and died on Tuesday Morning, in the very Hour he so ardently wished to see.

Naples, April 18. Her Sicilian Majesty was safely delivered of a Prince on the 12th Instant, at Three o'Clock in the Morning; and her Majesty continues as well as could be expected: The young Prince was immediately baptised. A grand Gala and Illuminations were ordered as usual, and a great Promotion is likely to take Place on the present joyful Occasions.

The last Letters from Sicily mention that they have lately been much alarmed by violent and repeated Shocks of an Earthquake, particularly at Messina, Catania, Taormina, in the Lipari Islands, and on the Coast of Calabria; and that an Eruption of Mount Etna, or some of the Lipari Islands, is expected.
